Board President's Report

- Community Pool Furniture Update. We have also ordered three additional umbrellas for the pool area. Thanks to our volunteers who helped choose the fabric: Dawn Hulej, Risa Newell, Lynn Melman and Janice Lewandowski. With their input and assistance the new cushion covers will sport a more colorful and tasteful appearance. The work will take place over several weeks in stages, so as to minimize any disruption during our busy holiday season.
- New Tennis Courts 'In A Pickle'. A few weeks ago, one of our Board members observed that our newly resurfaced tennis court next to the dog park was "chalked up" to look like a pickle ball court. In addition, the net was lowered and left that way. Just 3 months ago our association spent \$44,360.00 to resurface both courts to enhance the appearance of Bellasera. As a Board, we ask that our residents respect the appearance of our community assets and remember that our association has to pay to clean up incidents such as this. Thank you for your cooperation.
- Lights Out! Get A Letter. It's that time again when our Community Manager and volunteers from our Building & Grounds Committee inspect the community for appearance and violations of our Design Guidelines. This is a regular exercise, although this season we have identified a more than usual number of garage and front yard landscape lights burned out. Those with a burned out light or lights will receive a 'courtesy letter' from our Management Company identifying the problem and asking that it be corrected in due course. In many cases, our homeowners are not aware there is a problem until we notify them. While this may seem to many to be a minor issue and an annoyance, please understand that maintaining the overall appearance of our community is important and contributes to enhancing our property values No one is immune from these requirements. I received such a notice last year for a faulty garage light!

Coyotes 101

(Editor's Note: Beginning this month, and continuing for several months, we'll provide interesting facts about a few of the native creatures with whom we share our space in Bellasera.)

Identifying Features: Coyotes are often mistaken for small to medium sized domestic dogs. They have a long, bushy black-tipped tail, pointed ears and a narrow pointed face. Their fur varies in color, from light brown to grayish. The fur on their belly is usually white.

Adaptations: Coyotes adjust their hunting style to what foods are available. When they hunt small prey alone, they usually stalk it and then pounce. If the prey is larger like a deer, they will often hunt in small packs and work together to kill the prey.

Habitat: Coyotes are known for how well they adapt to different habitats. They can even be found living in and around large cities. In the Sonoran Desert, coyotes can be found in all habitats from desert scrub, grasslands, foothills as well as in populated neighborhoods.

Range: Coyotes can be found throughout North America from eastern Alaska to New England and south into Mexico and Panama.

' Wild Status: Currently the coyote population is stable. They are not listed as threatened or endangered.

Diet: Coyotes are omnivores, which means they will eat or try to eat just about anything. In the Sonoran Desert coyotes vary their diet with the seasons. Cactus fruit, mesquite beans, flowers, insects, rodents, lizards, rabbits, birds, and snakes make up some of their dietary choices.

Predators: The most common enemy that coyotes face is disease. Bears, wolves and mountain lions will also prey upon coyotes. Humans pose problems for coyotes as they try to navigate across our busy roads. Many coyotes are struck and killed by cars every year.

Home: Coyotes have a central den site which is used for rearing the pups and sleeping. They will scent mark the area around the den and defend it from other coyotes. The den can be a burrow dug into the ground, or under a rock outcropping, a tree or a bush. If the area gets disturbed the mother will often move the pups to a safer location.

Life Span: In the wild, coyotes live between 10-14 years. In captivity they are known to live much longer, as many as 20 years.

Size: A desert coyote usually weighs between 15 to 25 pounds. They stand about 25 inches tall and are 4 feet in length.

Quick Facts: Coyotes "sing" as a way to communicate with other coyote families and as a way to keep track of their own family members. Because coyotes are not picky eaters, they have even been known to eat domestic cats and small dogs.

Bellasera in the Rear View Mirror

A look back in Bellasera history. This may bring back memories for long-time residents and be of interest to those not living in our community 5 & 10 years ago. <u>Clips</u> from past newsletters follow.

Bellasera Neighborhood News, December 2006, 10 years ago

- Summitt Shopping Center News. OfficeMax, next door to Target, is now open for business. Cold Stone Creamery shop is no longer at the Summit.
- One of our residents has arranged for a fitness instructor, Monique Rider, to run a class for early birds, 6:00 to 6:50 a.m.
 This would be a co-ed class for all fitness levels, and include cardio and weight training a modified boot camp. Monique would run multi-week sessions, 8 weeks or 10 weeks, 2 or 3 days a week (depending on interest), at a nominal fee (which would be paid in advance).
- Our Manager spends a considerable amount of time inspecting the community for violations of our rules. When she finds a problem, a letter is sent out reminding our residents to comply with the rules they agreed to when they purchased in the community. The more common violations include: (1) parking cars on the streets over night, (2) leaving trash receptacles out beyond trash pickup day, (3) overgrown plant material in yards and (4) not having front yard landscape lights on at night. We've had some residents complain that we were being too "picky" about the rules and others complain that we weren't being diligent enough in enforcing them.
- Last but not least, all the Bellasera residents who volunteer as Board and committee members. Look over the list on page 7. December in the Garden

Winter Is Upon Us!

November was true to form as it brought us seasonal rain along with lower temperatures, a great introduction to December which will usher in our beautiful winter weather. Coincidental with the change in weather is the arrival of the last of our winter residents, in time to enjoy our beautiful climate.

Enjoy Your Surroundings

Our community is beautiful this time of year, attributed mostly to our magnificent gardens whose flowering shrubs (Bougainvillea, Lantana, Bird of Paradise, Honeysuckle and others) are in full bloom and will continue for the next couple of months. And, if our winter

rains continue, many shrubs such as brittlebush, creosote, and ocotillos will sprout bright new leaves adding to the color and vibrancy our surroundings.

Garden Tasks

In December, it's imperative that we review **winter guidelines** for your garden as well as providing advice on **pruning** and **planting** along with a few **holiday tips**.

Winter Guidelines----Temperatures and Rainfall

Our recent weather should emphasize the need to be on the lookout for **frost** and pay attention to the amount and frequency of our **rainfall**. Both are very important factors in maintain a healthy garden for the next few months. I included this in last month's column, but it's worth repeating.

Temperatures- Monitor weather forecasts for possible **freezes** and be prepared to protect **frost** tender plants. Purchase and/or stage your frost protection so that if and when an event occurs, you are prepared. Use a fabric such as N-Sulate (which can be found at various garden centers), burlap or old sheets. Cover cold-tender plants, along with flower and vegetable beds, if temperatures dip.

Rainfall- With normal winter rainfall and temperatures, reduce watering frequency and reset automatic timers along the following guidelines:

Native/Desert Adapted -Trees* (30 to 60 days) -Shrubs (30 to 45 days) -Ground Covers and Vines (21 to 45 days) Non-Native -Trees (14 to 40 days) -Shrubs, ground cover and vines (10 to 14 days)

Plants in containers - May not need watering as frequently as they did a month ago.

-Check before watering to be sure the top inch of the soil is dry.

Please note that the watering frequencies and ranges are affected by rainfall amounts. Miraculously, plants seem to know the difference between irrigation and rain. Even with steady, appropriate irrigation, fruit set and growth is always better with adequate rain.

* Native trees are mostly drought tolerant and, once established, need no supplemental watering as our normal rainfall is sufficient. They may need a soaking once or twice during our hot season if rainfall is below normal. This is applies to most of the trees here in Bellasera.

Note: If you have the time and patience, I recommend turning off your drip system timers after a rainfall and manually triggering a watering cycle as necessary.

Planting

Here in the Sonoran Desert, we can always find something to plant. For December, here are some suggestions:

<u>Bare Root Roses</u>- This is the perfect time of the year to plant bare root roses. Because you have a month or more to plant them, take some time to look for the best quality plants in the varieties that grow best in the valley. Here are some guidelines:

Purchasing

- Bargain prices often mean inferior plants.
- A healthy plant should have large, healthy canes with no leaves but visible buds and strong anchor roots with at least some secondary and feeder roots.
 - Never buy roses that have been dipped in wax.
 - Keep them cool, moist (or soaking in water) and in the shade until you are ready to plant.

Planting

Plant within a week after purchase.

They should do well in a 2-foot by 2-foot hole that is well amended with organic matter.

<u>Parsley, Sage, Rosemary and Thyme</u>—Try varied alternatives of these culinary herb garden favorites.

- •Sow **parsley** seeds for 'Giant of Italy' (large, flat-leaf), 'Krausa' (triple-curled leaf with a frilly appearance) or 'Paravert' (curly leaves with a soft texture).
- •Set out transplants for golden, pineapple or tricolor **sage**; 'Arp', 'Gorizia' or 'Spice Islands' rosemary; and lemon, lime or nutmeg **thyme**.

Cool-Season Annuals—It's never too late to add some color to your garden!
Sow seeds or set out transplants for baby's breath, bachelor's button, bells of

Ireland, black-eyed Susan, calendula, dianthus, geranium, hollyhock, Iceland and Shirley poppies, larkspur, nasturtium, pansy, snapdragon, stock and sweet pea.

Pruning

Now is a good time to start thinning, pruning, and reshaping many of our desert trees such as **mesquite**, **palo verde**, **acacia**, and other deciduous trees. Tree sap has moved down into the root system making it the most desirable time to thin and prune. Some guidelines:

- •Remove touching branches that cross over each other and limbs that rub against structures and neighboring trees.
 - •Thin overall to decrease the trees susceptibility to wind damage.

December is also a good time to prune *Texas sage, roses* and other *desert and deciduous shrubs.*Do **not** prune frost sensitive plants such as *bougainvillea* and *hibiscus*.

Holiday Tips

<u>Christmas Trees</u>-I'm not sure how prevalent purchasing live Christmas trees is anymore. However, if you are of a mind to do so, here are some tips:

Purchasing—Before purchasing an evergreen, grasp the tree's branch between your thumb and forefinger, and gently pull it toward you. If the tree is fresh, very few needles will come off. Or, lightly shake or bounce the tree on its trunk base. A few brown needles may drop, but don't buy a tree if many green needles fall off. **Maintaining**- Just before setting the tree in its stand, make a straight cut across the full base of the trunk, removing a quarter to a half inch. This eliminates the seal of dried sap that forms after the original cut, which prevents water from being absorbed. The cut can seal within a few hours, so if the tree seller makes the cut for you, don't drive around doing errands all day with the tree on the roof of your car. Cut trees will absorb a gallon or more of water in the first 24 hours after being placed in the stand and a quart daily thereafter. Keep trees well-watered to help prevent needles from drying out and becoming a fire hazard.

<u>Holiday Lights On Plants</u>- If you must put holiday lights on your plants and trees, take care to wrap them loosely and remember to remove them after the holiday season. Don't put "costumes" on saguaros or other columnar cacti, as this inhibits the plants ability to photosynthesize. However, lights on frost sensitive cacti and succulents can add a few degrees of protection during the cold winter months.

<u>Poinsettias</u>- In my recent shopping forays, I noticed there was a wide selection of healthy, good looking poinsettias available. If you purchase one, follow these simple handling instructions to keep them looking good during the holiday season: After purchase, remove decorative foil wraps from pots so that water doesn't accumulate and cause root rot. Alternatively, remove the foil when you water, let the plant drain in the sink, and then rewrap. Place pots in a bright spot but away from cold drafts, heating vents and fireplaces. Feed with a slow-release fertilizer or with an all-purpose fertilizer for blooming plants at half-strength every two weeks.
