

Speeding and Stop Signs

Community Management has received numerous complaints that residents and vendors continue to ignore stop signs as well as speed limits within Bellasera. This has been a continuing problem for Bellasera since its existence and it's *time to take action*.

One immediate and partial remedy is to install additional speed limit signs within the community, most likely on the posts supporting the stop signs. With the hope additional signs will be enough of a reminder so that additional forms of control are not necessary.

A number of solutions have already been suggested by residents, and the Security Committee will begin a review of those as well as other forms of speed control (including fines, pavement modifications, etc.) for future implementation if the additional signs are ineffective. An open community meeting will be held this Fall to discuss any recommended pavement modifications before being implemented.

In the meantime, please obey the 25 mph speed limits, and fully stop at all stop signs.

Also, please remind all guests and vendors to obey the traffic rules.

Main Gate After-Hours Reminder

Just a reminder that anyone entering the main gate after 10:00 p.m. will be asked to show identification. This is to make sure that someone cannot enter our community with just a name. Please remind family members and tenants (if you are renting your home) that they <u>must</u> show a photo ID. Entry will be denied without proper identification.

NAOS Clarification

At this time of year, we receive numerous calls from homeowners regarding the NAOS area behind their home. I have copied the regulations from the City of Scottsdale below:

Maintenance—Natural Area Open Space (NAOS)

- 1. NAOS shall be permanently preserved in its natural condition to be self-sustaining.
- 2. The removal of small amounts of man-made trash and debris that may accumulate within NAOS is permitted.
- 3. Clearing, pruning, raking, and landscaping within NAOS areas is prohibited except as provided in Subsections 4., 5., and 6. below.
- 4. Maintenance of public non-paved trails within NAOS shall be subject to specific approval by the City.
- 5. The removal of man-made dumping piles, and specified invasive, non-indigenous plants and weeds within NAOS shall be subject to specific approval by the City.
- 6. A defensible space will be permitted to be established and maintained around homes in Wildland/ Urban Interface and Intermix areas as defined in Section 3.100. The removal of flash fuels, which include invasive annual grasses, for an area of thirty (30) feet from a habitable structure, to provide for fire safety around dwellings, is permitted, but shall not result in the destruction of native plants* within NA-OS.
- 7. Dead or dying native plants within NAOS shall be left in place to provide wildlife habitat.
- 8. NAOS easements may be released by the Zoning Administrator only to the extent such releases conform to the standards set forth in Section 6.1060.F.

Wildlife Reminders

Part of Scottsdale's charm is it's seamless integration into the Sonoran Desert that surrounds the city. Residents and visitors alike enjoy watching the desert wildlife that call Scottsdale home.

At times, wild animals venture into areas where people live and play, usually in search of food and water. It's important to know how to safely share our space with these animals.

- Don't feed or leave water out for wildlife. While it may seem harmless, it can have unintended consequences and is actually illegal in Maricopa County.
- Store garbage indoors or leave in wildlife-proof containers.
- Supervise small children and pets when outdoors.
- If you see a young animal alone, don't assume it's been abandoned. Many animals leave their young during the day while they hunt or rest.
- Never approach a wild animal.

Thank you to all Bellasera homeowners who have returned their consent forms. All the packets have either been mailed or delivered in person by members of the Communications Committee. Hundreds of hours of Bellasera homeowner volunteer effort have been expended in the past several years in order to complete this project. It's time for all homeowners to do their part. Please consider returning the two consent forms in the packet at your earliest convenience, using the self-addressed, stamped envelope provided.

I want to remind those members who lease their homes to others that the CC&Rs prohibit leasing for less than 30 days—weekly rentals are strictly forbidden—and that copies of leases must be filed with the Association within 10 days of execution. Violators of this provision may be subject to a \$250 fine.--Chuck Roach

July & August in the Garden

It's Hot! You Can Cope...... So Will Your Garden

Welcome to our inaugural July/August garden column as I attempt to cover two months of garden advice which I think pair together perfectly. From a garden perspective, July and August have a common theme, our summer heat. So, I will attempt to cover topics that will, I hope, help your garden get through these two months.

Coping With The Heat

June brought us our expected hot weather but, for the second year in a row, exceeded expectations with record breaking temperatures. The heat will certainly continue into July

and August but the arrival of the **monsoon** (we hope) will bring welcome relief for you and your garden. During July, humidity should start arriving from the Gulf of California which will bring us thunderstorms and blowing dust. In the meantime, these are some steps you can take to help your garden cope.

Landscape Plants

- Increase water application as the weather warms. Pay attention to irrigation needs of plants.
- •Apply mulch to the ground around the base of heat sensitive plants to keep the roots cooler and prevent evaporation. Keep the mulch several inches away from the trunk.
- · Cut off spent blooms to stimulate rebloom.
- Late August or early September fertilization will benefit most plants struggling to have a flush of growth before slowing down for the winter. The growth put on before dormancy will store more energy during the winter that will be available to the plant when it pushes growth in the Spring.

Roses

- •Cut back on fertilizing established roses to encourage plants to slow down for the hot summer.
- •Water deeply as temperatures climb.
- •Hose off plants in the early morning to increase humidity and control spider mites.
- •Toward the end of August and into September add an iron supplement if roses show yellowing from iron deficiency.

Succulents

Succulents are normally drought resistant. However, we're at that point in the summer where they too will succumb, especially to the high nighttime temperatures. When the night temperatures stay at 90° or above and the humidity is high, most succulent plants can't breathe. After several nights in a row, chances are many of them will rot. Other than careful watering, there is nothing that can be done. **Remember, many plant families make up the succulent species, the best known being cactus. Virtually all cacti (or cactuses) are succulents, but many succulents are not cactus**.

Watering

Last month I discussed **how much** and **how often** to water during the summer. I'd like to follow that up with some general watering recommendations.

Annual Flowers- If you have planted some annual flowers, they are more than likely in pots where soil temperatures heat up to triple digits, and roots will "cook" without adequate moisture. Containers in full sun often require *daily water-ing*. Water should soak through the soil and drain out the bottom of the pot with each application to prevent salt buildup, which can kill plants over time. The frequent watering needed in summer, unfortunately, also leaches nutrients out of the soil. Therefore, a slow-release or organic fertilizer is recommended as they are less likely to burn plant roots in the summer heat compared to a faster-acting chemical fertilizer.

<u>Note*****</u>I planted **Portuluca** for the first time with great results and little or no maintenance. They exhibit great color and very drought tolerant. Portuluca is a low growing, fleshy plant with brilliant colors. Perfect for pots!

Citrus- Our hot weather will easily stress your citrus trees for water which results in fruit rinds becoming tough. Later in fall, rinds will crack and split because they are unable to expand as the fruit increases in size. Water mature trees every 10 to 14 days to a depth of 3 feet. Newly planted trees need water every 5 to 7 days to a depth of about 2 feet (or through the entire root ball). Note****Citrus will let you know when they are stressed as they will literally look like they are begging for water.

Trees- The monsoon normally brings adequate moisture for your native trees. With the amount of rain we've had this spring, there shouldn't be any reason to supplement unless we go into a complete dry spell the next couple of months. If that happens, you will need to soak them thoroughly, one time each month. A soaker hose is ideal for this.

Native Tree Maintenance

Pruning- Summer is the recommended time to prune native desert trees because they are actively growing and can recover quickly. Things to consider before undertaking this task:

- Good pruning is both an art and a science.
- The result should be a safe, healthy and beautiful tree that complements its natural growth habit.
- If you prune your trees yourself, familiarize yourself with proper pruning principals and techniques. There is a lot of literature available, including the Internet.
- If you hire someone to prune your trees, be sure *they* understand proper pruning principals and techniques.
- Remove no more than one-quarter of a tree's branches in a year. Cutting off too much foliage "starves" the plant by reducing its ability to synthesize and can leave it susceptible to disease.
- It's advisable to hold off any pruning for at least one year after planting. Two years is even better. If you allow as many branches as possible to survive, the tree will develop strength and trunk girth.

Keep in mind the longer you wait to prune your mesquites, the higher the risk of wind damage during the monsoon.

What To Plant

July- Gardening is almost at a standstill. However, Native Americans traditionally sowed summer crops right before the start of the monsoons. The desert's brief summer season of extra rainfall and humidity promoted seed germination and encouraged plants to grow quickly. Native crop choices for today's gardeners include:

•amaranth •devil's claw •melons •squash • tepary beans

August -Normally the start of our late summer/early fall vegetable planting season which continues into November. Unless we have a dramatic monsoon, I would hold off until September which will still give you plenty of time. I'll provide more details on fall planting in September.

It's Bean Pod Time!

The fruits of many desert plants are continuing to ripen such as prickly-pears and other cacti. In addition, Ironwood, Palo Verde and Mesquite trees are also loaded with fruit in the form of bean pods. These three native trees are dominant in Bellasera as a good number of them were uprooted and saved during home construction in order be replanted in your front yard. Of course these "fruits" result in a cleanup challenge for us.

Note: In last month's column, I covered the four four species of green-barked Palo Verde trees: the Blue Palo Verde, the Foothills Palo Verde, the Mexican Palo Verde and the Palo Brea. *Guess what?* All four produce a different bean pod.

Miscellaneous Tasks and Observations

Hose off dusty plants-Summer storms promote populations of *spider mites*, which thrive on dusty foliage. They are especially attracted to roses but appear on many plants. Look for their telltale fine webbing or a rusty appearance on leaves. Hose off plants early in the morning before the sun heats up. Spray as often as needed to remove dust or to control mites.

Black widow spiders-These beneficial garden creatures consume annoying pests, such as cockroaches and crickets. Black widow spiders (*Latrodectus hesperus*) are active on warm summer nights;

Scorpions- are active during hot summer nights and are effective predators of other insects. Although the sting of a scorpion is painful, it is generally not life threatening.

Hummingbirds- There is a dramatic increase in hummingbird activity this month, as many species begin "tanking up" fat reserves for migration, and other species arrive here on their way south.

Fertilization - Do not fertilize until the weather cools.
