## **AED Coming to Clubhouse**

The Board recently approved the purchase and installation of an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) for the clubhouse.

The AED is a portable electronic device that automatically diagnoses the potentially life threatening cardiac arrhythmias of ventricular fibrillation and ventricular tachycardia in a patient. It's able to treat them through defibrillation, the application of electrical therapy, which stops the arrhythmia, allowing the heart to reestablish an effective rhythm. AEDs are designed to be simple to use for the layman.

Once the installation is complete, additional information and training will be provided.

## **Neighborhood News- Rezoning Applications Update**

As we have previously reported, two proposed Scottsdale General Plan Amendments have been filed with the City of Scottsdale for properties in our area. The first is very close to Bellasera on the southwest corner of Lone Mountain and Scottsdale Road and the second is at the northwest corner of Pima and Dynamite Road. The following is a status on these two parcels.

Lone Mountain and Scottsdale Roads- You may have noticed that the signs have been taken down. That's because the developer has withdrawn the application. The speculation is that they still intend on building an 80 bed facility and will submit some form of rezoning application as opposed to a General Plan Amendment. The large buildings and 80 bed usage is considered by the Coalition of Pinnacle Peak (COPP) to be incompatible with the character of the area. We will keep you informed when a new application is submitted.

Pima and Dynamite Roads- This remains as a General Plan Amendment and would remove the parcel from the boundaries of the Desert Foothills Character Area and the Foothills Zoning Overlay. COPP feels it would set a precedent for more incursions of increased density and commercial development which would threaten the desert, rural, equestrian character of our area. The applicant is proposing a hardware store, general store, gas station, flower shop and specialty restaurant. To appreciate the magnitude of this request, consider the fact that the city council votes on General Plan Amendments only once a year. There are currently only 2 cases scheduled to be voted on in October. The schedule of public meetings on this project is as follows:

September 23 Regular Planning Commission (vote will be taken) 5:00 P.M. City Hall Kiva

October 27 City Council Meeting 5:00 P.M. City Hall Kiva

Whether you are for or against these projects, we encourage you to be involved and voice your opinion. If you are against the Pima and Dynamite project, we will have a petition posted in the clubhouse that you can sign starting on September 1. If you'd like to circulate a petition with your neighbors, they will also be available.

## September in the Garden

Many of us have citrus fruit trees in our backyards and can enjoy a justpicked orange, lemon or grapefruit. So, since harvesting is just a few months away, I thought I would devote this month's column to the common problems that you might face with your citrus.

I recently received some valuable information from the Maricopa County Extension Service about diagnosing **home citrus problems** along with some **suggested remedies** which are listed below.

<u>Natural Fruit Drop</u> - This occurs in the spring as trees will shed excess fruit they cannot support. Fruit drop is heavier during hot, dry and windy weather and on trees receiving inadequate irrigation or nitrogen fertilization.

<u>Remedy</u>- Increase the amount and frequency of irrigation during periods of high heat, low humidity and strong winds. Do not under fertilize.

Dry Sacs- These will be evident when you cut open the fruit.

<u>Remedy</u>- This is cured by good fertilization and nutrition practices. Early season harvesting may alleviate this problem.

<u>Sunburn</u>- This occurs on fruit directly exposed to the sun during the late spring, summer and early fall. <u>Remedy</u>- Since this is seasonal, no control is necessary other than to carefully plan where you plant your citrus trees. Also, infrequent but deep watering will maintain soil moisture at a more even level as opposed to frequent shallow irrigation.

<u>Fruit Splitting</u>- This is caused by inconsistent watering and fertilization or sunburn. <u>Remedy</u>- Maintain adequate moisture and follow recommended fertilizer applications.

<u>Thick Peel and Puffy Misshapen Fruit</u>- This is a natural response of young citrus and low humidity. <u>Remedy</u>- If found on older trees, it may be a response to fruit that has been over-fertilized.

<u>Holes</u>- These are caused by birds, chewing insects, or rodents.

Remedy- If you are energetic, you can try bird netting, fencing and removal of rodent nests. However, you may have noticed that the Gila Woodpeckers, which are in abundance in Bellasera, love oranges. Hopefully, you have enough to go around. Early harvesting will definitely help. Insect damage cannot be controlled.

<u>Lack Of Growth and Stunting of Entire Tree</u>- This is caused by planting the tree too deep, improper watering and or fertilization.

Remedy- Plant at proper depth and observe watering and fertilization guidelines.

Since most of us don't have a large space in our backyard, you can plant dwarf varieties, which are smaller trees, but the fruit size is normal.

#### **Pack Rat Problem**

A rat infestation is one of the biggest problems that some Scottsdale homeowners can imagine.

Pack rats can live just about anywhere. They have been known to inhabit abandoned burrows, take occupancy in walls and even swim through water to reach their homes.

Pack rats tend to be smaller than roof rats. They also have shorter tails, which are often bushy. Pack rats are peculiar in that they will often leave objects and food in odd places. This behavior pattern occurs because pack rats will frequently swap an item for something new. You might therefore find shiny rocks, buttons, and bits of food and other evidence of a pack rat infestation in your home.

Rats are disease carriers that can put your health in danger and destroy the structure, wiring and insulation of your home.

Below are some warning signs that will help you identify rat infestation and rodent problems in the home.

- Look for burrowing and nesting sites on your property such as in the attic, flooring, the yard and anywhere debris accumulates. Rats typically nest in safe hideaway locations that allow them access to food
- Rat droppings in your home and on the property. Rat droppings look like small dark pellets, almost black in color.
- Listen for sounds of scurrying inside the walls of your home. You may also hear some scratching noises through the pipes and in the attic.
- Gnaw marks are another sign of rat infestation. Check for chewed electrical wiring, woodwork and home insulation. You can also detect rodent problems in the garden if you find mangled fruits and vegetables and a ransacked lawn.

If you think your home may have a problem with rat infestation, your best bet is to contact a pest control specialist. However, some homeowners prefer to take matters into their own hands. If such is the case, review the following guidelines for effective rat trapping techniques.

- Rat trapping is considered the best method to properly address rat infestation. Detect rat nesting grounds and place traps to surround the areas.
- Snap traps are a cost effective rat control strategy. Be sure to purchase the right size traps designed specifically for catching rats. For safe rat trapping, remember to keep them away from your children and pets.
- Once you've caught a rat, the next step is to properly remove it from your home. Many rats are cannibals, so leaving a dead one lying around won't scare the other rats, but rather signal them to dinnertime.
- Use tightly sealed containers to properly dispose of rats. Following rat trapping, be sure to carefully clean the area for proper rat control.
- Follow up your rat trapping with some preventative measures against future rat infestation.
- Find and seal the entryways where you suspect rats have invaded your home. Bear in mind that rats
  can enter your home through very small spaces. With this step, it may be wise to enlist the services of
  a rat control specialist.
- Other preventative measures include keeping your yard tidy with regular weeding and gardening and removing any debris from around the home. Your waste and food containers should also be properly sealed. In taking these steps, you can prevent future rat infestation and keep your family and home safe.
