

Bellasera in the Rear View Mirror

A look back in Bellasera history that may bring back memories for long-time residents and be of interest to those not living in our community 5 & 10 years ago. <u>Clips</u> from past newsletters follow.

Bellasera Neighborhood News, June 2006, 10 years ago

- A new bank is planned for the southwest corner of Lone Mountain and Scottsdale Roads. That's just west, across the road from the proposed Pederson shopping cen-ter, now with AJ's as the anchor tenant, planned for a fall 2007 opening. Pederson anticipates submitting their revised plans to the City's Design Review Board early in June, and will make copies available to interested Bellasera residents.
- A Safeway Service Station is proposed near the north entrance to the Summit Shopping Center. A little further north, on the southeast corner of Scottsdale & Dove Valley Roads (south of Winfield), preliminary plans are for a community of 120 luxury town homes.
- A nice early morning hike begins across the road from the Bellasera Lone Mountain Road gate. Heading east, follow the City of Scottsdale Trail System markers to Hayden Road, then north along Hayden. Just outside the Whisper Rock Estates entrance, head east on Ranch Road. When the road ends, head east again along the Whisper Rock perimeter wall. The trail goes all the way to Pima Road, about four miles round trip. Now it's time for breakfast!
- A big 'thank you' to the entire community for your patience and cooperation with the asphalt road re-pair to the
 entrance and back gate. We hope you now enjoy the smoother rides. Eventually the roads in the community
 will be repaired. Notifications will be sent out ahead of time just as this was.
- From time to time we receive concerns that there is no Community Manager present at all times. We would like to reiterate that we are a part-time management company. There was a long-standing full-time management paradigm. Bellasera has a strong representation of part time residents; it wouldn't be a community without them. Those who are here part time understand the juggling between both properties and constant maintenance. That being said, we are no different. We multitask, juggle projects, and strive to be as accessible as possible to homeowners. We also update our progress by reporting in the newsletter, Board meetings, and in the clubhouse with postings. We understand that there are many residents that do not frequent the clubhouse, therefore we have decided to now post our big updates periodically in the mailbox bulletin boards. That way, we hope to reach the entire community.

Bellasera Neighborhood News, June 2011, 5 years ago

- The Board has reluctantly accepted the resignation of Board Member Anne Chernis, effective June 7, 2011. Anne and husband Morrie have sold their Bellasera home and are moving to downtown Scottsdale. During Anne's time in our community, she has served on the Activities Committee, Modifications Committee and Board of Directors. She will be greatly missed by her Bellasera friends and the Association. As the result of Anne's resignation the Board declared a vacancy. The term of this vacant seat runs until the next Board election in April, 2012 -- approximately 10 months. Several of our past and current committee members have graciously stepped forward and volunteered to fill the vacated Director's seat during this interim period.
- At the Board of Directors Meeting on Thursday, May 26, the Board appointed Dennis Soeffner to fill the vacancy, effective June 7. Dennis comes to us with experience as Secretary and later Vice President of the Board of Directors of Troon North. He has 30 years of solid corporate experience with Anheuser-Busch, and is a member of our Communications Committee.
- Front Gate: Sometimes our homeowners choose to enter the community through the visitors' side of the front
 gate and are annoyed when the gate attendant delays their entry by logging them in. Our security system requires that ALL vehicles entering the visitors' side be logged in before the gate can be opened. Please be respectful of our hardworking staff who are just doing their job.
- Parking: "Mystery Vehicles" are sometimes left in the clubhouse parking lot over night and our management staff must play amateur detective to locate the owners. Bellasera policy is that overnight parking of vehicles in the lot is allowed only with the PRIOR written approval of management staff or front gate attendant and will be allowed for no longer than a 3-day period. Violators will be charged \$50 per day and/or be towed. We really don't want to do that to you or your visitors. Please let us know of your plans in advance. Also, any person who occupies a vehicle in our parking lot as a residence is violating BCA rules and may be charged with trespassing.

June in the Garden

Summer Is Here...Be Prepared!

This is the third year in a row that May has provided a surprise for us with pleasant temperatures, especially nighttime, along with a little rain as an added sweetener. It was a delightful month for us and a bonus for our gardens as evidenced by the health and beauty of our trees and plants which reached their flowering peak this past month. I'm not sure you could have found better weather anywhere else in the U.S. as our winter

visitors who hung around a little longer certainly found out.

May did not provide us with much of a transition into summer, but June is famously hot and dry and usually without a drop of moisture. So, in caring for your garden this month, let's think about the challenges presented by our hot weather and the tasks you need to perform to get a good start in coping with our summer months ahead. I've outlined them below.

Watering Guidelines

This should be your first priority as proper irrigation to your plants is crucial during the summer months, especially June, as it is normally the driest month of the year. As the temperatures rise, plant watering needs will also increase. Now is the time to adjust your watering schedule for the summer.

Watering guidelines can be complicated as the amount of water and watering frequency depends on many factors such as:

- •Soil Type •Weather (temperature, humidity, rainfall, etc.) •Microclimate
- •Plant Size and Species •Newly planted or established in the landscape (two years or more) However, once again, let's go with some simple guidelines:

<u>How Much</u> - Ensure that you are deep watering your landscape plants to prevent salt build-up. Use a soil probe or a long-handled screw-driver to determine how deeply water is penetrating. A simple guideline is the **1-2-3 Rule:**

- 1 foot deep for small, shallow rooted plants.
- 2 feet deep for shrubs.
- 3 feet deep for trees.

<u>How Often</u> – An often asked question and, in addition to the irrigation guidelines below, it is important to take into consideration weather, soil conditions, plant maturity and how well the plant has adapted to the desert. **Remember-** let soil dry between waterings.

7-21 days - Desert-adapted trees

7-14 days - Non-Desert adapted trees

7-21 days - Desert shrubs

5-7 days - Non–Desert adapted shrubs

Other considerations:

•Observe plants regularly for signs of water stress. Some signs to look for include: wilting,

curling leaves, yellowing or falling of older leaves, and dead stems.

•Recently planted **native or desert-adapted trees** should be watered once a week if temperatures are over 100 degrees. If temperatures are over 108 degrees water every 2-3 days.

•Natural rainfall may be adequate for most well-established **cacti** and **succulents**. However, if rainfall is insufficient; water may be needed at least once for cactus and twice for succulents during the month of June. Always allow soil to dry out between each irrigation cycle. Water your cacti and succulents to a depth of at least 8-12 inches.

Ineffective water management is the number one cause of death of landscape plants in the Valley, and, believe it or not, it is more frequently from over watering than under watering. You can reduce your water bill and take better care of your plants it you water **slowly** (prevents run off), **deeply** and **infrequently** (let the soil dry between watering).

Maintenance Tasks

<u>Roses</u>- Cut back on fertilizing established roses to encourage plants to slow down for the hot summer. Water deeply as temperatures climb. Hose off plants in the early morning to increase humidity and control spider mites

<u>Mulch Landscape Plants</u> -Apply mulch to the ground around heat sensitive plants keep the roots cooler and prevent evaporation.

<u>Herbs</u>- May need to be watered twice weekly and vegetables may need to be watered every 2-3 days. Provide shade to your herbs and vegetables if needed.

<u>Citrus</u>- Fruit drop should be finished by this month and new fruits should be forming. If you didn't do so last month, **fertilize**. The next time is August/September prior to fruit sizing time.

<u>Palms</u>- Prune palms when flower spathes show or delay pruning until after the palm has finished flowering to prevent infestation of Palm Flower caterpillars. If palms are pruned in the spring, leave the top five rows of peels so the caterpillars have a place to hide. Cut off spent blooms to stimulate rebloom.

<u>Fertilization</u> – Do not fertilizing your desert-adapted landscape plants during the summer months. Fertilizing will cause excessive, luxuriant growth that requires more water and new growth is too tender to take the excessive heat and sun exposure. Wait until next spring to fertilize, if needed. <u>Plants in containers</u>- These plants should be watered daily, preferably early in the morning. Be sure the water flows out the bottom of the pot with each watering.

What to Plant

It is recommended that most plants be planted in the fall or spring. However, if you have a need to plant during the summer months, watering may need to be more frequent and you must be diligent about observing your newly planted plants for signs of water stress. Some suggestions:

<u>Warm-Season Vines-</u> Many varieties (e.g. Yellow Orchid-vine, Queen's Wreath, Yellow Morning Glory-vine) can be planted during the summer months. Water immediately after planting and monitor the moisture for the next few days to keep the root ball from drying out. Water newly planted native and desert-adapted vines twice to three times weekly to a depth of at least a foot. Gradually extend the time between watering and monitor plants regularly for signs of water stress.

Herbs- This is a good month to plant herbs as they are widely available in small pots right now and inexpensive (\$3-\$4). You'll find them in grocery stores as well as nurseries. My favorite is Basil. Basil performs well in pots with consistent soil moisture and morning sun.

Warm-Season Veggies- Sow seeds for black-eyed peas and okra. Transplant sweet potato slips.

Native and Desert-Adapted Trees- . After planting your trees, they should be watered immediately and the moisture monitored for the next few days to keep the root ball from drying out. Newly planted native and desert-adapted trees may need to be watered more frequently until established. It can take up to 3-5 years for trees to become established in the landscape.

Have You Noticed?

<u>Agaves</u>- Many Agaves are flowering right now. Most Agaves are *monocarpic*, i.e. they produce flowers and seeds only once and then they will die. Many agaves can also reproduce asexually through the formation of bulbils and/or pups. Bulbils are developed on the flowering stalk and pups are formed from underground stems. We have a few striking examples, with tall stalks, in Bellasera right now. If you have a dying Agave, look for the "pups" surrounding it.

Ironwood Tree- One of the largest and longest-lived Sonoran Desert plants is putting on quite a show this year with its lavender-pink blossoms that you cannot miss. The Ironwood tree found only in the Sonoran Desert can reach 45 feet in height and easily live for hundreds of years. The Ironwood is known as a "nurse plant". It provides a safe place for seed germination, and protects seedlings from extreme cold. It also protects saplings from the damaging effects of the sun. Thorny, low-hanging branches shelter young saguaro. The wood of the Ironwood is one of the hardest and heaviest woods in the world and is considered to be non-biodegradable. We have many examples of these very old trees (>150 years) throughout Bellasera, especially in our washes. The abundant flowers and fruit on display this year only happens once or twice per decade.
