2016 Annual Meeting Review

The 2016 Annual Meeting of the Bellasera Community Association was held on Sunday, April 17 at 2:00 p.m. at the Bellasera clubhouse. A quorum was established by 211 mail-in and delivered ballots, a record for a regular annual meeting. We thank the many residents who attended in person. Of the five (5) candidates for three (3) open Board positions, **Richard Hoffman**, **Dave Reid** and **Craig Johnson** were re-elected to new two-year terms. At the Board meeting following Annual Meeting, the following Officers were elected: **Richard Hoffman** – President; **Guy Yates** – Vice President; **David Reid** – Treasurer; **Dennis Carson**– Secretary; **Craig Johnson** — Director.

David Reid – Treasurer – gave a presentation with respect to the Association's finances. The Association's finances are in excellent shape and the budget for the upcoming fiscal year was discussed. Due to anticipated increases in operating and maintenance expenses resulting from increased costs from our primary vendors, the budget for the upcoming fiscal year requires a 2.9% increase in quarterly association dues for the upcoming fiscal year – or a quarterly increase of \$16 from \$555 per quarter to \$571 per quarter beginning on July 1. The Board approved and adopted the proposed budget at the Board meeting following the Annual Meeting. We thank the members of the Budget & Finance Committee and our Community Manager, AAM, for their on-going efforts in monitoring the finances of the Association, including our Reserves, which now total almost \$1.3 Million.

Richard Hoffman – **President** - reported that the biggest accomplishments this past year were:

Road and Culvert Repairs and Maintenance. The scheduled maintenance and repair of our roads, which included the cleaning and filling of some of the cracks in our streets, some minor isolated asphalt repair and the cleaning of our major culverts and drains (which had not been done since our community was originally developed) was completed by our contractor late last year. Accomplished under the supervision of our outside technical Road Consultant on time, with minimal disruption and within budget. Our roads are the community's most significant capital asset and the most significant item in our Reserve Budget, comprising more than 80% of our future projected capital expenditures. Bellasera's Ad Hoc Roads Committee and outside technical Roads Consultant have concluded that the roads are structurally sound. With regular recommended maintenance, repair and, when required, replacement, the Board is confident current funding assumptions are adequate to cover these costs for the foreseeable future. There should be no need to increase homeowner assessments or to consider any special assessments on account of anticipated road costs and expenses.

New Treadmills and Exercise Bicycles in the Clubhouse. Four new updated Life Fitness treadmills and three new Life Fitness exercise bicycles were installed in the clubhouse exercise area last year.

Upcoming Projects -

Tennis Court Resurface and Repair. – At the Board meeting following the Annual Meeting, the Board accepted and approved a proposal to resurface, refurbish and repair our two tennis courts, such work to commence sometime in July. The tennis court which immediately abuts the Dog Park requires the most significant work, a total resurface and refurbish of the playing surface, although both courts will be repainted and re-striped. This work should take approximately 2-3 weeks, weather permitting, during which both tennis courts will be closed. We will issue an advance notice of the beginning of the work in the next newsletter.

Signs of Summer

What events or images remind you that summer is not far away? Here in the Sonoran Desert, signs of summer become more apparent this month, some of them obvious while others, a little more subtle. We all have favorites that we relate to. Try these out:

•You deal with less traffic as our winter visitors begin to fade away. Of course some would argue that our population has grown so much that the impact on traffic is less each year.

•Our local establishments start to advertise Happy Hour as the tourist trade slows down.

- The Bellasera population starts to shrink as some of our neighbors head for their summer refuges.
- •Our quail have paired off and you'll soon witness families scampering across the streets, hoping everyone pays attention to the 25 MPH speed limit.
- •Reptiles are back. I'm sure you've all noticed the reemergence of lizards along with the occasional snake.
- You had to turn on the air-conditioner.
- ·You packed away all your long pants.
- ·School will soon be out.

Transitional Month

May is our traditional transition month into summer and our recent warm weather confirmed that. We will likely see our first day over 100°F and have a month that is mostly clear, dry and hot.

Our community will be awash in color as many of our plants and trees will reach their flowering peak. This is an important month in that you need to pay attention to *maintenance/upkeep tasks*, although there is still an open window for some *selective planting* which I'll also cover.

What to Plant

<u>Warm-Season Vegetables</u>- A variety can be sowed from seeds including cantaloupe, okra, black-eyed peas, Tran Armenian cucumbers, and yard long beans. You can also transplant sweet potatoes and Jerusalem artichokes. **Note:** Okra is in the same family as hibiscus and hollyhock and tall-growing okra (3-6 feet tall) produces large lobed leaves and hibiscus-like flowers, which add beauty to summer vegetable gardens.

<u>Succulents-</u> May through the summer is the perfect time to plant warm season succulents. Remember, many plant families make up the succulent species, the best known being cactus. Virtually all cacti (or cactuses) are succulents, but many succulents are not cactus.

When transplanting cacti and succulents, mark either the south or west side and plant facing the orientation you marked to avoid the burning of tender tissues. Most nurseries will mark the side of the container to help you determine proper planting orientation. However, if the original orientation is not known, newly planted cacti and succulents need to be covered with shade cloth if the plant surface appears to yellow or pale suddenly. Use a shade cloth rated between 30-60% as anything higher will block most of the sunlight and will not be suitable for your cacti and succulents. You may need to keep the shade cloth on the plant for the duration of the summer.

Remember: Wait a week after planting your cacti and succulents before watering to minimize the chance of rot. After the initial irrigation of your succulents, allow the soil to dry out and water every 10-14 days. Cacti need to be watered once more after initial watering during the month, but allow the soil to dry out between watering.

<u>Citrus Tree</u> —Consider planting a *miniature* lemon or lime tree (in your backyard of course). May is an excellent month to add any desert adapted or native tree.

<u>Ocotillo</u> - Plant your Ocotillo from March through May as these are the ideal months to achieve greater transplanting success. This is a woody shrub, not a cactus and therefore is not a succulent plant and should not be treated as such. Most mature Ocotillos found in nurseries have been salvaged directly from the desert.

Maintenance

Cactus

•If pruning your **prickly-pears** or **chollas** to maintain size, for propagation or to remove a damaged or diseased stem, prune at the joint or segment. Use a sharp, clean pruning tool and spray tool periodically with a 70% alcohol solution to prevent infection.

•If the pruned stem is to be used for propagation, allow the cutting to dry out for a week before planting.

Water Stress Look for signs of water stress exhibited in cacti and warm-season growing succulents. A few symptoms to look for include:

Shriveled or shrinking stems and/or leaves,

•Pale green to yellow epidermis (skin).

•Wilted or limp stems and fallen pads. This occurs in many prickly-pears.

Keep in mind there are winter-growing succulents that can exhibit the signs of water stress, but are actually going dormant for the summer season. It is imperative you do not overwater these winter-growing succulents during this time. Continue to remove spent stalks of aloes, agaves and other succulents.

Trees

May is a good time to pay some attention to your trees. Specifically:

- •Pruning- Lightly prune desert legumes (like palo verde or mesquite) removing dead limbs and small crossing branches. Delay hard-pruning until later in the summer as it will encourage a heavy regrowth which will make them unstable and prone to toppling over during monsoon season.
- •Stakes- If you added stakes to trees that you planted in the fall, it is time to take them away.

 Expect the tree to lean at first, especially if it is small, but, as it gains strength, it will correct itself quickly.

 •Watering- Increase the watering of newly planted or young trees to maintain a watering depth of 3 feet. This may
- •Watering- Increase the watering of newly planted or young trees to maintain a watering depth of 3 feet. This may mean watering once a week if the temperatures are already hot or if the soil drains quickly.

Vegetable Garden

Clean up cool-season veggie and herb gardens-As annual plants end their life cycles, let a few remain to flower and go to seed. Their pretty blossoms are edible and attract beneficial insects to pollinate your summer garden. The following self-sow readily (or you can clip dried seed heads to save): arugula, bok choy, broccoli, cilantro, dill, lettuce, mustard and parsley. Pull, chop and toss spent plants into the compost pile. If plants had disease or pest problems, dispose of them in the trash.

Mulch for Summer-Layer 3 to 4 inches of organic matter (compost, bark chips, shredded leaves) around the bases of plants and on the tops of containers and garden beds. Mulch maintains soil moisture, reduces soil temperature and inhibits weeds. As mulch breaks down, it releases nutrients into the soil.

Have You Ever?

Save seeds- If you haven't, here's how:

- •Allow flowers of cool-season annuals to dry and go to seed.
- •As seeds begin to drop naturally, hold a paper bag or container beneath the dry seeds and tap them into it. Or, tie a paper bag over flower heads to catch falling seeds.
- Punch a few holes in the bag to allow air circulation. Collect seeds on dry, sunny days.
- If seeds are exposed to moisture, spread them on newspaper to dry for a week.
- Remove any stems or leaves before storing in an airtight container in a cool, dry place.

Did You Notice?

In addition to the obvious "bloomers", the iconic Saguaro and the majestic Ironwood will be blooming. The Saguaro flowers open in the evening and will remain open throughout the following day. Many animals and insects are attracted to the white, fruit-scented flowers. The Ironwood will produce blush pink to white, pea-like flowers that are also sweetly scented and attractive to many animals and insects. Spring-blooming perennials such as Penstemons, Brittlebush Globemallow Fleabane, and Golden Columbine should be producing seed. Allow them to produce seed before pruning spent flowering stems. The seed is a valuable food source for many animals.
