Board Adopts Security Committee Recommendations

Overview: The security of our community and residents is one of our primary considerations. Every few years, the Bellasera Security Committee conducts an in-depth review of our current security policies, procedures and equipment and makes a report of their findings to the Board, including any recommendations for changes and improvements. Their last review was performed in 2010.

Over the past few months, the Security Committee members interviewed and questioned our current security service provider, Securitas, as well as two competing security service vendors; met with the Scottsdale Police Department to identify issues; and also explored several potential security enhancements and potential cost savings afforded by utilizing recent advances in security technology.

A Community Meeting was held on January 11 at 7:00 p.m. in the clubhouse to discuss the Security Committee's findings and recommendations for updated and improved security procedures and equipment in Bellasera. The meeting was well-attended by our residents and was chaired by **Joe Carlon**, Chairman of our Security Committee, who gave a detailed presentation of the Committee's recommendations, answered questions and responded to the concerns expressed by the residents in attendance. All of the members of your current Board were also present.

Committee Findings/Recommendations:

Based upon the bids received from the three competing security providers, the Committee recommended that the community continue with Securitas, our current provider, but with renewed focus on Guard Gate performance.

Current Front Gate Guard coverage is 20 hours per day (5 a.m. - 1 a.m.). There is no Guard coverage at the Front Gate for the remaining four hours (1 a.m. - 5 a.m.) each day and visitor access during those off-hours is via a resident-programmed access code which can be shared and abused. There is currently no security or safety monitoring of the clubhouse or pool area as the Guard, when present, is instructed not to leave his post. The Committee members have reviewed, observed and recommended the installation of a "virtual monitoring" Guard Gate system and the installation of motion activated cameras to monitor the clubhouse entrances, the work-out area and the pool. The virtual Front Gate Guard System would operate when a real Guard is not present. During off-hours a visitor would drive up to the Guard House and push the button on a call box (similar to a small ATM) equipped with a camera and speaker and would be immediately connected to a "live" off-site support person at Centralized Vision, our vendor. After the visitor's identity is confirmed, Centralized Vision's off-site support would open the gate for the visitor (or call the resident to obtain approval to admit). Similarly, the installation of motion activated cameras at the clubhouse entrances, work-out area and pool would be monitored by Centralized Vision off-site to provide significantly enhanced 24-hour safety, security and HOA rule enforcement coverage. With such camera and off-site monitoring in place, the work-out area can be made available for resident use on a 24 hour basis.

The Committee also studied visitor traffic at the Front Gate during the hours of 10 p.m. to 1 a.m. when a Guard is present, which indicated only infrequent sporadic traffic. To keep our security costs constant while effectively providing enhanced 24-hour security coverage, the Committee recommended reducing the hours of actual Front Gate Guard coverage from the current 20 hours per day (5 a.m. - 1 a.m.) to 16 hours per day (6 a.m. - 10 p.m.), with the balance being monitored by the new virtual Guard system.

Lastly, the Committee recommended that we consolidate and integrate access control (fobs) with our current QuickPass automated entry system, for greater control and efficiency.

The immediate cost for implementing the Committee's recommendations is an equipment installation cost of approximately \$5,400, while ongoing security operating and maintenance costs going forward and our liability insurance would actually be a bit less than what we are spending currently, all for better security coverage and safety.

At its meeting on January 26, the Board approved and adopted the recommendations of the Security Committee and will be moving forward with the implementation of its proposals. Look for future newsletter announcements as we move forward.

Reset Your Timers

We have had many reports of exterior tree lights not being on at the appropriate times. Our Design Guidelines require that developer provided trees must be illuminated from dusk to midnight daily. Dusk is around 6:00 p.m. during the winter.

Some of you will need to reset the timers on your tree lights. The power outage in late December caused many of the timers to be set improperly.

An audit of the exterior lighting will be done later in February, so please be sure to reset those times and change the light bulbs as needed! Let's make sure our streets are as beautiful at night as they are during the daylight hours.

Javalinas

(Continuing our monthly series providing interesting facts about a few of the we-were-here-first native creatures with whom we share our space in Bellasera. --Editor)

Peccary or javalina as it is known in the southwestern US is a funny mammal three to four feet long ranging in size from 44 to 88 pounds. Peering through my view fence I found them cute, curious and friendly. It was like getting acquainted with some new neighbors. However, they were probably more curious about the huge prickly pear growing in my yard! Javalinas are best left alone as they travel in family groups and can attack humans if feeling severely threatened. Most of the time they eat roots seeds, fruits, some small animals and cacti (prickly pear).

They do look like pigs and have snouts and small eyes relative to their heads. They make a chattering sound when rubbing their tusks together to warn their preditors which is often the sound we hear on their approach. Tusks combined with strong jaws can crush and slice their food or their preditors. The collared species we see have scent glands for marking purposes, can produce offspring all year long and need little cover to protect them.

In Bellasera this type of peccary can be found in the washes and very low areas between some houses. I have seen them standing in small groups when crossing the bridges over washes. They are enjoyable to watch at a distance, but in my case I was happy to have the view fence between us. Too close for comfort!

- I'm delighted and honored to be your Community Manager. Having seen more neighborhoods in the Greater Phoenix area than I can even remember, I honestly believe Bellasera is one of the best designed and maintained communities around. - The Board is pleased to announce the December 15 appointment of Ed Szkaradnik as the newest member of our Board and Ed's subsequent appointment as Treasurer. Ed fills the seat recently vacated by Ted Dixon.
 After the welcome addition of Ed, there still remain three seats on our Board which must be filled by election at our annual meeting on April 22, 2012.
- Filling these seats is not optional for our Association. Without volunteers, the management agent can accomplish some tasks, but only a duly-elected Board can make key business decisions such as levying and collecting assessments, entering into contracts or committing funds. Without a functioning Board, the operation of our community will stall and we will all suffer the consequences.
- Our final transponder transition event will be held on Saturday, March 10, 2012, from 9:30 a.m. until 1:30 p.m.
 On April 2, 2012, the old transponders will be deactivated. To date 244 residents and 429 vehicles have completed the process. We're pleased to report that our experience so far has been very positive.

February in the Garden

It's Official...We Are Having A Wet Winter

To the chagrin of many, we are experiencing one of the wettest winters in a number of years which I'm sure has put a damper on your golf game (if you have one) as well as almost any other outdoor activities. However, if you've lived in Arizona long enough, you would probably agree that there is a silver lining in our recent gloomy conditions as they go a long way in replenishing our desert with much needed moisture.

Sustains Our Surroundings And Your Garden!

In a perfect "weather year", the Sonoran Desert is supposed to receive frequent lowintensity winter (December/January) rains as well as violent summer (July/August)

"monsoon" thunderstorms. This weather pattern is technically referred to as "bimodal precipitation regime" unique to the Sonoran Desert. These distinct rainy seasons support a broad array of warm- and cool-season flora and fauna, and are the primary cause of the amazing species and lifeform diversity of the Sonoran Desert. Our rain was according to script and will not only benefit our beautiful surroundings but, more importantly, your garden.

Transition To Spring....Think About Planting

As we move into February, winter will start to loosen its grip on the desert as temperatures in the 80's are possible although cold snaps are still likely to occur. We haven't had any nights that dipped below freezing (although we came close) and warm days will remind us that spring is not far away which means we should start paying attention to our garden. During this transition month, I suggest you take the following steps:

Take a tour of your garden and identify those areas that you might want to add or replace a plant or tree.

Survey your garden for areas that might need to be rejuvenated or cleaned up. The weather is perfect this month to take on some general some general maintenance tasks.

The growing season officially starts in mid-February for us and, since it is short, don't lose time as we need to give plants and trees a chance to grow before the punishing summer heat.

Vegetable Garden

If you have the ambition and energy to grow vegetables and considering the rainfall we've had, this an excellent month to prepare a new vegetable garden bed as follows:

- 1. Prepare your vegetable bed by using a digging fork or rototilling to approximately 12-18 inches deep. Do not work soil if it is too wet as it can permanently damage the soil structure.
- 2, Apply compost generously (several inches) and incorporate it into the loosened soil.
- 3. If you have an existing vegetable garden this is also a good time to add compost.

Vegetable seeds to sow now include:

- beets bok choy carrots collard greens lentils leaf lettuce mustard greens
- green onions Irish potatoes radishes turnips

Vegetable seeds to sow the second part of February include:

• sweet corn • cantaloupe • cucumbers • muskmelon • summer squash • watermelon

Vegetable transplants include:

•Artichokes (Globe & Jerusalem) • Asparagus • Chard • Kohlrabi • Lettuce •Onion Sets • Peppers • Tomatoes* *If you are serious about planting tomatoes, please refer to the Garden Column in the February 2011 Newsletter which is archived on the Bellasera website (azbellasera.org).

Romantic Rose

Since February brings us Valentine's Day, I'll repeat my recommendation of the last few months to consider planting either *bare root* or *container grown* roses. There is a wide variety still available in local nurseries.

February is also a good month to pay attention to the maintenance of **established roses** in your garden. Specifically: These can be fertilized around mid-month which is weeks before a target bloom date of April 1. Some gardeners wait until the first growth has reached 2 inches in length before applying fertilizer. Any necessary pruning should be finished by mid-month.

Hop Bush- Drought Tolerant and Beautiful- Alternative to the Oleander

Oleanders are useful hedge type bushes predominant throughout the valley but are on our prohibited list. Consider The Hop Bush as an alternative. This native desert shrub has attractive, evergreen foliage and a similar growth habit to oleander. They can be used in the same ways that oleanders can in providing an attractive green hedge and/or

screening. They don't have colorful flowers, but the bright green foliage is their strong point. The Hop bush can be allowed to grow into their natural shape or pruned into a formal hedge.

Pruning

While our winter has been on the cold side, we have had no frost damage and, assuming our luck holds out, your pruning tasks will be much easier this spring. But remember, do not prune frost sensitive plants until the last chance for freezing conditions has past, which is usually around mid-February to early March. Suggested pruning guidelines are: **Deciduous trees**- Finish pruning nonnative deciduous shade trees and deciduous fruit trees by mid-month.

Citrus trees- Prune frost sensitive citrus after they begin to leaf out, if needed. As a general rule, citrus needs to be pruned only if there are aberrant branches ruining the shape of the tree.

Flowering annuals and perennials -Continue to deadhead to encourage additional blooms.

Remember: Have a purpose and an end result in mind before you make the first cut. Never remove more than 1/4 of the total plant. Always use sharp, sterile, quality pruning tools and disinfect them between cuts to prevent the spread of disease. Pruning is an art as well as a science. How much you cut off and where you choose to make the cuts will affect both the health and the beauty of the plant or tree.

February Garden Tasks

Watering – Your irrigation timer should have been turned off this past month and you should manually trigger a cycle later in the month only if rainfall is insufficient.

Continue Harvesting Citrus- Fruit sweetens the longer it stays on the tree, so letting it hang is the best storage method. Most citrus, including kumquats, lemons, limes, mandarins, navels, tangelos and pigmented and sweet oranges, can be harvested this month. Taste-test grapefruit and Valencia oranges for sweetness. Many can be harvested through May.

Pull Weeds- Remove London rocket to prevent large clusters of false chinch bugs from gathering later in spring. These insects like to feed on this weed in winter. They are harmless but sometimes annoying to have around in large groups. Eventually they will migrate elsewhere.

Divide and Transplant Aloe- Aloe is easy to propagate. Dig up overgrown clumps and gently separate entwined root systems.

Did You Know

Native people of the Sonoran Desert knew when to plant crops by observing the signs provided by nature. When Mesquite trees began to leaf out as temperatures warmed in late February and early March, the Pima and Papago people were ready to sow seeds. This transition to spring weather finds gardeners eager to begin another planting season.

Mesquites may ooze an amber-colored resin. This can be normal or released as a result of injury. The exudates are often sweet smelling and tasty. If the exudates are dark in color, sticky and odiferous it is caused by a bacterial infection called slime flux. You can prune affected branches, but once it has been established the tree will remain diseased and take years to die.

Wildflowers should do well this spring due to our wet winter. Plan a short trip to Pinnacle Peak Park this spring and enjoy them.
