Bellasera in the Rear View Mirror

A look back in Bellasera history. This may bring back memories for long-time residents and be of interest to those not living in our community 5 & 10 years ago. <u>Clips</u> from past newsletters follow.

Bellasera Neighborhood News, September 2007, 10 years ago

- The revised Bellasera Bylaws have been approved, due to the response of more than 200 homeowners who returned their consent forms. Thank you to all who returned their forms! As of August 27, 201 CC&R consents have been received; 241 are needed for approval. Homeowners who have not returned their forms are urged to send them in as soon as possible. The consent forms were included in the packet distributed to all Bellasera homeowners in June.
- The most significant news for the month is the "Big One" on July 31 that hit us pretty hard here at Bellasera. If you were out of town during the storm, you were one of the lucky ones! We had almost three inches of rain at Dynamite and Pima against an average rainfall of seven inches a year. There were multiple road closures with debris and damage in several areas. Fortunately, there were no human casualties. Since the storm, we've been working on cleanup activities in the common areas of the community. It will take a few months to get everything back in order.
- The Board is presently in a forward planning mode. We have several volunteers for a resurrection of the Building and Grounds Committee, which will help identify and monitor areas in need of attention around the community. We're looking at a few outdated Design Guidelines and will be proposing several changes to the Modifications Committee. Several vendor contracts are up for renewal and we're obtaining proposals to determine if changes are appropriate.--Chuck Roach
- The new Bellasera Administrative Assistant in the clubhouse manager's office is Earlene Morgan, who was named by Bellasera's management company, AAM, LLC, to replace Terry Schuman. Terry was promoted to a new position within the company. She had served as Bellasera's Administrative Assistant since January of this year.
- The Scottsdale North Marketplace, at the intersection of Scottsdale and Lone Mountain Roads, continues to be a beehive of activity every day. Gary Pederson, VP of Pederson Group Inc., marketplace developer, reports barring any un foreseen delays, they're still targeting mid-November for the Grand Opening of AJ's.

Bellasera Neighborhood News, September 2012, 5 years ago

- Since May, I have been writing to our community about the creation of the Recreational Ad Hoc Committee and the great work this group of volunteers has been doing. To date, our committee has met seven times. In addition to committee members attending the meetings, we have also had a number of interested residents attend the meetings. This month we would like to give you a more detailed description of the committee's work. As a reminder, the committee is chaired by Dennis Carson, and is comprised of five other active members: Keith Christian, Richard Hoffman, Bruce Martin, Dan Bradley and myself. The committee is using the March survey results as a compass and focus. In the survey, an overwhelming majority of the survey respondents expressed their desire to find an alternative use for Tennis Court #3. Respondents felt strongly that our community did not need three tennis courts, and more people would benefit if we created an alternative use for this area. The respondents had numerous suggestions including making the area into a Dog Park, creating a family picnic area, building a golf putting green, badminton court, Bocce Ball court, etc. After considerable debate and discussion, the committee decided the best solution for Bellasera is to create a Dog Park in the fenced area comprising essentially the existing footprint of Tennis Court #3, plus an expansion to the west side of the court.--Gregg Dittoe
- Long-time Bellasera residents Clayton and Susan Loiselle recently closed escrow and moved to their new home in down-town Scottsdale. As Susan indicated on these pages earlier this year they wanted a lower maintenance home closer to activities they enjoy. We say sayonara to about 10% of our 360 residents each year. Then what's so special about the Loiselles leaving? I can't imagine two people who have contributed as much time and talent in making our community a better place. September in the Garden

Relief Is In Sight...Fall is Around The Corner!.

As We Transition...Have Positive Garden Thoughts!

As we say goodbye to our mediocre monsoon season, we have been greeted with some late summer, above average and certainly unwelcome, temperatures. While it's not atypical for this time of year, it does make you wonder if summer will ever end. Well, don't despair, football season is here and cooler temperatures along with lower humidity levels should start arriving this month which will be a welcome relief to your garden (along with you I'm sure).

Heat Stress

If you spent any time here in the summer, I'm sure you understand the meaning of heat stress. Well, your garden has also been suffering from heat stress for many weeks and will soon start to recover with the cooling nighttime temperatures. While September is a healing or recovery month, it is also the kickoff month for *prime planting time*. So, let's think positive as I attempt to provide some suggestions and guidance for our fall garden undertakings.

Fall Planting

Guidelines, Suggestions & Timing

Evaluate Your Garden: September is the ideal month to take a look at your landscape to decide what works and what doesn't. Most all of our landscaping in Bellasera was initially put in by landscapers almost 20 years ago and I'm sure everything was not planted in an optimal spot. So, I encourage you to take an inventory and answer these questions?

- •Do I need to move some plants that did not do well in full sun or, perhaps, need full sun?
- •What do you need to replace? Remember, plants have a life cycle.
- •What should you add?

Site Selection: This is the key to growing non-native plants here in the Sonoran desert. The sun will be getting farther and farther south each day. A site on the North side of a wall with half-day light now will be in more shade later. Plants need at least six to eight hours of sun to perform properly.

Timing: Based on our somewhat poor monsoon season and slow cooldown, the optimum time to start planting, especially landscape shrubs, trees, cacti and succulents is probably toward the end of September. You should wait until the night temperature falls to the 70's as it will be less stressful for root systems to establish and plants don't need as much water to survive. However, if you start planting in mid-September, you should still monitor plants for signs of water stress.

What To Plant

Landscape plants- After September 15, you should be able to begin planting landscape shrubs, trees, cacti, succulents and ornamental grasses. Early fall planting allows roots to become established in warm soils before cold nighttime temperatures set in. The sun can still be very intense this month, so protect cacti and other succulents with shade for a few weeks to prevent damage to stems. Note: Again, be sure nighttime temperatures are in the 70's. Vegetables-Yes, you can grow vegetables here in Bellasera. If you have the inclination, energy and time, try these:

Miscellaneous Tasks

Feed Citrus- If you did not do so in August, fertilize with your third and final application of the

year which helps improve fruit size.

Prune Roses- Around mid-month, prepare hybrid roses for their second bloom period. Remove dead or damaged canes, weak, spindly foliage and any suckers arising from below the bud union (a slight bump at the base of the stem where the variety was grafted to the root stock). Cut back no more than one-third of the plant. Apply a slow-release fertilizer and water to a depth of 2 feet.

Weeds- We probably won't have many weeds, but just in case, be sure and pull any that might have sprouted after summer monsoons. Weeds compete with garden plants for moisture, nutrients and sunlight, and also harbor pests such as beet leafhoppers, which transmit curly top virus to tomatoes and other vegetables.

Watering -If the humidity is still high and monsoon rains continue, do not water your cacti until the weather calms down and things can dry out for at least a week. With the heat continuing, maintain your summer watering schedule for trees and shrubs, begin to cut

back a little by late September to let things slow down and begin hardening off for winter.

If it is one of those years where it is still above 100° and the nights are still hot, hold off on the water cutbacks until early October. Those plants that are just waking up after the hot summer will want water.

Pruning-Continue pruning only for health and safety. The sun is still intense although it is coming in more horizontally. You won't want to do any lifting of branches that will expose the trunk or branches. Avoid any pruning that will open the tree to sunburn, especially on the south and west sides.

Grass- If you are one of the few with grass and plan to overseed with ryegrass in October, stop fertilizing warm season Bermuda lawns four to six weeks prior.

General Fertilization- This is the month for that last application of fertilizer before cold weather arrives. Use a low nitrogen formula to prevent excessive new growth. Plants need a chance to harden off to prepare for the cold as new growth will likely freeze with the onset of a frost. Stop fertilizing your Christmas cactus now in order to hopefully induce blooms by the holidays.

Observations and Musings

Why Do Desert Plants Have Small Leaves?

Ever wonder why desert plants, especially Palo Verde trees, have such tiny leaves compared to broad leaf trees such as maples and eastern oaks? That trait is called microphylly and the Foothills Palo Verde is the extreme example. Desert plants must maintain an internal temperature of less than 115 degrees Fahrenheit to survive. The size of their leaves helps them do that. A group of many small leaves has a larger surface area than a single large leaf of equal volume. This large surface area helps the plants lose heat by radiation. Also, in the wind, a large leaf will tend to develop a boundary layer of stagnant air. With small leaves, the boundary layer air does not develop, so the leaves can radiate heat without transpiration, even in relatively calm air.

The Saguaro, Why Do Some Die Young?

Nothing says Sonoran Desert, or makes a statement in the landscape, like the mighty saguaro cactus. With its unique sculptural form and seasonal blooms, this drought-tolerant native has not only become an increasingly desirable design element in our gardens but we are also able to enjoy the hundreds of saguaros that grace our open space here in Bellasera. Some facts:

- Most of the saguaros roots are only 4-6 inches deep and radiate out as far from the plant as it is tall. There is one deep root, or tap root that extends down into the ground more than 2 feet.
- Saguaros are very slow growing cactus. A 10 year old plant might only be 1.5 inches tall. Saguaros can grow to be between 40-60 feet tall (12-18m). When rain is plentiful and the saguaro is fully hydrated it can weigh between 3200-4800 pounds.
- With the right growing conditions, it is estimated that saguaros can live to be as much as 150- 200 years old. Recently, a Bellasera resident had a tall saguaro uproot and collapse in their driveway. By all accounts it was healthy and raised the obvious question, why? There are two potential causes:
- 1. **Bacterial Necrosis**, a major disease of saguaros where the first noticeable signs are usually a circular, black lesion.
- 2. **Overwatering-** Saguaros on your property, unlike those in our open spaces, were put there by landscapers. If you have any emitters from your drip system nearby, you run the risk of overwatering and causing an early death. So, be sure you don't have any plants nearby.
