## Major Road Work Maintenance and Repair to Begin in Fall

At its March meeting, the Board met with our outside road consultant to discuss the recommended maintenance and repair of our streets and roadways in Bellasera to be performed this year.

In addition to road patching, we are scheduled to emulsion seal our streets this year and are considering a major structural enhancement and overlay of Ponte Bella Drive, from the entrance off Scottsdale Road to Corva Drive and include Corva Drive between Visao Drive and 74th Way – basically the 'gateway' to our community.

The work should take about six weeks to complete, weather permitting, and will begin this fall, probably in October.

We will keep the community advised of the progress of these discussions and decisions and further information regarding the precise nature, scheduling and location of these repairs before the work actually begins.

## Security Update Part II:

Phase II of the security system enhancement is almost complete. We now have 4 cameras in place at the clubhouse, for <u>your</u> safety and security. There is a camera in the hallway entrance, the fitness center and two cameras monitoring the pool.

The monitoring company is watching out for your well being. If they see a problem, they will call the proper authorities as needed (police, ambulance, fire etc.).

The final phase will be the exchange of key fobs for the clubhouse. We will work to make sure this is done as easily and conveniently as possible for everyone in the community. The plan is to distribute the new fobs the week of April 6. Look for a Bellasera e-blast for exact dates/times to stop by the clubhouse to pick up your new fobs.

#### **Old Furniture Outside of Fences:**

`The past few weeks, the landscapers have been clearing the 3' area on the outside of the fence line. What they found was terrible! Old furniture, old/dead plants as well as pots and tree trimmings.

Please do not throw anything over your fence! Make certain that your landscapers are not doing so either.

Now that the landscapers are finishing/have finished that project, any future clearings behind the fence where we find such debris will be in violation of the CC&Rs.

#### Lighting Violations:

ullet Some of you may have recently received (or will be receiving) a lighting violation letter from the office.

Some of the letters are very clear that your lights are out, many of the other letters are directed at the Design
 Guidelines, section J, Number 7, which specifically discusses the type of fixtures that are allowed. The guidelines
 state that all fixtures should be 'warm light.'

- We found many homes where garage and landscape lights are clearly <u>not</u> the required warm light, but are colored,
   too bright, or not on at all.
- If you received a letter regarding landscape lighting, please note that every home in Bellasera must have the minimum number of trees illuminated by an "up-light" or a "hanging fixture" located in the branches/canopy of the trees. They should be low wattage lights with the color being "warm light".
- If you received a letter, please review the Design Guidelines and be sure to send me an e-mail,
- Iforte@aamaz.com,once the correction has been made.

We all want the community to look great day and night. Please take a moment and head out to the front of your own house to make sure you are in compliance of the guidelines.

## Bellasera Neighborhood News, April 2007, 10 years ago

- In last month's letter, I indicated the Board's desire for an increased focus on compliance with the Bellasera governing documents. This decision was based on a number of comments and complaints from our residents. At our March 8 Study Session, we concluded the best way to proceed was by informing the community of violations that are being reported and ask that everyone voluntarily comply prior to moving to the next step in the process. Here are some of the main issues that are coming up (this is not intended to be all-inclusive): Trash Cans, Landscape Lighting, Front Yard Artifacts, Pots, Cars Parked on the Street.--Chuck Roach
- Gary Pederson, Vice President of the Pederson Group Inc., developer of the Scottsdale North Marketplace, briefed about 65 Bellasera area residents in the clubhouse on February 28. Highlights of the meeting: Plans for a Morgan Chase Bank, and covered parking canopies, have been submitted to the Scottsdale Development Review Board. Negotiations are underway with several potential marketplace tenants, but names will not be revealed until leases are executed. The large corrugated steel pipes visible on the site are for underground rain water retention. Three or four eating establishment are anticipated. AJ's opening is planned for no later than Thanksgiving Day of this year. Except for the Morgan Chase Bank, and the sit-down restaurant pad near Scottsdale Road, construction completion will coincide with the AJ's opening. The agreement with AJ's stipulates AJ's will be the exclusive coffee purveyor in the center. The City of Scottsdale Multipurpose Trail along Scottsdale and Lone Mountain Roads will be extended on the property perimeter. Landscaping will be done prior to construction of the east and south perimeter block wall.

- The recent rain perked up the landscape shrubs and trees. It also enabled weed seeds to rapidly germinate and provide random green spots in many of our yards. Please remember to make Bellasera 'look good' by controlling unwanted vegetation.
- The Annual Meeting of the Bellasera Community Association will be held on April 22 at 2 p.m., outside the clubhouse. I encourage all residents to cast your votes for the three open Board seats, and to attend your Annual Meeting. The Board is elected by our residents, and is chartered with the responsibility to represent the business affairs and management of our community. Please do your part by casting your ballot. Note: You can meet the four new Board candidates on April 4 at 6 p.m. in the clubhouse.
- Here's a preview of the important issues facing Bellasera in the coming year, and a few visionary thoughts: our most important challenge facing Bellasera in the new Fiscal Year is the existing lawsuit regarding access to the 12 acre parcel adjacent to our property. This access issue is Priority #1. The Board will remain focused on this very important issue, and we will keep you informed as the process proceeds. In early March we sent an e-mail blast to the community to solicit your feedback on Tennis Court #3. The response has been outstanding! It is overwhelmingly in favor of exploring alternative use(s) for this area. The feedback is more than 11 to 1 in favor of eliminating Tennis Court #3 and exploring alternative uses. With this clear mandate from the community, once the new Board is seated, we will begin an interactive communication process with the community to explore how best to utilize this asset for the benefit of our residents. We expect to begin repairing and resurfacing Tennis Courts #1 & 2 this Spring.--Gregg Dittoe



## **April in the Garden**

#### A Beautiful Spring Arrived Early

We certainly didn't have to be told that Spring had come early this year as our temperatures strayed as much as 20 degrees above normal during March causing us to join our winter visitors in donning summer clothes (if you could find them). The combination of warm temperatures and March rain has surrounded us with beautiful signs of Spring and, as a bonus, we end the month with cooler, but normal, temperatures.

#### Bellasera Is Aglow

The adage that spring on the Sonoran Desert can be a four-month-long spectacle of life and color has never been truer here in Bellasera as we are awash in color. Our community exemplifies the fact that the desert has a constant evolutionary beauty that one seems never to tire of. Deserts are not as bereft of life as they seem; their barren landscapes can support a remarkable variety of plant and animal life.

Although a lot of this happens naturally, we do enhance and add to the total beauty by nurturing and maintaining our part of the desert. I encourage you to take a few minutes and drive, or better yet, walk around our community and see for yourself. Take notice of Lantana, Bougainvillea, Penstemon, Fairy Duster and, of course, the omnipresent Desert Marigold.

## Planting, Pruning & Watering

#### **Planting**

Although your summer planting should be nearly finished, you still have time to add life to your garden. A few suggestions:

**Warm-Season Cacti and Succulents** including: • Saguaro • Prickly-Pears • Chollas • Barrel cacti • Hedgehogs • Pincushions • Agaves • Aloes • Candelilla

Native and Desert-Adapted Trees including: • Ironwood • Blue Palo • Palo Verde • Mesquites

**Warm-Season Shrubs** including: • Yellow Bells • Texas Sages • Creosote • Sennas • Ruellia • Superstition Mallow • San Marcos Hibiscus • Desert Cotton • Fire Bush • Lantana

Vines including: • Yuca • Queen's Wreath • Yellow Orchid-vine • Passionflowers • Arizona Canyon Grape• Old Man's Beard

Herbs—Transplant warm-season favorites, including basil, lavender, rosemary, sage and scented geranium.

**Veggies**—Sow seeds for warm-season lima, snap and yardlong beans, black-eyed peas, cantaloupe, corn, cucumbers, green onions, okra, peanuts, pumpkin and summer squash.

Transplant sweet potatoes, carrots and radishes.

#### **Pruning**

Trees: Lightly prune your Mesquites and Palo Verdes after bud break or after flowering.

Shrubs: Continue to prune summer and fall flowering shrubs by mid-month including:

• Texas Sages • Yellow Bells • Lantana • Turpentine Bush • Mexican-honeysuckle • Sky Flower • Black Dalea

**Cactus:** If **cholla** or **prickley pear** cactus become too large, they should be cut to a joint with a saw or large clippers. Remember to wear heavy gloves to protect your hands. Also, it is not necessary to treat a cut on these types of cactus if the cut is made at the joint.

**Yucca** should not be pruned unless it is necessary to remove dead or diseased stems. If you need to prune, cut back to either a joint or as low on the plant as possible and dust the wound generously with powdered sulphur until it completely dries out.

**Herbs-** Inspect your *Basil, Lemongrass, Peppers, Mexican Tarragon* as well as other frost sensitive plants closely, looking for new growth emerging from the lower half of the plant. Using sharp shears cut the plant back by 1/3 to ½ or more, down to healthy new side shoots. Top-dress the plant with new compost and water well for a fresh start. *Rosemary* spring growth should be well underway and, as long as the blossoming of its vivid blue-violet flowers is over, it can be safely trimmed back.

#### **Watering**

As mentioned last month, it's important to checkout and verify all the critical elements in your drip system are in proper working condition. It shouldn't have gotten much use during the last few months but the warm weather is only a matter of time and you'll need to start watering on a schedule. What kind of schedule? This is always one of the

hardest questions to answer. Generally, be sure to run your system long enough to wet the top two feet of soil. Deep, infrequent watering is much better than a daily sprinkle. **Want a better answer?** There are a number of excellent/free publications that will provide a more refined answer, or actually, a set of answers. One of them, produced by the city of Scottsdale is titled "Landscape Watering by the Numbers". I found a copy at the Scottsdale Library and it can also be viewed online at:

#### Ocotillo...Do You Have One?

If the answer is yes, you might frequently wonder: is it dead or alive? For much of the year, this curious, unique plant appears to be an arrangement of large dead sticks and it

is often puzzling to tell if it is dead or alive. Here are a couple of ways to know:

- 1. Take the end of the cane and pull it gently toward the ground. If it bends it is still alive.
- 2. Look carefully at the stem around the thorn. Surrounding the thorn is a diamond-shaped area that often has tan or whitish bark that peels away. Beneath that bark the stem should be green or yellow green. If it is dark gray, the cane is dead.

Always prune canes as far back as you can to prevent unsightly stumps and spindly branching regrowth.

If the answer is no (you don't have one), March through May are the ideal months for transplanting Ocotillos.

#### Wildflower Or Weed?

I've often asked myself that question which is especially pertinent since our community is conducting its annual weed inspection of all properties. It's well worth a few minutes of your time as it will expose you to hundreds of beautiful wildflower snapshots with the name of the wildflower as well as where and when it was taken. They were all photographed in a Maricopa County Park and are very recent. In any case, give your property a quick inspection.

#### **Miscellaneous**

<u>Roses-</u> During spring's peak bloom period feed and water to promote continued flowering. Apply fertilizer every two weeks until the heat of summer begins. Water twice per week when temperatures are below 80 degrees, increasing to three times weekly when temperatures are above 80 degrees or conditions are windy, which can dry out foliage and blooms.

<u>Citrus</u>- Do not prune citrus except to remove dead or damaged wood and branches obstructing pathways, views, or structures.

<u>Bird Feeding-</u> Please, **do not** feed the birds as there are many dangers involved in feeding any of the wildlife here in the desert. You might attract other animals that eat seeds such as mice or rats. Then, you might attract things that eat mice or rats, such as snakes. The birds might be fun...but it's not worth it.

<u>Houseplants</u>- As days lengthen, houseplants begin producing fresh shoots. Gradually water more frequently and apply houseplant fertilizer according to package instructions. If roots poke out the bottom of the pot, or if growth was stunted last year, repot in fresh soil. As needed, trim or spread out encircled or overgrown roots, and wait to fertilize for a month to allow roots to re-establish. Clean and disinfect pots with a 10-percent bleach solution (1-part bleach to 9-parts water) before reusing.

#### **April Happenings**

April is chock full of exciting events: **April Fool's Day, Final Four, Baseball Opening Day**, and of course, **The Masters**. However, these are your garden happenings:

- Our desert "bean" trees (such as blue palo verdes, acacias, and mesquites) will begin to open their yellow to creamy blooms and create *corridors of yellow* throughout our community.
  - The cacti will begin to bloom starting off with prickly pears, chollas, and hedgehogs.
  - Some saguaro cacti will open their big, white flowers.

As the days lengthen and warm up, reptiles become more visible—time to watch for rattlesnakes (although remember they can be out any month of the year). Desert iguanas, lesser earless lizards and western whiptail lizards begin breeding. Bobcats and coyotes are also very active. And butterfly activity picks up; look for great blue hairstreak, hackberry, skipper, blue, and queen butterflies.
