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TRASH TALK...PEDERSON UPDATE...COMMITTEE MEMBERS...BY-LAWS

I continue to salute the efforts of homeowners who bring issues to the Board's attention so that problems may be addressed appropriately. At the Board meeting on October 18, I thanked Gerald Moczynski who e-mailed the community manager and copied the Board that the tennis court lights had been on all night and that the timer switch was very difficult to turn. And he followed up when he noticed the lights were on again the next day. So we took two steps to resolve the problem. We replaced the faulty timer and installed an override so the lights turn off automatically at 10:15 every night. Both these steps should save all of us money, reduce energy consumption, and avert light pollution at night for our neighbors who live closest to the courts.

Then I went on at the meeting to talk "trash." Actually the topic was garbage at the dumpster in the clubhouse parking lot. I am sure that some residents are inadvertently adding to our homeowner fees without realizing the effect they are having on their fellow residents. Let me explain. The dumpster in the parking lot is intended for clubhouse use when there are social functions and for clubhouse office use. The dumpster is not intended as a garbage can for part time residents or for full time residents who are going on vacation.

I realize that in the past when Bellasera was a smaller but growing community that managers had permitted part time residents to deposit a trash bag if they were leaving prior to the weekly trash pick up day. Two part time residents, Craig Klos and Mary Kalligan, pointed this out to us. And we are aware that other residents also use the dumpster at the clubhouse. This problem has grown to the point where the community has to pay almost \$3,800 a year for extra trash removal service for that dumpster. That works out to an average of \$10 in fees per homeowner. So if one of your neighbors is a part time resident, extend a helping hand and offer to add their trash to your municipal garbage bin. This is a wonderful opportunity for part time residents to get to know several of their neighbors as they spread their garbage around. An occasional bottle of wine or Starbucks gift card goes a long way to thanking helpful neighbors. And we all go away on vacation from time to time so reciprocity should take care of those situations.

The Board has asked the Buildings and Grounds Committee to develop a policy resolution to address this costly and growing problem. We have padlocked the dumpster so that only "authorized" garbage enters the dumpster. This Building & Grounds resolution is scheduled to be presented to the Board at its November 28 meeting. But I would much rather see one neighbor helping another, rather than having to implement a series of fines so that our trash removal fees don't cause a dues increase for all homeowners.

Enough trash talk. There are further updates on the Pederson project. Crawford Love provided an update to the Pederson development on Lone Mountain Drive. Crawford, Karen Husted and Sandy Rooks met with Gary Pederson, and City Planning staffers Randy Grant and Don Hatter on October 18. The purpose of the meeting was to finalize details on providing extra vegetation and berming in Bellasera's NAOS (Natural Area Open Space) land. Pederson agreed to provide additional screening on both his property and on ours at his expense. Additionally, he will provide three years worth of watering at his expense. The city agreed that this revegitation would allow us to maintain the NAOS classification for our perimeter property. Berms will be used only in those instances where the ground slopes require screening.

Gary Pederson will be sending a personal letter to each homeowner on Brisa and 72nd Place and then meet with them to discuss where they would prefer individual screening trees placed. In the event of disagreements between two homeowners, it will be the responsibility of those homeowners to arrive at a mutually agreeable resolution. (continued on page 5)

NOVEMBER IN THE GARDEN

November Planting

November is a good time to make preparations to brighten your garden for the winter and spring. To get a head start, you might want to pay particular attention to some plants that will provide both color and contrast. Let's start with a few that may be already established in your garden.

<u>Bougainvilleas</u> - These are nice plants but occasionally they refuse to bloom. They actually do better with little care and lots of pruning. However, pruning is best done in the early spring after all danger of frost passes. Remove dead branches and keep its height in check. It will quickly recover. Bougainvilleas like well-drained soil and full sun. They do not bloom well in partial shade. It is best to plant them in the spring. You can feed them lightly but do so in the spring and summer. If you over fertilize, the plant will bloom sparsely or not at all.

<u>Roses</u> - Prune and feed. Remove faded flowers, pruning lightly as you go. Take out dead, diseased crossings and injured canes as well as prune for shape. Then apply complete fertilizer (a fertilizer that can provide all the three main elements: nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium), watering it in well to encourage a flush of winter flowers.

<u>Aloe</u>- There are several species to choose from such as Aloe vera and African aloe which are native to South Africa. They provide some of our best winter and early spring color ranging from small clumping groundcovers to treelike accents. Hummingbirds are attracted to their yellow, orange or red tubular flowers. Aloes prefer filtered shade but can acclimate to sunnier positions. They will thrive under a canopy of desert trees such as mesquite and palo verde. Most aloes begin to suffer frost damage when the temperatures fall below 25 degrees.

Here are a few other suggestions for winter color.

<u>Bulbine frutescens</u> (Bulbine) - It forms small clumps to 18 inches tall by 2 to 3 feet across with fleshy bright-green leaves that look good all year around. Its flowers are a tall spike of small yellow blossoms. <u>Dalea pulchra</u> (Indigo bush) - This evergreen shrub has an open, rounded growth form to 5 feet tall and wide. Its delicate silver foliage provides a striking contrast to the masses of violet flowers produced in winter and early spring. Indigo bush is quite susceptible to over watering, so plant it in well drained soil and be careful to not kill it with kindness. The nectar-rich blossoms attract bees and butterflies. <u>Dalea fructescens</u> (Black dalea) - This shrub blooms in late fall with masses of bright purple flowers. It is evergreen and forms a rounded mound of gray-green foliage to 4 feet tall by 5 feet wide. As with Dalea pulchra it needs full sun and is very tolerant of reflected heat. The bees cover this shrub during the bloom season.

<u>Eremophilia decepiens</u> (Emu bush) - Blooming on this shrub begins in January and is in full swing by Valentine's Day. The masses of tubular red flowers are truly spectacular. For the rest of the year, this evergreen shrub provides nice deep green foliage and a dense rounded form. Plant in full sun and allow it plenty of room as it can quickly grow to 4 feet tall by 5 feet wide. It is cold hardy to the mid-20s. <u>Hymenoxys acaulis</u> (Angelita daisy) - This is one of the best perennials to plant for year round color. Although blooming slows down in winter months, it can still be counted on to provide a splash of sunny yellow in the garden. Its slender bright-green leaves can still be counted on to provide a splash of sunny yellow in the garden.

Opuntia violaceae santa rita (Santa Rita prickley pear)- This is the cactus with the rich purple pads the provide lots of winter color. It has a yellow bloom that appears in late spring.
