Board Report

<u>New Tennis Reservation Kick-Off.</u> Bellasera's new online reservation system for the community tennis courts will debut on Monday, April 4. The new system will be accessed on our web site. Instructions on how to register and use the new system are provided below.

<u>Tennis Courts Repair And Refurbish</u>. Repair and refurbishing of our two tennis courts is tentatively scheduled for this summer. Ongoing cracking of the playing surface(s) has been a continual problem, especially with the tennis court which immediately abuts the Dog Park. The Building and Grounds Committee will be exploring several alternative repair solutions before making a recommendation to the Board for a final decision. Residents who wish to provide input on this issue are encouraged to attend upcoming Building and Grounds Committee meetings where these alternatives will be explored and discussed.

House Calls to Pick Up Hazardous Waste

Scottsdale's Solid Waste Department crews will come to your house to pick up household hazardous waste like paint, cleaners and motor oil. This is material that shouldn't go in your trash or down your drain. Residential utility customers may use the Household Hazardous Waste Home Collection Program three times per calendar year at no charge. The costs are already included in garbage collection rates. Here's how to schedule service:

Visit **ScottsdaleAZ.gov** and search "HHW." Fill out the home collection form and explain what you would like picked up.

You will receive a confirmation with anticipated pickup dates, and you'll get a reminder e-mail the day before your collection appointment.

Set out items for collection by 7 a.m. on your scheduled collection day. Containers must be properly labeled and placed outside by your front door or garage. The largest container eligible for collection is 5 gallons. You are eligible to have 20 gallons of waste picked up per appointment. Call **480-312-5600** if you need additional information.

Visitors & Vendors in Bellasera

(The account set up procedure has been revised from that provided in last month's newsletter. —Editor)

All residents are reminded to please either <u>use QuickPass</u> (info below) or <u>call</u> the gate guard (**480-488-3663**) when visitors/vendors are expected.

QuickPass is a web site for all Bellasera homeowners designed to make your life easier, and help Securitas, USA personnel at the guard house manage visitors and vendors. If you have not set up your account yet, you're strongly encouraged to do so. The men at the front gate *thank you* for doing so.

Here's how to set up a Quick Pass Account:

- ⇒ Call the Bellasera Office, **480-488-0400**, to obtain your User Name (Log In) and password.
- ⇒ Once you have the User Name and Password, log on to QuickPass, www.quickpass.us.
- ⇒ Enter your User Name and Password, click on "Go".
- ⇒ Once in your account you will be able to change your password, add/delete visitors and obtain a Key Pad Number for after hours entry.

Note: QuickPass applications for mobile devices (cell phones, tablets) are also available. Search for "QuickPass visitor management."

Authorized visitors will need a Key Pad Number to enter the Scottsdale Road gate <u>between 1:00</u> and 5:00 a.m. every day.

To obtain a Key Pad Number:

- ⇒ In the Main Menu (after you obtain your password)
- ⇒ Go to Manage Account
- ⇒ Under Permanent Visitors click on Quick Add
- ⇒ Input Name of Visitor
- ⇒ Under Add/Modify Visitor click the drop down arrow and click Family & Friends
- ⇒ Click Assign Code
- ⇒ Click Visitor type and choose Family & Friends
- ⇒ Input a code of at least five (5) numbers
- ⇒ Click SAVE

When using QuickPass software to alert the gate guard of expected visitors/vendors on a particular day, please <u>make the start time 7:00 a.m.</u> If a later time is indicated, the request is not visible to the guard until the time you specify. If the visitor/vendor is early, it's unknown to the guard.

Bellasera in the Rear View Mirror

A look back in Bellasera history that may bring back memories for long-time residents and be of interest to those not living in our community 5 & 10 years ago. <u>Clips</u> from past newsletters follow.

Bellasera Neighborhood News, April 2006, 10 years ago

- Karen and Dean Husted hosted a meeting on March 21, which was attended by approximately 20 homeowners of Brisa Drive and 72nd Place. Also attending were Johnny and Dave Basha and Gary Pederson. The Bashas have decided to replace the proposed Basha's grocery store with an AJ's. The size of the grocery store will be reduced from 50,000 square feet to approximately 27,000 square feet. Some additional 10,000 square feet will be apportioned to the other pads to increase the rentable space and make up for the loss of rentable space from the grocery store. Mr. Pederson anticipates more high-end restaurants and boutiques as a result of the AJ's so he has added an additional 50 parking spaces. To provide a more architecturally pleasing façade to the AJ's, the size of the tower has been increased from 28 feet to 32 feet. None of these additional changes caused the most impacted homeowners any major concern. Therefore, the Board will continue its current stance towards the development, which is that it is an acceptable compromise.
- Mike Simpson presented the preliminary operating budget for '06-'07 that will be proposed to the new Board at the Annual Meeting. The motion to present dues in the amount of \$152 monthly per homeowner passed unanimously. In addition, he also recommended a Reserve contribution of \$32 per month, which was also passed unanimously.
- Congratulations to Sandy Fox and Lawrence Peacock on their impending nuptials on April 30.
- The results of the Bellasera Survey of its Management Company were provided. Sixty one (17 per cent of all residents) surveys were returned and compiled. Statisticians indicate the relatively low response rate is evidence of indifference to the subject matter by potential respondents.

Bellasera Neighborhood News, April 2011, 5 years ago

- Our guards have informed us that some vendors are annoyed when they have to sign in at the front gate, and
 are somewhat confrontational with the guards when the vendor isn't simply waived in. Please inform your vendors that this is private property and they must register with the guards to enter. Also, please instruct them
 that they cannot piggyback in through the back gate. We do have the right to suspend access to the community to any vendor that is abusive to our guards or trespasses. Clearly, an unauthorized entry is a trespass.
- It is a violation of our Design Guidelines to install a satellite dish without first submitting an application for approval to the Modifications Committee. Our Design Guidelines state that the location of the antenna or other device must be designed to assure the minimal visual intrusion possible (i.e., is located in a manner that minimizes visibility from the street or an adjacent Lot and preserves the Community Wide Standard, without precluding reception of a quality signal, or unreasonably increasing the cost of the antenna or device. A number of residents have ignored the requirements and installed satellite dishes on the walls between Lots without prior Committee approval, in locations close to the front of the house, and clearly visible from the street. I doubt there are no other locations in a yard that will work just as well. I spent the extra \$125 to have it installed on a post in my side yard well below the top of the wall so that it cannot be seen from the front street or by my next door neighbor. I also doubt that anyone living in this subdivision can claim that \$125 \$150 extra to place the dish on a post is an unreasonable amount.—Dennis Carson
- A reminder that we have an informal "lending library" in our clubhouse sitting area, where you may find some
 interesting reads. It always includes some previous best sellers (fiction), various non-fiction texts, and a lot of
 "trade" (paperback novels). Residents can either keep their "finds", or return them to the clubhouse bookshelves when finished. And please consider donating some of your own favorites, to be shared with your

April in the Garden

Signs Of Spring

We experience many signs of spring such as the culmination of Spring Training, March Madness or even the early egress of our winter visitors. Of course, I will concede that theses "signs" don't have the same impact on everyone. However, in April, everyone has to be aware and affected by the colors, smells and sounds of our desert coming alive! Desert "bean" trees (such as blue palo verdes, catclaw acacias, and mesquites) will begin to open their yellow to creamy blooms and it won't be long before our community will be awash in corridors of yellow. The cacti will begin to bloom as well, with a few of

the prickly pears, chollas, and hedgehogs starting off. By the end of the month, some saguaro cacti will open their big, white flowers. Of course there are some unwelcome signs. As the days lengthen and warm up, reptiles become more visible and it's time to watch for rattlesnakes.

Planting

Although your summer planting should be nearly finished, you still have time to add life to your garden. Just remember to choose native plants or plants that are adapted to our high temperatures and alkaline soils. This is a good month for transplanting:

- Tropical plants like Bougainvillea and Lantana.
- Desert-adapted trees, shrubs, groundcovers, vines, ornamental grasses, perennials, cacti and succulents.
- Citrus Trees- Remember, dwarf only and they need to be in the rear of your property.
- Herbs- Transplant warm-season favorites, including basil, lavender, rosemary and sage.
- Warm-Season Veggies-Sow seeds for black-eyed peas, cantaloupe, cucumbers, jicama, lima beans, okra, peanuts and summer squashes, such as crookneck, pattypan and zucchini.

Warm Season Annual Flowers

These last few months have certainly been a struggle for winter-growing annuals with warm temperatures and no rain. So, I suggest you give up on them and plan to brighten your patio with warm season flowers. Nurseries should soon be providing good choices. Some suggestions are:

- Celosia Gaillardia Globe amaranth Portulaca Gazania Zinia Verbina
- Lisianthus Madagascar periwinkle Marigold Petunia

If you have doubts about what to choose, local nurseries are always glad to help.

Pruning

As emphasized last month, pruning should be done to maintain plant health (remove dead, damaged or diseased portions, cross branching, etc.), to highlight the "natural" shape of the plant, to train a young plant, and to eliminate hazards. With this in mind, April is a good month for pruning as follows:

- Continue to prune evergreen trees.
- Lightly prune your Mesquites and Palo Verdes after bud break or after flowering.
- Pruning newly planted trees and shrubs is **not recommended** and in fact can be detrimental. However, corrective pruning of broken or torn branches and/or limbs can be done at planting time. Save other pruning activities for the second or third year.
- Continue to prune summer and fall flowering shrubs by mid-month including:
 - -Texas Sages -Yellow Bells -Lantana -Turpentine Bush
 - -Mexican-honeysuckle Sky Flower Black Dalea

Create a Hummingbird Habitat

Hummingbirds have long been drawn to the desert landscape, where colorful blooms entice their visits. In Arizona, 18 hummingbird species have been identified according to Southeastern Arizona Bird Observatory (SABO). Most species fly to Mexico for the winter, although Anna's and Costa's hummers are year-around residents in the Phoenix area. You can draw these flying gems to your yard by implementing the following habitat enhancements:

Grow their favorites—Hummers regularly plunder nectar from red, pink and orange flowers. Their long, narrow bills are best-suited for probing into such tubular or trumpet flower shapes as aloe, chuparosa, desert honeysuckle, hummingbird mint and salvia. Avoid use of pesticides—Pesticides are lethal to hummers. Although they may be the world's tiniest birds, they also have hearty appetites. In addition to nectar, they require protein-rich insects to maintain their high-speed lifestyle. Approximately 40 percent of adult diets consist of insects; nestlings consume up to 2,000 insects daily. Halt pesticide use, and allow hummingbirds (and other species) to perform pest-patrol duties in your yard.

Offer fresh water—Add a feature with running or dripping water. Situate it in front of a window or near a patio area where you can observe hummers darting in and out for a quick dip. It should be placed in an open area where predators can't lie in wait beneath

shrubbery.

Plant a perch—Hummingbirds are territorial and like safe perches on which to rest and survey their domains. Trees and shrubs create shelter, nesting sites and food in the form of flower nectar and insects. Low-water-use blooming trees that hummingbirds frequent include foothills palo verde, cascalote and desert willow. Excellent shrub choices for bird habitats include Arizona rosewood, barberry and jojoba.

Provide nectar year-round—First make a list of when your existing landscape vegetation blooms. Then supplement with some of the favored hummingbird flora shown below to fill in any gaps. Note how adding just a handful of well-chosen plants means four seasons of nectar for hummers, as well as colorful blossoms for you to enjoy.

Plants that Attract Hummingbirds

Spring: Ocotillo, Penstemon, Aloe, Red eremophila (emu), Chuparosa, Desert willow, Red yucca, Baja fairy duster, Orange bells.

Summer: Hummingbird trumpet, Desert willow, Red yucca, Baja fairy duster, Orange bells.

Fall: Hummingbird trumpet, Chuparosa, Desert willow, Red yucca, Baja fairy duster, Orange bells.

Winter: Aloe, Red eremophila (emu), Chuparosa, Baja fairy duster, Orange bells.

Miscellaneous

<u>Feed Citrus</u>- Fertilize trees with their second feeding of the year this month or next. Apply one-third of the tree's total annual nitrogen requirement. Water deeply after spreading fertilizer.

<u>Roses</u>- During spring's peak bloom period, feed and water to promote continued flowering. Apply fertilizer every two weeks until the heat of summer begins. Water twice per week, when temperatures are below 80 degrees, increasing to three times weekly when temperatures are above 80 degrees or conditions are windy, which can dry out foliage and blooms.

Rosemary- Spring growth should be well underway and, following the blossoming of its vivid blue-violet flowers, it can be safely trimmed back. Note: rosemary does very well here in Bellasera and, remember, it is a herb that finds its way into many recipes.

Did You Know?

National Arbor Day is April 29- This day is set aside to celebrate trees. Just a reminder, trees increase home values, improve air quality, provide shade, lower surrounding temperatures, attract wildlife, stymie strong winds and lower utility costs

Timely Pruning Can Produce A Second Round Of Flowers. This is especially true of penstemon. Try pruning the flowering stalks back just as the flowers begin to fade and you will stimulate another flush of colorful blooms.

April Fool's Day. The origin is somewhat sketchy. But did you know, the French call April 1 *Poisson d'Avril*, or "April Fish." French children sometimes tape a picture of a fish on the back of their schoolmates, crying "Poisson d'Avril" when the prank is discovered.

Note: Once again the plant of the month gets short shrift.
