PRESIDENT'S NOTE: A VISION FOR BELLASERA

What will Bellasera be like in 2013? 2023? I know some of us may think that's further down the road than we need to think about, but Bellasera will still be here and people will be living here. What can we do now to assure that Bellasera residents of 2023 will enjoy and be as proud of their community as much as we are to-day?

Your Association's Board of Directors, at February's meeting, created a **Long Range Planning Committee** to look towards the future and develop goals, plans, and funding options for the continuing preservation and improvement of Bellasera. This committee will:

- Review all of Bellasera's Common Areas with the intent of determining any need for future changes, improvements, or enhancements which would improve the quality of life for residents or help maintain or increase property values in Bellasera.
- Consider both the mid-range (2-5 years) and the long-range (6-20 years) requirements.
- Consider the "aging" of the community. As current residents age or move out, how will the nature of the community change? How should any plan accommodate these changes?
- Identify both the costs and benefits of all potential changes, improvements, or enhancements.
- Develop a written Mid/Long Range Plan covering the entire 20 year period.
- Include in the plan a Project Sheet for each potential project.
- Update the plan at least annually. This plan will be used to help define Operating Fund and Reserve Fund requirements.

The recommendations from this committee will form the basis for adopting projects to enhance the community and to keep Bellasera an attractive place to live. Projects such as renovation/modernization of the clubhouse area, landscape improvements, and creation of additional amenities need advance planning and targeted

MANAGER'S MEMO: RAIN + WARM WEATHER = WEEDS

Those weeds seem to just crop up overnight, don't they? Take the early rain we received in January and follow it up with warmer weather, and we are bound to see more weeds.

The Community's landscapers are working diligently to ensure we maintain the common area "weed-free." It's a large area to control, therefore chemical spraying is used to cover most of the area. But we also deal with the more visible traffic areas by having the landscapers manually maintain the area.

MARCH IN THE GARDEN By Pauline Marx

Be aware that the **last frost date** for our area is around **March 15**.

Prune **frost tender** tropical plants such as bougainvillea, hibiscus, and natal plum as they begin to leaf out with warmer temperatures.

Prune frost damage from perennial herbs.

Plant **vegetable** seeds. Try lima and snap beans, beets, carrots, corn, cucumbers, jicama, okra, green onions, peanuts, pumpkins, radishes, and summer and winter squash.

Prickly Pear Problems: A white fuzzy growth that looks like cotton is actually the byproduct of a small cactus-feeding scale insect called cochineal. The actual body of the insect, hidden beneath the fuzz, is a brilliant red which Indians have long collected to make a red dye. If not removed from the cactus, eventually this scale will harm and disfigure it.

The first line of defense is to scrape the material from the cactus. If that doesn't work, try to discourage the insect by spraying it with forceful jets of water. The last line of attack is spray with insecticidal soap. (You can make your own by placing 5 Tablespoons of Murphy's Oil Soap in a gallon of water. Do not do this when the sun is shining directly on the plant) Cochineal is generally worse during the warmer months, so get a head start on it this spring.

Saguaros may have an oozing rot usually near the base, but it can be seen on the upper part of the cactus also. This is known as bacterial necrosis. The best remedy is to cut out the affected tissue and rinse the wound with a solution of **nine parts water to one part house-hold bleach**. You could hasten the drying of the wound by dusting it with powdered sulfur which is available in garden centers.

A good indication that a cactus is dying is when there is no new growth as winter turns into spring. Some saguaros, though, bloom as they are dying. Growth occurs at the top center of the plant in the form of fresh, colorful shoots. Cactus should be throwing out new green growth in that top center region during the warmer months.

If a **cactus** is not growing but appears to be in good health, the most likely causes are insufficient watering or deteriorated roots. If you have not watered in a while and the soil is bone-dry, try a deep watering first. If you don't see improvement, check the soil for pests.

If your cactus is potted, you may want to change the soil to a more porous mixture. Keep in mind that most

cacti go through a natural dormancy period during the colder months.

If you have been planting the same **annual flowers**, for instance petunias, in the same spot for two or three years, it is important not to continue planting the same plant in that spot. More than likely, a fungus has invaded the soil if you begin to have trouble. Check the stem of one of the wilting plants at the soil line. If it is shrunken and brownish, fungus or water mold is the problem. Recommended fungicides are Captan, Banrot and Subdue.

If you replant with another annual, do not use pansies in winter or vinca in summer as they are susceptible to the same fungi. Also, be sure not to overwater, and do not plant any deeper than the top of the root ball.

As the weather warms and the days lengthen, adjust your irrigation timer to water more frequently. Be sure to run your system long enough to wet the top foot of soil for ground covers, two feet for ornamental plants, and three feet for trees. Deep, infrequent watering is much, much better than a daily sprinkling.

Follow this time-tested method for easing plants out of nursery pots (you may need to cut the pot off seriously root bound plants). Lay the pot on its side and roll back and forth, placing pressure on the side of the pot. Turn the pot upside down while holding one hand across the top of the root ball; carefully slide the plant out. If it doesn't come out the first time, repeat the process.

WALL PERMISSION GIVEN

A community-wide referendum gave the needed 51% that will allow owners of lots backing on Lone Mountain Road to apply to Modification Committee and to the City of Scottsdale for permission to replace their view fence with a solid block wall.

There were 296 votes cast in the two-part referendum. The final vote for the initial application was 232 in favor, 64 opposed. For the broader referendum, which would allow others to apply for the same change without requiring the community's approval in each case, 189 votes were cast in favor.

Now what about the rest of the Community?

Whether you're a full time or part time resident in Bellasera, *you* have the responsibility to ensure that your landscaping is maintained at all times. This includes, but is not limited to, weed control and removal, shrubbery and tree trimming and the removal and replacement of dead vegetation.

One special note: If you own a home adjacent to the sidewalk, make sure you keep tree limbs trimmed back so they don't hang over the sidewalk. It's for everyone's safety.

Are you renting, or do you have renters living in your home? In most instances, there is an arrangement between the parties to the lease agreement that clearly defines who is responsible for property maintenance. Since the Association is not a party to the lease agreement, though, the Association always deems maintenance of the property as being the owner's responsibility. As a renter, be sure you clearly understand what your responsibilities are or you will be jeopardizing the owner's good standing within the community. The Association will send correspondence to the owner of record at the address that's on file with the office.

We appreciate your cooperation and attention to ensure that your landscaping is always maintained.

GET OFF THAT COUCH!
