PRESIDENT'S NOTE:

LOOKING INTO BELLASERA'S FUTURE

The Long Range Planning Committee has been staffed with volunteers from our community and is ready to get moving.

You may recall the charter for this committee asks it to look into the future of Bellasera and to suggest ways to maintain and improve our community. Specifically it states that the Committee shall:

- Review all of Bellasera's Common Areas with the intent of determining any need for future changes, improvements, or enhancements which would improve the quality of life for residents or help maintain or increase property values in Bellasera.
- Consider both the mid-range (2 to 5 years) and the long-range (6 to 20 years) requirements.
- Consider the "aging" of the community. As current residents age or move out, how will the mture of the community change? How should any plan accommodate these changes?
- Identify both the costs and benefits of all potential changes, improvements, or enhancements.
- Develop a written Mid/Long Range Plan covering the entire 20 year period.
- Include in the plan a Project Sheet for each potential project.
- Update the plan at least annually. This plan will be used to help define Operating Fund and Reserve Fund requirements.

Members of this committee are **Brad Gazaway**, **Melissa Price**, **Patrick Quinn**, **Gary Stettner**, **John Storer**, **Bob Tack**, and **Dick Chenault**. The committee had its first meeting May 21 and elected Gary as chair. The committee will meet at least monthly throughout the year.

Please contact any member of the committee, Community Manager **Janyth Martin**, or any other Board member with your ideas for the committee to consider.

JUNE IN THE GARDEN By Pauline Marx

We will soon be treated to the flowers of the Red Bird-of-Paradise (*Caesalpinia pulcherrima*) with huge clusters of flowers above bright green, fernlike foliage. The vibrant blossoms are orange tinged with yellow and red and convey the feeling of heat.

Barbados Pride is another common name for this 6 foot high, 8-foot wide shrub — a reference to its origin in the West Indies. Some plant books say that it comes from Mexico because it has become naturalized there.

The Bird-of-Paradise is used extensively because it fits in a tropical looking landscape accompanied by bougainvillea and palm trees, as well as in a desert landscape, where its companions may be creosote bush (*Larrea tridentata*), brittlebush (*Encelia farinosa*), and golden barrel cactus (*Echinocactus grusonii*).

The Bird-of-Paradise has one vulnerability: It does not thrive if the weather gets cold. Cool weather brings a bronze cast to the foliage, and when temperatures drop to the upper 20s it freezes to the ground.

It Can Be Pruned Severely

You can replicate nature's pruning by cutting the plant back severely in late winter. As warmer weather returns, the foliage and flowers also return and the plant once more becomes one of the most popular and beautiful shrubs we have here.

Texas Ranger (*Leucophyllum frutescens*) is another plant which is unfazed by the heat. When the humidity climbs during monsoon season, this variety of sage can be counted upon to burst into purple blooms within a few days, the reason it is often called Barometer Bush.

Gardening Tips

Adjust settings on automatic watering systems as temperatures rise and plants require more water.

Clean up leftover winter annuals.

Harvest onions and garlic as their tops begin to brown.

Hose off roses early in the morning to control spider mites and aphids and reduce the amount or fertilizer to minimize growth during the summer.

Provide shade cloth for tomatoes to encourage a longer production season.

Apply a pre-emergent herbicide to control summer weeds.

Native and imported heat-tolerant plants can be planted through the summer months. They will need to be watered on a regular basis until fall.

ties, such as landscaping and grounds, parking areas, private streets, swimming pool, clubhouse, and tennis and basketball courts.

Our association also provides common services such as guard gate staffing. In addition, other responsibilities include enforcing the master regulations (the Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions — CC&Rs) and the land-scape and architectural guidelines.

CC&Rs

These documents detail the owner's property rights, the conditions on use of the property, and the owner's rights and obligations in the association. The CC&Rs are important rules in your planned community living. They are designed to make sharing property convenient and fair for all involved.

Architectural Guidelines

Most CC&Rs provide for architectural control by the association. These controls are not set up to stifle your individual creativity, but rather to ensure the integrity of the original community design.

Please remember – if you are considering making exterior modifications to your home or landscaping, you must submit your written request and plans to the Modifications Committee before work commences. There is a prepared form — Appendix A in the Design Guidelines and available from my office — to simplify the application. The Committee meets on a monthly basis to review plans that have been submitted.

Remember that the key to a successful community is the support and enthusiasm of its members.

Heard Museum Film Festival: The first-ever Heard Museum Indigenous Film Festival opens Thursday, June 19 with an evening event and runs through Sunday, June 22. The festival features the work of some of the finest emerging and established indigenous film makers in the world. It will be held on the museum grounds and the AMC Arizona Center Theaters. Additional information is available from the museum, (602) 252-8848.

Sears-Kay Archeological Site: Combine a short hike with exploration of a small, ancient Hohokam Indian hilltop fortification. Drive east on Cave Creek Rd, continuing beyond the turn-off for Bartlett Lake. Road becomes a maintained gravel road. Continue about 1 1/2 miles to the entrance of the site, on the right. There is a sign at the entrance. Self-guided, with informational signs about the Hohokam culture and fortifications. No fees are charged.

Deer Valley Rock Art Center: A great place to see vast numbers of ancient petroglyphs during a short walk at the base of the Hedgepeth Hills, plus interpretive exhibits about rock art. Sponsored by the ASU Anthropology Dept. Binoculars help. Closed Mondays. Located on **Deer Valley Drive**, 1/2 mile west of 35th Avenue.

Heard Museum: "A Revolution in the Making: The Pottery of Maria and Julian Martinez." Exhibit of black-on-black works by the San Ildefonso potter hat revolutionized the look of pottery, opens May 10. The museum is at 2301 N. Central Ave., Phoenix.

Heard Museum North, El Pedrigal: Metal Work: Containers of Form, Function and Beauty. February-July.

Scottsdale will pick up **brush and bulk items** in the Bellasera area **during the week beginning Monday, June 2.**

The July pick-up will begin during the week starting June 30.

Brush and bulk items to be picked up should be at curbside by 5 a.m. at the start of the week. It will be removed during the week.

The city's Solid Waste Management department urged homeowners to help by separating the brush or "green" items from the bulk items. The brush material can be diverted from landfills and converted into mulch, ground cover or soil blend.
