<u>Tennis Courts Repair and Resurfacing to Begin on July 5</u>. Major repairs to and resurfacing of Bellasera's two tennis courts will begin on Tuesday, July 5 and, weather permitting, should be completed by the end of July. During construction both courts will be out of service. We will notify the community when the work is completed and the 'new' courts are again available for play.

No Board Meetings in July and August. As is customary, the Board will not formally meet during the months of July and August. If the situation requires, the Board may act by written consent in lieu of a meeting. The Board will resume regular monthly meetings in September.

Dog-Coyote Confrontation

On June 24, residents on Moura Drive residents were awakened by howling coyotes and screaming dogs. Resident **Jeannine Dittoe** came outside to see the coyotes closing in on two large Husky dogs. She called on a couple neighbors to help scare the coyotes away, which they finally did. Bellasera residents didn't recognize the dogs and assumed they came from the Mary Sharon Drive area (Lone Mountain Vista).

A couple hours later the dogs reappeared, hot, tired, thirsty and with Cholla on them. The larger Huskies were apparently able to fend off the coyotes. A landscaper nearby was able to rope in one of the dogs and put it in **Jeannine's** backyard. The dog went into her pool and she gave him water. The other dog took off into the desert again.

The dog in **Jeannine's** yard was hollering up a storm and eventually drew the second dog back over into her neighbor's yard. The residents finally corralled the returning dog and called Maricopa Animal Control. After an hour animal control picked up the dogs. Both appeared to be well maintained, but had no collar or microchip (the officer scanned one of them). The dogs were taken away after 4 hours of running for their lives in the hot desert.

Bellasera Neighborhood News, July 2006, 10 years ago

- Along with the triple digit heat that is now upon us, there is the very real threat of fire. It takes very little for the
 dry desert brush to erupt into a major inferno. Please be sure you and your service contractors are acting responsibly when it comes to operating equipment, using BBQs and fire pits, as well as cigarette smoking.
- We continue to hear comments about the lack of availability of our community association staff. We want to
 remind everyone that in order to keep costs down, we've gone from employing full-time staff to part-time staff.
 Accordingly, they are not as available as they were in the past. We encourage everyone to use the various
 communication methods we've set up to advise us of problems in the community (phone message, e-mail or
 suggestion box). We will respond quickly to your concerns.
- There are two positions open for application on the Bellasera Board of Directors, as it expands to seven members. All committees need additional members, too. See the list of committees on page 8.
- A nice early morning hike begins across the road from the Bellasera Lone Mountain Road gate. Heading east, follow the City of Scottsdale Trail System markers across Hayden Road, then continue east along Lone Mountain Road to Granite Reef Road. Carefully cross commuter-busy Lone Mountain Road, heading south on Granite Reef. When the road ends, you may follow one or more of several trails that skirt the east side of Lone Mountain.

- Our regular quarterly night lighting inspection will take place in July. Please check the lights on your front yard trees and garage. Our rules require garage lights to be illuminated from dusk to dawn and front yard trees must be illuminated from dusk to midnight daily.
- New Legislation You have probably heard the Arizona Legislature has passed new legislation affecting Planned Communities, taking effect on July 20. Arizona's Open Meeting Law is one of the most important of the new laws. Bellasera already complies with most requirements of this law, so we must only make minor changes in our procedures to be compliant with the revisions. As a Homeowner with an interest in our community, it is important that you understand the concept of open meetings.
- All meetings of the Board of Directors and Committees are open to all Homeowners or to their representatives, designated in writing by the Homeowner as such. The only exception to this is Executive Sessions where the Board may discuss certain sensitive issues specified by the law. Owners or their representatives are allowed to speak at open meetings and the dates and times of meetings are posted in the newsletter and on the bulletin boards. The Board and Committees conduct the business of the Association. You're invited to attend and watch your Association at work.
- The Bellasera hiking season ended on Wednesday, May 25, with a great hike around Woods Canyon Lake on the Rim above Payson. We had beautiful weather and were able to see a variety of wildlife as we passed through the cool pines along the lake. Our special treat was the sighting of a nesting Bald Eagle. The nest was high in a dead pine tree and the eagle was proudly displayed in the nest. A good time was had by all.

July in the Garden

Yes, It's Hot! But Relief is in Sight...For You and Your Garden

As expected, June brought us hot weather but exceeded expectations as temperatures broke records. Well, the heat will certainly continue into July but we can hopefully look forward to some relief with the arrival of the monsoon. Humidity will start arriving from the Gulf of California which will bring us thunderstorms, increased humidity and blowing dust.

Gardening is almost at a standstill this month, but there are a number of tasks that you need to address in order to help your garden cope. Of course *watering* is on the top of the list which I covered in detail last month, so I'll simply do a quick overview. This is also a critical month for **pruning** native desert trees, so I'll go through my annual treatise on this subject. I'll cover both of these topics below as well as some others.

Watering

Last month I discussed **How Much** and **How Often** in some detail. I'd like to add to that with some useful (hopefully) tips:

Water in the Morning- Plants can uptake water more easily in the early morning as opposed to being watered during the day. During the heat of the day, plants have to devote much of their resources to handling the stress of the heat and cannot uptake water efficiently. Therefore, it's best to water early in the morning so that they are replenished with water and ready to face the excessive evaporation that will occur with temperatures over 115 degrees.

Provide Extra Water- Irrigate shrubs and groundcovers in the early morning hours for an extra 1/2 hour when temperatures are forecast over 115 degrees.

Annual Flowers- If you have planted some annual flowers, they are more than likely in pots where soil temperatures heat up to triple digits, and roots will "cook" without adequate moisture. Containers in full sun often require daily watering. Water should soak through the soil and drain out the bottom of the pot with each application to prevent salt buildup, which can kill plants over time. The frequent watering needed in summer, unfortunately, also leaches nutrients out of the soil. Therefore, a slow-release or organic fertilizer is recommended as they are less likely to burn plant roots in the summer heat compared to a faster-acting chemical fertilizer.

Trees- Established native or desert-adapted trees should be watered at least once a month if no rainfall. If the temperature is over 108 degrees, water your native or desert-adapted trees at least twice during the month. Always allow soil to dry out between each irrigation cycle. Water at least 3 feet deep for your trees.

Native Tree Maintenance

Pruning- Summer is the recommended time to prune native desert trees because they are actively growing and can recover quickly. Things to consider before undertaking this task:

- Good pruning is both an art and a science.
- The result should be a safe, healthy and beautiful tree that complements its natural growth habit.
- If you prune your trees yourself, familiarize yourself with proper pruning principals and techniques. There is a lot of literature available, including the internet.
- If you hire someone to prune your trees, be sure they understand proper pruning principals

and techniques.

- Remove no more than one-quarter of a tree's branches in a year. Cutting
 off too much foliage "starves" the plant by reducing its ability to synthesize and
 can leave it susceptible to disease.
- It's advisable to hold off any pruning for at least one year after planting. Two years is even better. If you allow as many branches as possible to survive, the tree will develop strength and trunk girth.

Keep in mind that the longer you wait to prune your mesquites, the higher the risk of wind damage during the monsoon.

Desert Plants Fruits are Ripening, Which Means...It's Bean Pod Time!

The fruits of many desert plants are continuing to ripen such as Prickly-pears and other cacti. In addition, Ironwood, Palo Verde and Mesquite trees are also loaded with fruit in the form of bean pods. These three native trees are certainly dominant in Bellasera as a good number of them were uprooted and saved during home construction in order be replanted in your front yard. Of course these "fruits" result in a cleanup challenge for us.

Note: There are four species of green-barked Palo Verde trees: the Blue Palo Verde, the Foothills Palo Verde, the Mexican Palo Verde and the Palo Brea. All four produce a different bean pod.

What To Plant

Every July I must remind you that Native Americans traditionally sowed summer crops right before the start of the monsoons. The desert's brief summer season of extra rainfall and humidity promoted seed germination and encouraged plants to grow quickly. Native crop choices for today's gardeners include:

•amaranth •devil's claw •melons •squash • tepary beans

Palms and Bermuda grass lawns—Continue planting through summer, as both establish quickly in the heat.

Warm-Season Vegetables - Sow seeds for:

• black-eyed peas •cantaloupe •corn • miniature pumpkin •okra •squash
All require careful attention to soil moisture throughout their growing season. Replenish mulch as needed to help maintain moisture and reduce soil temperature in the root zone.

Miscellaneous

- Fertilization Do not fertilize until the weather cools.
- Check your drip watering system. Verify the ground humidity around all plants. Check your drippers periodically to see if any popped out now that heat is making the hoses softer.
- **Protect potted plants** Soil temperatures may exceed 150 degrees in direct sunlight, basically "cooking" roots. Move containers into morning sun/afternoon shade locations or cover with shade cloth.
- •Prevent citrus rinds from cracking—If trees are water-stressed in summer, their rinds will crack and split later in the growing season. Rinds become tough without adequate moisture and cannot expand as the fruit swells. To avoid this, water mature citrus trees every 10 to 14 days in summer. Water young trees (in the ground 2 or less years) every 5 to 10 days. Apply water at the drip line (outer canopy edge), and move emitters or hoses outward as the canopy spreads. Water should soak 3 feet deep with each application for mature trees.
