
PRESIDENT'S NOTE:

FEBRUARY IN THE GARDEN By Pauline Marx

Most of us who moved to the valley from another area of the country remember growing delicious, juicy tomatoes and have met with limited success here. Usually the problem is that they are planted at the same time as they were back home, in May or June. Out here in the desert that will result in quick disaster as the plants don't have the time to establish themselves before summer and may turn crispy within days.

Tomatoes will grow quite well in the Valley, but they need to be transplanted early enough to develop root systems, flower and set fruit before hot weather arrives.

Tomato pollen is no longer viable and fruit set will halt when temperatures reach 90 degrees. This means the time to transplant tomatoes is mid-February to mid-March.

Protection from the Cold

If you choose to plant before mid-March, you will need to provide protection from cold temperatures by draping burlap fabric, bed sheets or frost cloth over the plant so that your covering doesn't touch the plant.

You may also use self-standing plastic cylinders that surround the growing plant and act as an insulator or greenhouse. Each cylinder has compartments that you fill with water. The sun heats up the water during the day and accumulated heat is released at night. This system is called Wall O'Waters and is available at nurseries or garden centers.

Choose Appropriate Varieties

Most nurseries will have transplants available which are appropriate for the desert, but if you choose to start your own by seed, here are some suggestions:

- * Select varieties that have the fewest days from germination to maturity so fruits spend less time on the vine in our hot, dry conditions. (This information is found on seed packets or in catalog descriptions. Words like "early" in the plant name provide another clue.)
- * Small or medium-sized tomatoes will mature and ripen faster, reducing problems with moisture stress or cracking. For example, medium-size "Celebrity" tomatoes produce better fruits than large "Beefsteak" varieties.
 - * Cherry and yellow pear tomatoes are prolific.
- * Varieties bred to tolerate heat, such as "Heatwave," outperform many others.
- * Remember to plant your tomatoes in full sun and improved garden soil with plenty of organic matter.
 - * Purchase a fertilizer specifically for tomatoes and

carefully follow the label directions.

* Tomatoes are moisture sensitive and need a regular supply of water to thrive and produce fruit. Cracking fruit is a sign of moisture stress. Blossom End Rot, which appears as a dark bruise on the fruit, is caused by inconsistent watering schedules.

Provide consistent soil moisture for the root system by watering regularly.

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WATCH FOR TERMITES

Bellasera homeowners are reminded that termites are another pest that thrives in this area. Several residents have discovered termites around their homes and have taken appropriate control measures.

The subterranean termites common in this area live in colonies below the surface. In their search for food, they may emerge through expansion joints in concrete slabs or near foundation footings. They travel through mud tunnels (clearly visible) in quest for wood and paper. These tunnels often appear at soil level and run up the foundation walls.

All homes constructed in our community are covered by a five-year termite warranty — starting on the date the slab was poured. Sexton Pest Control provides the warranty service and will inspect for termite infestation and treat as necessary. There is no charge for either service during the warranty period. terms; thus, this year we will elect two directors and next year we will elect three directors. The following year will see two directors elected, and so forth.

With these efforts we hope to achieve 100% participation by the residents to ensure complete card reader accuracy for gate control. Here are the key rules for gate access and your review:

- 1. Location/Installation of the gate access card. If you haven't placed your access card on your windshield, or don't have it positioned in a location compatible with the reader, please do so now. If the card isn't in the proper location, the gates will not open and will require those vehicles to use the guest entrance.
- Speed of vehicle. Another important factor to ensure that the card reader is able to register your card. Don't whiz by and expect the reader to work effectively.
- 3. **Distance from the reader.** The card reader is mounted near the last column at the southeast end of the bridge. If you drive in the middle of the road, the reader may find it difficult to recognize your card and will not open the gate.

Lastly, the life expectancy for the gate access cards is unknown. If you have attempted to work through all of these challenges and find that your card still does not work, it may need to be replaced. Additional or replacement cards may be purchased through the Association – the cost is \$40.

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WATCH THAT POISON

WALL REFERENDUM APPROVED

More than half of Bellasera's homeowners voted to allow a resident to replace the property's rear view fence along Lone Mountain Road with a solid wall in an effort to reduce traffic noise from the roadway.

Community Manager **Janyth Martin** reported to the Board that 203 votes were in favor of the request, while 58 opposed it. At least 181 approvals were needed.

The vote tally for approval of future fence replacement requests had not yet been made, although it appeared that few of the ballots in favor of the single request opposed granting permission for any future requests, she reported.

A Scottsdale construction permit for a wall still must be granted. Community approval was needed before the permit would be considered by the City.
