#### **Board Business**

<u>Board Rejects Pickleball In Bellasera</u>. In the May newsletter, residents who had an interest in adding pickleball to our community recreational facilities were asked to e-mail the newsletter editor to express their feelings on the matter. Pickleball is not allowed on our two tennis courts, but a proposal was made to re-stripe our existing basketball court for pickleball and to purchase a movable pickleball net – essentially making the basketball court multi-use.

A total of sixteen (16) responses to the newsletter invitation were received. Ten (10) were in favor and six (6) were opposed. Not a very representative sample in any event. The issue was also discussed at the last Building and Grounds Committee meeting and that committee was deadlocked 2-2 on the proposal, so no recommendation was made to the Board when it was to consider the issue at its May meeting.

At the Board meeting, several of our residents attended in person and presented a petition signed by more than 40 of our residents in opposition to the pickleball proposal. Many were homeowners whose homes are close to the clubhouse and tennis/ basketball courts. Their main objection was the noise generated from such activity. Pickleball uses a plastic ball which makes a harsher, tinny sound when it comes in contact with the paddles used in the game. It was also pointed out that when pickleball was initiated in a competing nearby community, it was subsequently suspended on account of objectionable noise.

After a discussion, considering the costs involved and the strong objections of our members most directly impacted, the Board voted unanimously to reject the pickleball proposal.

<u>New Verizon Wireless Cell Tower(s) At AJ's Shopping Center.</u> When the community rejected the Verizon Wireless Cell Tower proposal for Bellasera in late 2015 and we so informed Verizon, we were told that Verizon would pursue other locations outside Bellasera.

Verizon has now informed the Board they have reached agreement with the owners of the adjacent AJ's Shopping Center to install several cellular antennae and related equipment on their property. The antennae and equipment would be installed on the roof of one of the buildings in the Center that backs up to Bellasera and would be screened by increasing the height of the parapet wall of said building by seven (7) additional feet. The primary purpose of such installation is to improve Verizon's wireless cellular service in Bellasera. A copy of Verizon's current proposal and drawing is available as a link on the Bellasera website (azbellasera.org, "BCA Members" page).

The Board discussed Verizon Wireless' current plan at its May meeting and decided to take no official position either for or against this latest proposal. Homeowners who oppose Verizon Wireless' latest plan should contact the City of Scottsdale Planning Department to voice their concerns. The Board will support the efforts of the majority of our homeowner's who are potentially affected.

No Board Meetings in June, July and August. As is customary, the Board will not formally meet during the months of June, July and August. If the situation requires, the Board may act by written consent in lieu of a meeting. The Board will resume regular monthly meetings in September.

A look back in Bellasera history. This may bring back memories for long-time residents and be of interest to those not living in our community 5 & 10 years ago. <u>Clips</u> from past newsletters follow.

#### Bellasera Neighborhood News, June 2007, 10 years ago

- During the first week in June, members of the Communications Committee will be distributing a large packet
  containing important information for every Bellasera homeowner. The packet will contain a forwarding letter
  including an overview of the changes, revised CC&R and Bylaw pages, a consent form for each, and a selfaddressed, stamped envelope. Homeowners are urged to consider returning the consent forms. The required
  number of votes in favor to ratify the revised documents is: 183 for the Bylaws; 241 for the C&Rs. There are
  360 homes in Bellasera.
- This month's cover photo on The Peak magazine was taken by Bellasera resident Frank Biondo. His photograph "A Memorable Moment", was one of the winning photographs selected earlier by the magazine. Frank, who's also a volunteer at Pinnacle Peak Park, donated the use of his photo of a spectacular sky change for the magazine's cover.
- At the April Board meeting, a policy was passed that would allow dog owners to socialize with other owners in the common grass area with their dogs off-leash. It was the Board's intention to try and solve a problem that has been occurring for a number of years by restricting the time period and imposing rules that would promote safety for our residents.
- On May 24, the Board of Directors voted 4-0 to rescind the dog policy approved a month earlier. After listening
  to statements from a standing room only crowd on both sides of the issue, the Board may also have been influenced by the potential risk of legal liability for dog related incidents, as advised by the association's legal
  counsel.

#### Bellasera Neighborhood News, June 2012, 5 years ago

- A burglary occurred on Visao Drive on Thursday evening, May 24. The resident who was burglarized lives
  near the back entrance, but on the opposite side of the street from Lone Mountain Road. The burglar entered
  the home between the hours of 5 and 9:30 p.m., while the resident was away. The house was entered by
  smashing the bedroom slider (so as not to set off the alarm), and stole jewelry. All residents are asked to remain extra vigilant, and to be on the lookout for suspicious activity in our neighborhood. Call '911' to report
  any suspicious activity.
- As your Community Manager, it is my responsibility to inspect the community for any violations of the Association's governing documents and Design Guidelines. Weed violation is the top violation given by Managers throughout the industry. One way to avoid receiving those letters is to spray pre-emergent on your granite. This preventative measure will last up to 6 months. It will be well worth it. The second most common violation is trash/recycle cans are not placed out of sight once the pickup has occurred.
- The Board has appointed a Recreation Area Ad Hoc Committee to study and make recommendations on alternative uses for Tennis Court #3 and the common area adjacent to the clubhouse. Recommendations from the ad hoc committee will be forthcoming.

#### June in the Garden

Here in Bellasera, we have a number of familiar reminders that summer is upon us.

- **1.** The beautiful yellow blossoms of our palo verdes start to fall and, of course, create a yellow carpet surrounding your property.
- 2. The lavender-pink blossoms of our ironwood trees come into full bloom and will also start to cover our landscape. You may have already noticed the fine textured foliage of the ironwood which is shed right before it blossoms. These are those tiny leaves that have turned brown and seem to be everywhere if you're lucky to have one of these beautiful trees.
- **3.** Our thermometers start to hit the 100° mark.
- 4. Any weeds still hanging around (out of sight, in the back of course) have turned brown.
- 5. The last of our winter residents have disappeared.

Of course the calendar is the real predictor and May did provide a perfect transition into summer. Even though our thermometers rose above 100 degrees a few times this past month, our temperature stayed mostly around average or below and we got some bonus rain at the beginning of the month.

#### **Prepare and Protect Your Garden**

June is predictably hot and dry with lots of days over 100°F and a few as high as 110°F or more—and often not a drop of moisture. Plants must endure the intense heat throughout the day. Many native and desert-adapted plants have numerous adaptations that enable them to live successfully in the desert, such as succulence, drought-deciduousness and small leaves, to name a few examples. However, you must provide proper irrigation to your plants during the summer months as well as well as being on the lookout for signs of water stress such as wilting, curling leaves, yellowing or falling of older leaves, and dead stems or branches. Some *Watering Guidelines* are below and some *Planting Suggestions* as well as *Summer Tasks*.

#### **Watering Guidelines**

As always, watering guidelines can be complicated as the amount of water and watering frequency depends on many factors such as:

•Soil Type •Weather (temperature, humidity, rainfall, etc.) •Microclimate •Plant Size and Species •Newly planted or established in the landscape (two years or more).

However, once again, let's go with some simple guidelines keeping in mind that most of the shrubs and trees we have in our gardens are **Desert Adapted**. Also, most of our irrigation systems are simple (**front** and **rear**). So, it comes down to **How Much** and **How Often**.

**How Much** - Ensure that you are deep watering your landscape plants to prevent salt build-up. Use a soil probe or a long-handled screw-driver to determine how deeply water is penetrating.

A simple guideline is the 1-2-3 Rule:

•1 foot deep for small, shallow rooted plants. • 2 feet deep for shrubs. •3 feet deep for trees.

How Often- Remember, always allow soil to dry out between each irrigation cycle.

• 7-21 days - Desert-adapted trees • 7-14 days - Non-Desert adapted trees • 7-21 days - Desert shrubs • 5-7 days - Non-Desert adapted shrubs

Ineffective water management is the number one cause of death of landscape plants in the Valley, and, believe it or not, it is more frequently from over watering than under watering. You can reduce your water bill and take better care of your plants it you water **slowly** (prevents run off), **deeply** and **not too frequently** (let the soil dry between watering). With our drip systems, each watering cycle should take at least one to two hours.

For *mature trees*, watering should not be necessary as we have had ample winter rain to sustain them. If we have an exceptionally dry summer, then watering mature trees should be reconsidered.

#### What to Plant?

June is the low desert's most difficult month for gardens and landscapes. Temperatures shoot into triple digits, while the respite provided to plants by monsoon rains and humidity is a month or two away. It is best to **wait until fall** to add plants to your landscape. However, you can consider the following:

#### Herbs

This is a good month to plant herbs as they are widely available in small pots right now and inexpensive (\$3-\$4). You'll find them in grocery stores well as nurseries including:

• Oregano • Thyme • Mint • Parsley • Sage • Basil (there's more....on the next page)



You can transplant them to larger pots where they are easily maintained. If you like, set them on the ground and hook them up to your drip system. For **Rosemary**, I would recommend planting in the ground as they do very well here in Bellasera.

**Caution** - Do not over-water herbs, especially those native to the Mediterranean area, such as lavender, oregano and rosemary. They are well adapted to dry soil, and their roots will rot if kept overly moist. Water should soak through the entire root zone to a depth of 1 foot with each irrigation. Let the top few inches of soil dry out before applying more water.

#### Warm-Season Veggies

Sow seeds for yardlong beans, cantaloupe and Armenian cucumbers. Transplant sweet potatoes by mid-month.

#### **Summer Tasks**

**Mulch**- Add a 3-inch layer of organic mulch (compost, dried leaves, grass clippings, wood chips) to the soil around plants to prevent weeds, maintain moisture, and slightly lower soil temperature. As the mulch decomposes, it adds nutrients to the soil.

**Roses-** To maintain healthy roses through the hot consider the following.

- Cut back on fertilizing established roses to encourage plants to slow down for the hot summer.
- Water deeply as temperatures climb.
- Hose off plants in the early morning to increase humidity and control spider mites. **Prevent Plant Sunburn**—June's intense rays can burn thin-barked trees, such as citrus and ficus. When pruning these trees, avoid removing more than one-third of the tree canopy; be aware that stems newly exposed to direct light may sunburn and split. Protect trunks of young trees with a whitewash of equal parts white latex paint and water, or wrap with a specialized product designed for that purpose.

**Chlorosis-** This is caused by an Iron deficiency which is typified by yellow leaves with contrasting green veins. Apply a chelated iron product to the soil around the root zone, following the package instructions.

**Fertilization-** It is best not to fertilize this month as the tender new growth may burn quickly in the heat of early summer. If you choose to fertilize, do so only once at half strength. Fertilizers, especially inorganic ones, are high in salts that can accumulate quickly in the dry, hot conditions of summer.

#### **Palo Verde Trees**

As I mentioned last month, there are four different species of these green barked trees here in Bellasera and, you may have noticed, that they don't all bloom at the same time. They have other distinct characteristics some of which I'll mention.

- •Blue Palo Verde –Blooms first and can grow to 40 feet high. They are multi-branched and the branches tend to droop. The bark, especially young bark, is bluish-green. Stops growing after about 30 years and may die long before reaching 100.
- •Foothills Palo Verde- Will bloom about two weeks later than the Blues and tends to have straight upright branches with a yellowish-green color. They are usually about 15 feet high but can get up to 40 feet.
- **Mexican** Palo Verde Blooms as the Foothills are finishing and can bloom through August. Are very fast growing (up to 8 feet per year) with upright branches and can get up to 40 feet high. The life span is about 30 years.
- •Palo Brea. These are small trees (25 feet) like the Foothills, but with leaves similar in size to the Blue Palo Verde. The green bark is relatively dark and granular. Blooms around the same time as the Mexican Palo Verde.

All of these trees are drought deciduous which means they are leafless in dry times. Chlorophyll in the bark enables them to carry out photosynthesis even while leafless. And, by the way, the Palo Verde is the Arizona State Tree.
