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2003-04 BUDGET APPROVED

The budget for 2003-04, presented at this year's Annual Meeting last month by **Bob Tack**, the Association's Treasurer, was approved without change at the Board of Directors meeting on April 28. The new budget will mean association membership dues will increase \$20 per month, to \$142 from the current \$122.

Tack explained the increase is primarily to meet increasing costs of gate guards and landscape maintenance and to recover from this year's shortfall, due principally to greater than expected repair costs.

Next year's planning includes an increased contribution to the reserve fund. A new contingency fund is proposed to enable future improvements to our community.

Higher cost estimates for parts and supplies and contract services in the coming fiscal year prompted budgeting larger amounts for those line items.

The final budget will be mailed with the next quarterly statement in early June.

MAY IN THE GARDEN By Pauline Marx

With their elegant curving branches and striking appearance, **ocotillos** (*Fourquieia splendens*) make wonderful accents in the desert landscape. Drive north up the Beeline Highway (Route 87) and you will see many that are indigenous to the Sonoran desert. In the spring the long, leafy canes of this desert shrub burst forth with bright-orange blooms — favorites of hummingbirds.

Ocotillos do not have the ability to store water in their tissues, so during a drought their leaves drop to reduce evaporation. The thorny canes turn gray, giving the impression that they have dried up and died. Once watered, it takes only a day or two for new leaves to appear. Ocotillos prefer full sun and good drainage. Water transplants weekly. Once the shrub is established, supplemental watering will help the leaves stay green. Be careful not to overwater, as they are prone to root rot in heavy soils.

New plants can be started by simply placing a piece of an ocotillo branch into the ground and watering. Often you will see fences made in this fashion. They are very effective as a barrier because of their thorns.

Night Garden

If you like to sit out in your yard in the evening, create a night garden in your yard. Our perception of color changes when the sun goes down. Red and orange tend to look gray or black at night, but white, pale yellow, blue or violet seem to glow come twilight. Surrounding tall flowers with short, light-toned foliage will allow plants to play off each other. Some plants to think about are dusty miller (silver-leafed foliage), evening primrose, (yellow or white flowers) lobelia (electric-blue blossoms), morning glory (violet blooms) and sweet alyssum (masses of small white blooms).

Our sense of smell becomes more sensitive in the evening garden too, so look for plants with pleasant fragrance.

Check Irrigation System

Make sure your irrigation system is functioning properly now before the weather warms up. Reset timers in increase the frequency as temperatures get hotter. Turn your system on and examine drip emitters. It's likely the emitters will have a white deposit from the minerals in our water; clean that off and be sure the water flows freely.

If the drip emitters are still within inches of a tree's trunk after it has been in the ground for a year, the water is not reaching the roots. The emitters need to be regularly moved out just past the edge of the tree's can-

opy. Picture an imaginary line from the edge of the foliage down to the ground where raindrops would drip off the plant; this is known as the drip line. You may need to add additional emitters or add ones that allow a greater flow rate.

Transplant Natives

You may transplant native and desert-adapted plants this month. Water deeply and maintain even soil moisture until fall so that the root systems can become established.

Fertilize Bermuda grass lawns while actively growing about every six weeks with 1/2 pound of nitrogen and 6 ounces of iron per 1,000 square feet.

Water turf deeply and as infrequently as possible. Water should penetrate 8 to 10 inches into the ground and soil should dry out briefly between waterings. It is **best to irrigate early in the morning** as grass watered late in the day may stay moist overnight allowing fungi to grow.

DIRECTORS ADOPT VIOLATION ENFORCEMENT POLICY

A formal policy for CC&R violations was adopted by the Board of Directors at the April 28 directors meeting.

The policy is designed to provide guidance to Bellasera's Community Manager on enforcing the community's Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions and its by-laws, explained **Dick Chenault**, the association's president.

Among the other items of business at the meeting was the election of Association officers following the reelection of two directors earlier in the month. All of the current officers were re-elected: **Dick Chenault**, President; **Dennis Lamb**, Vice President; **Bob Tack**, Treasurer, and **Jane Hillerson**, Secretary.

The board also appointed members of the standing committees — Modifications, Buildings & Grounds, Budget & Finance, Activities and Communications. It also named members of the recently created Long Term Planning Committee.

Details of the Board's actions are available at the Community Manager's office in the clubhouse.

COMMERCIAL PROPERTY, LONE MT. ROAD DEVELOPMENT REPORT

The city of Scottsdale has no development requests before it for the 15-acre commercial-zoned parcel at the southeast corner of Scottsdale Road and Lone Mountain Road, said City Councilman and Bellasera resident **Bob** Littlefield.

He offered the information in a message to Community Association President **Dick Chenault**, who read it at the Association's annual meeting.

Littlefield further said that Scottsdale has no improvements to Loan Mountain Road in its current 5-year Capital Improvement Plan.

"The idea of Lone Mountain Parkway, extending Loan Mountain Road east of Pima Road, it pretty well scrapped," he said. "There is diminishing need for it from a capacity standpoint and also because of concerns about an adverse environmental impact on the [McDowell Sonoran] Preserve."

During the candidate's night presentation prior to Bellasera's annual meeting, Littlefield offered to check on the plans and report to the community.

Concerning the commercial property adjacent to Bellasera's north-west property line, Littlefield said that the property is for sale and "we anticipate that whoever buys it will present a development request to the City at some point.

He explained that although the property is zoned "Planned Community Commercial" — essentially the same zoning as the Bashas center at Grayhawk — there are some additional restrictions imposed on it by the Environmentally Sensitive Lands ordinance.

SCOTTSDALE LISTS BRUSH AND BULK REMOVAL DATE

Scottsdale will pick up **brush and bulk items** in the Bellasera area **during the week beginning Monday, May 5.**

Brush and bulk items to be picked up should be at curbside by 5 a.m. at the start of the week. It will be removed during the week.

The city's Solid Waste Management department urged homeowners to help by separating the brush or "green" items from the bulk items. The brush material can be diverted from landfills and converted into mulch, ground cover or soil blend.
