Board Back

<u>Board Resumes Regular Meeting Schedule</u>. After a summer hiatus, the Board resumed its regular monthly meeting schedule in September. Upcoming Board meetings are calendared in each edition of the newsletter. All Board meetings are public and residents and owners are encouraged to attend.

Flood Control Meeting

The Flood Control District of Maricopa County(FCD) conducted a viewing of the preliminary study results for proposed 100-year floodplain revisions in our area.

An open house, open forum format meeting was held on September 20 & 22 at the Horseshoe Trails Elementary School, 5405 E Pinnacle Vista Drive in Phoenix. Property owners were able to talk to representative of the FCD, City of Scottsdale and other agencies involved in the process.

At the meetings property owners in the "Fan 5 & 6 Floodplain Redelineation Area" were able to look at charts depicting current flood plain pattern as established in the mid-1990's, prior to many communities (such as Bellasera) being built compared to the proposed maps. Other charts depicted such items as how the flood hazard modeling and data has developed and refined with an appropriate terminology.

The charts depicted the current designations such as X: not in the flood plain, AE: riverine flooding.

These designations are scheduled for new labels such as AE: riverine flooding and A Flood Plane.

Time frame chart was provided which outlined the time from proposed to final FEMA approval ranging from 2 to 4 years.

So what does all this mean to you? The information may indicate that the revision to the floodplain will potentially affect a property owner's requirement to purchase flood insurance.

Bellasera Neighborhood News, October 2006, 10 years ago

- Do you enjoy walking the desert trails at Bellasera? Do you wonder what construction projects are going on? Do you want to see how your association works behind the scenes? If so, consider becoming a member of the Buildings and Grounds Committee. There is space for three more members for a one-year term.
- Sunday, November 12: Veteran's Day Brunch for veterans and anyone who has served in any capacity in the Armed Forces. Significant others invited. There is no cost to residents.
- Clubhouse. Getting the repairs completed resulting from the roof problems is taking longer than we had hoped due to the rainy weather. By the time this letter gets out to all of you, the fitness room repairs and final stucco and painting on the roof should be completed. The men's shower will take a few more weeks to complete. With any luck, we will get everything done and won't need to make any more major repairs for a long time to come!
- Common Area Painting. We received bids for the work and should be in a position to make a decision at the September 28 Board meeting. If we are able to stay on the present schedule, we should be able to begin work in October. Our thanks to everyone who has either gotten their homes painted or are in the process. We will be making follow up inspections in October and sending out second courtesy notices to those homeowners we believe need to consider painting.

Bellasera Neighborhood News, October 2011, 5 years ago

- The Bellasera Design Guidelines have been revised. Changes appear on page 32, Rain Gutters; page 29, Flagpoles/
 Brackets; Appendix A. The revised document was e-mailed to all residents on September 19, and can be found on our
 web site.
- For the October hike, we want to use a nearby trail and have chosen the Gateway Loop trail in the McDowell-Sonoran Preserve. This trail is a loop of about 4.4 miles with a 680 ft elevation gain. We have done this trail before and everyone enjoyed it. Nice views and a nice rest stop at the high point of the loop. We hope to see more of us there as more residents return to the Valley. Perhaps it will be cooler in a few weeks.
- We have recently replaced our front and back gate opener readers. After 13 years of service and changes in technology, our old ones were obsolete and no longer functioning properly. We will soon begin the transition from our hard, black transponders (gate openers) to a model which will improve our vehicular security. Over time, our security has been breached as non-homeowners have gained possession of our transponders and have used them for unauthorized access to our community. For example: Del Webb distributed transponders to contractors; residents have given them to landscapers or friends; others have moved away and not returned them to us. We encountered a non-resident at our pool who received her transponder from a family member who has not lived here for 5 years. We need to ensure the integrity of our vehicle access system. Our new transponders will be non-transferable. They are battery-free and made of a thin, pliable material which will permanently adhere to the windshield of owner-owned or leased vehicles. When removed, they will cease to operate, thereby eliminating the possibility of being used by unauthorized individuals.

October in the Garden

We Made It!

We got an unexpected dose of wonderful weather at the end of September. Hopefully, the moderate daytime temperatures along with the cool nights and mornings are a preview of coming attractions and we can now expect seven or eight months of moderate, comfortable weather. I think our neighbors, who arrived early from their cooler climate getaways, made the right choice.

This is the Month to Dig In!

In September, we touched on fall planting but emphasized that October is the low desert's (we live in the heart of it) best month to plant just about everything—*trees, shrubs, perennials, ground-covers, vines, ornamental grasses, cacti, succulents, wildflowers, cool-season veggies, herbs and flowers.*Temperatures have abated to a comfortable level, while soil remains sufficiently warm to promote seed germination and root growth. Seven to eight months of moderate temperatures are ahead of us, which will allow plants to establish before summer's heat returns. So forget garden maintenance chores this month and **Dig In!**

What to Plant-Some Suggestions

Cool-Season Vegetables- Why do we call them cool season veggies? They respond to short days and cool nights and they are grown from September through April. So, sow seeds directly into the soil for *peas, root crops (beets, carrots, onions, parsnips, radishes, kohlrabi, turnips), chard and all sorts of leafy greens.* Sow seeds or set out transplants in the cabbage family (bok choy, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower and kale).

In the September column, I included a detailed list of which cool season veggies to plant and when to plant them. You can find the column archived at **azbellasera.org**.

Herbs-Growing herbs are really very easy. If you prefer not to dig, most of them can be easily grown in pots. Also, "starter pots" are available at most grocery stores at a reasonable price.

Sow seeds for: •borage •caraway •chamomile • chives •cilantro •dill •fennel •horehound •lemon •balm •parsley •salad burnet •sorrel

Transplant: •marjoram •mint •oregano •rosemary •thyme •sage.

Spice up culinary options with: •chocolate mint •lemongrass •pineapple sage. **Hint:** Grow mint in containers to control its spreading root system.

Shrubs-Some Recommendations

Here in the Sonoran Desert, we do not get the brilliant fall colors like other areas. However, I would recommend that you consider several shrubs (below) that rise to the occasion.

Heavenly Bamboo - An Asian plant which turns bright red to red- orange in the fall

Firebush - As the weather cools, leaves begin to turn a dark coppery red. They remain this color through the winter.

Beach Vitex - Before this deciduous shrub loses its leaves they turn a dusky purple-red.

Crape Myrtle - Coloring is variable, but most plants turn a reddish hue before they lose their leaves.

Mexican Jumping Bean - This hot weather loving shrub leaves turn a fiery red in late winter.

Copper-leaved Caesalpinia - The small leaves turn from a deep burnished red to a bright golden red through the winter.

Suggestion: Please try and avoid pruning shrubs into absurd shapes.

Rejuvenate Your Flower Beds.....Bring Color to Your Patio.

This past summer has been a real challenge to maintain annuals and, if you suffered through it like I did, now is the time to tear the summer annuals out and rejuvenate your pots. So, bring some color to your surroundings with winter annuals (preferably in pots) as the nurseries will be packed with glorious selections in every size, color, and shape.

To help you, below is an extensive list, with *color info*, along with guidance on *where to plant them* (sun, shade, etc.), Remember, fall flowers need to establish their roots in warm soils. So, starting them now gets a healthy root system developed before the cool fall and cooler winter slows them down.

- •Alyssum: A low growing border plant in white, pink or purple. Full sun to light partial shade.
- **Begonia**: Gives masses of color in *shady spots*, red, pink or white in dark leafed varieties, or a mixture of colors in green leafed types.

- •Calendula: Yellow or orange flowers with dark centers, makes excellent cut flowers. Needs sun.
- •Chrysanthemum paludosum: Miniature daisy flowers cover this low growing annual in a cloud of white. Use for sunny borders.
- **Dianthus**: An array of reds, pinks, violets and white adorn these specially selected Sweet Williams. *Sun or partial shade*.
- Dusty Miller: A foliage plant with silver colored leaves. Full sun to partial shade.
- Geranium: Available in a rainbow of colors. Full sun to partial shade.
- Linaria: Covered in mini snapdragon-shaped flowers of blue, yellow or red. Full sun.
- **Lobelia**: Arizona's favorite border plant for sun or *partial shade*. Deep purple, blue, rose, lilac and mixed colors.
- Ornamental Kale: Great foliage color in predominately purple or white. Full sun.
- Pansy and Viola: The most popular flower for fall and winter, these hardy free blooming plants are available in a wide variety of colors to suit any décor. Pick a sunny spot for best results. Violas will take light shade.
- Petunia: Reds, pinks, whites, burgundy and blues. Full sun.
- **Poppies and Primroses**: These favorites will be ready for you when the weather starts to turn cold. Iceland poppies for bright *sunny spots* and traditional primrose for *shady areas*.
- **Snapdragons**: Taller mid-sized varieties are great for cut flowers or colorful backgrounds. Dwarf types make fantastic borders. Either way, you can't go wrong with their rainbow of colors for *sunny spots*.
- **Stock**: Harmony and Trisomic varieties are very fragrant and make tremendous cut flowers. Midgets make excellent border plants. *Full sun*.

Watering

Yes, it is finally time to cut back on your watering. Reduce watering frequencies as plant needs decrease with shorter, cooler days. Once the temperatures begin dipping below 100° gradually start cutting back water to all plants to begin hardening them off for the winter. Remember, both frequency and duration need to be adjusted gradually. Do not stop cold turkey. Change your irrigation timer to reflect the changes in temperature.

Miscellaneous Tasks

Roses- Resume full fertilizing of established roses as the weather cools.

Landscape Plants- Cut off spent blooms to stimulate re-bloom.

Mesquite Trees- If your Mesquite trees are looking tall and scraggly, take action now to do some corrective pruning. **Prune**- Cut back spring-flowering perennials like *brittlebush*, *globe mallow*, *ruellia*, and groundcovers like *sundrops*, and *trailing bush* hard this month. If the plant is especially leggy or unruly, prune to remove at least 1/3 of the plant or more. After pruning, water well.

Winter lawn—If you choose to overseed warm-season Bermuda grass with cool-season rye grass, do so from mid-October to mid-November, when nighttime temperatures are in the mid-60s (yes, we still have some lawns).

Desert Observations

Desert Broom- Allergy sufferers bemoan the blooming of desert broom, a shrub that colonizes disturbed areas. However, broom flowers are a favorite of hundreds of butterflies, bees, wasps, and beetles.

Our Friendly Skies-Wintering hawks arrive; common raptors include northern harriers, rough-legged and ferruginous hawks, kestrels, Merlins, and prairie falcons. Turkey vultures are mostly gone, but loud groups of common ravens replace them on carrion patrol.
