Board Gives OK To Major Road Work Repair

At its September meeting, the Board approved moving forward with a major structural replacement of Ponte Bella Drive from the entrance off Scottsdale Road to Corva Drive, of Corva Drive between Visao Drive and 74th Way, and of the clubhouse parking lot. In addition, we will be patching and crack sealing the balance of our roads and then applying a sealcoat.

The Board has scheduled a special meeting on October 4 at 1:00 p.m. in the clubhouse to review bids and select a contractor to perform the work (The Board will hold its regular monthly meeting on October 18 at 1:00 p.m. in the clubhouse). Once a contractor is selected, the work will begin around the 3rd week of October and should take about six weeks to complete, weather permitting. The major work on the main Ponte Bella entrance drive, Corva (between Visao and 74th Way) and the clubhouse parking lot will be performed first and should take about two weeks to complete. During that time access to the clubhouse and clubhouse parking lot, including the workout facilities, the swimming pool, tennis courts and the dog park, will be limited to foot traffic – no automobile access and parking will be permitted.

The balance of the crack sealing, patching and seal coating will begin after the major reconstruction work is completed, taking approximately 3-4 weeks and will involve a revolving closure of portions of our streets during that period.

We will send out e-blasts, post notices and provide further information regarding the precise scheduling of each element of the road work once we finalize with the selected contractor and before the work actually begins. Your cooperation and patience will be required and is appreciated.

Update On New Verizon Wireless Cell Tower(S) At AJ's Shopping Center. In the June newsletter I advised the community that Verizon Wireless had reached agreement with the owners of the adjacent AJ's Shopping Center to install several cellular antennae and related equipment on the roof of one of the buildings in the Shopping Center that backs up to Bellasera. A copy of Verizon's proposal and drawing was made available as a link on the Bellasera web site, **azbellasera.org**, "**BCA Members**" page.

Verizon Wireless has now finalized their design plans for the new facilities and a photo simulation of how this would look is available via a link on our website referenced above. Again, the Board has decided to take no official position either for or against the Verizon Wireless proposal. Homeowners who oppose Verizon Wireless' latest plan should contact the City of Scottsdale Planning Department to voice their concerns. As indicated previously, the Board will support the efforts of the majority of our Homeowner's who are potentially affected.

Roof Rats Have Been Spotted in Bellasera

The roof rat is also known as the black rat, even though it is not necessarily black in color, but rather is usually dark brown. Your typical roof rat is between 13 to 18 inches long, including its tail. In fact, it is distinguished from other rats by that tail, which is longer than the rest of its body. Roof rats are sleek, slender, and agile. They have large ears.

Outside, roof rats will nest in trees, woodpiles, garbage, and plants. In our area, oleanders seem to be a popular nesting location. Inside, high places, like attics, are their preference. Roof rats do not burrow in the ground or swim. Roof rats eat fruits, vegetables, nuts, pet food and invertebrates (spiders and worms, for example). They will also eat paper.

If you have the following items around your home, you may be more prone to attracting roof rats: palm trees, yucca plants, pampas grass, honeysuckle, Italian cypress trees, any heavy shrubbery, wood piles, and storage boxes. How to get rid of roof rats.

Trapping roof rats seems to be the preferred method of control, especially if you have small children or pets that might be affected by poisons. Snap traps are widely available. Several city offices are offering traps at very reasonable prices for their residents, as part of their education and prevention program. Check the web site of the city/town in which you live for more information about traps and their availability.

Bellasera in the Rear View Mirror

A look back in Bellasera history. This may bring back memories for long-time residents and be of interest to those not living in our community 5 & 10 years ago. <u>Clips</u> from past newsletters follow.

Bellasera Neighborhood News, October 2007, 10 years ago

- As of September 25, 209 CC&R consent forms approving the revised Bellasera CC&Rs have been received; 241 are needed for approval. Homeowners who have not returned their forms are urged to send them in as soon as possible. The consent forms were included in the packet distributed to all Bellasera homeowners in June. The revised Bellasera Bylaws have been approved, due to the response of more than 200 homeowners who returned their consent forms. Thank you to all who returned their forms!
- In accordance with Arizona Revised Statutes § 33-1808, effective September 19, 2007, Arizona community associations may not prohibit one industry standard "For Sale" sign, and one sign rider, on an owner's property, regardless of whether it identifies a real estate brokerage or a "by owner" offer. No other changes have been exempted by this law. Therefore, the following continue to be Bellasera violations: More than one such sign on a property; Any such signage on common areas or common walls, including directional arrows; "For Lease" or "For Rent" signage in any fashion or location; Signs which obviously fall below Bellasera community standards (rusty, broken, etc.).
- A new Safeway gas station is now under construction in the Summit Shopping Center. It'll be located west of
 the Safeway store, and just south of the Heard Museum North that opened on June 30. The new AJ's Marketplace in the Scottsdale North Marketplace is scheduled to open in mid-November.

Bellasera Neighborhood News, October 2012, 5 years ago

- Roughly 75 Bellasera residents turned out on Thursday evening, September 27, to learn about the community's proposed Dog Park Project. Several architectural renderings of the park were on display. Board President Gregg Dittoe welcomed all and gave the rationale for finding a new use for the deteriorated condition of tennis court #3. This followed an informal survey of residents earlier this year indicating a large majority of respondents favored an alternate use for the court. The Board tasked an ad hoc committee to come up with a new use for the court. Gregg turned the meeting over to
- Dennis Carson, chairman of the Recreation Area Ad Hoc Committee. The retired attorney proceeded to make
 the committee's case to a 'jury' of fellow homeowners. He reported the committee met 9 times over the summer, and after much deliberation agreed a dog park was the best option.
- On Monday, October 15, the existing key fobs now used to open the clubhouse doors will be deactivated and
 no longer work. The Association is updating its clubhouse security hardware and software. The old key fobs
 will not be compatible with the new installation. The new system will give the Association better control and
 accountability over the access to the clubhouse. Owners may pick up new key fobs at the clubhouse
- Bellasera resident Louis Vigna passed away on September 7. Lou was 78 years old and died from complications brought on by a disease called Wegener's Granulomatosis. A memorial service will be held in the Bellasera clubhouse on October 6 at 4 p.m.
- Long-time Bellasera resident Ted Dixon died on September 29. Ted had staged a valiant fight against cancer for many years. He was an active volunteer in the community and was elected to the Board of Directors in April 2009.

A Delightful Month!

October is certainly a month to look forward to as it crammed with plenty of diverse, pleasant, ritualistic events, something for everyone. Here's a few: Halloween, Baseball Playoffs, Octoberfest, Football and, for golf enthusiasts, the Presidents Cup. Plus, the conditions for our golfers, tennis players and hikers have certainly improved because, as you must have noticed: **Somebody turned off the heat!**

Welcome To The Month Of Change

October ushers in a delightful change in our weather as evidenced by our cool morning and evening temperatures. This is a reminder that we can now look forward to seven or eight months of moderate, comfortable weather. More importantly, October provides an opportunity to give our gardens some new life as it is the **prime planting** month here in the low desert.

What To Plant

It is the best month to plant just about everything—*trees, shrubs, perennials, groundcovers, vines, ornamental grasses, cacti, succulents, wildflowers, cool-season veggies, herbs and flowers.* Temperatures have abated to a comfortable level, while soil remains sufficiently warm to promote seed germination and root growth. Seven to eight months of moderate temperatures are ahead of us, which will allow plants to establish before summer's heat returns. So forget garden maintenance chores this month and **Dig In! Some suggestions**:

Shrubs- If you'd like to add some brilliant fall colors to your garden, consider the following:

Heavenly Bamboo - An Asian plant which turns bright red to red- orange in the fall.

Firebush - As the weather cools, leaves begin to turn a dark coppery red. They remain this color through the winter.

Beach Vitex - Before this deciduous shrub loses its leaves they turn a dusky purple-red.

Crape Myrtle - Coloring is variable, but most plants turn a reddish hue before they lose their leaves.

Mexican Jumping Bean - This hot weather loving shrub leaves turn a fiery red in late winter.

Copper-leaved Caesalpinia - The small leaves turn from a deep burnished red to a bright golden red through the winter. Cool-Season Vegetables- Why do we call them cool season veggies? They respond to short days and cool nights and they are grown from September through April. Sow seeds directly into the soil for peas, root crops (beets, carrots, onions, parsnips, radishes, kohlrabi, turnips), chard and all sorts of leafy greens. Sow seeds or set out transplants in the cabbage family (bok choy, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower and kale).

In the September column, I included a detailed list of which cool season veggies to plant and when to plant them. You can find the column archived at **azbellasera.org**

<u>SAGE</u>- For your landscape, consider <u>Sage</u> which has close to 900 species, is the largest genus in the mint family and, more often than not, the ornamental varieties are known by their botanical name, <u>Salvia</u>. This easy-to-grow landscape favorite produces flower stalks on bushy plants. Its blossoms range in color from red to pink and purple to blue. Invigorating "desert" scents and pretty flowers for pollinators are reasons to grow autumn sage.

A profuse bloomer, **Sage** attracts hummingbirds, bees and butterflies, from late winter to early fall. Its blooms make excellent cut flowers, and its fragrant foliage has been known to repel pests. Some suggestions:

Chaparral Sage - Desert Sage - Red Sage - White Sage (which has lovely silvery-white foliage)

For your herb garden, consider adding one or more of the following culinary types:

Green Sage - Golden Variegated Sage - Tricolor Sage

Most sage plants benefit from afternoon shade or filtered light during low-desert summers.

Overhaul & Rejuvenate Flower Beds...Bring Color to Your Patio

The summer is always a challenge to maintain annuals (for me anyway) and I'm looking forward to ripping them out! Add color to your surroundings this winter with some flower beds (preferably in pots) as the nurseries will be packed with glorious selections in every size, color, and shape. To help you, below is an extensive list with *color info* along with guidance on *where to plant them* (sun, shade, etc.), Remember, fall flowers need to establish their roots in warm soils. So, starting them now gets a healthy root system developed before the cool fall and cooler winter slows them down.

- •Alyssum: A low growing border plant in white, pink or purple. Full sun to light partial shade.
- **Begonia**: Gives masses of color in **shady spots**, red, pink or white in dark leafed varieties, or a mixture of colors in green leafed types.
- Calendula: Yellow or orange flowers with dark centers, makes excellent cut flowers. Needs sun.

- Chrysanthemum paludosum: Miniature daisy flowers cover this low growing annual in a cloud of white. Use for sunny borders.
- *Dianthus*: An array of reds, pinks, violets and white adorn these specially selected Sweet Williams. *Sun or partial shade*.
- Dusty Miller: A foliage plant with silver colored leaves. Full sun to partial shade.
- Geranium: Available in a rainbow of colors. Full sun to partial shade.
- Linaria: Covered in mini snapdragon-shaped flowers of blue, yellow or red. Full sun.
- **Lobelia**: Arizona's favorite border plant for sun or *partial shade*. Deep purple, blue, rose, lilac and mixed colors.
- Ornamental Kale: Great foliage color in predominately purple or white. Full sun.
- **Pansy and Viola**: The most popular flower for fall and winter, these hardy free blooming plants are available in a wide variety of colors to suit any décor. Pick a sunny spot for best results. Violas will take *light shade*.
- Petunia: Reds, pinks, whites, burgundy and blues. Full sun.
- **Poppies and Primroses**: These favorites will be ready for you when the weather starts to turn cold. Iceland poppies for bright *sunny spots* and traditional primrose for *shady areas*.
- **Snapdragons**: Taller mid-sized varieties are great for cut flowers or colorful backgrounds. Dwarf types make fantastic borders. Either way, you can't go wrong with their rainbow of colors for sunny spots.
- **Stock**: Harmony and Trisomic varieties are very fragrant and make tremendous cut flowers. Midgets make excellent border plants. *Full sun*.

Revitalize Your Garden...Restore Nutrients

In addition to planting, you should spend some time *fertilizing* and *acidifying* your citrus trees and other plants. Frequent watering has been necessary to make it through a tough summer and a mediocre monsoon. However, this results in salt slowly building in the soil each time you water and depletes the available nutrients. By fertilizing this month, you will give all your plants a much-needed boost that will be rewarded with a flush of growth, green, and blooms.

Miscellaneous Tasks

Roses- Resume full fertilizing of established roses as the weather cools.

Citrus- Late summer application of nitrogen fertilizer will help fruit sizing. This is more significant for fall ripening (navel oranges and tangerines) than spring-ripening (grapefruit and Valencia oranges).

Deciduous Fruit Trees- Prune the water sprouts.

Landscape Plants- Cut off spent blooms to stimulate rebloom.

Weed Control- Pre-emergent herbicides can be applied from October through early December for winter weed control. Follow the package directions carefully for best results. Do not use pre-emergent herbicides where you will be planting seeds this season.

Mesquite Trees- If your Mesquite trees are looking tall and scraggly, take action now to do some corrective pruning. **Watering**- Our temperatures have begun to dip below 100° which means you can gradually start cutting back water to all plants to begin hardening them off for the winter. Remember, both frequency and duration need to be adjusted gradually. Do not stop cold turkey. Change your irrigation timer to reflect the changes in temperature.

Observations and Musings

<u>Heteromyidae</u>: <u>Kangaroo Rats & Pocket Mice</u>. Those mounds of dirt in your garden are caused by heteromyids which are a group of rodents_consisting of kangaroo rats and pocket mice. Despite their names, they are neither rats nor mice; and in spite of their mouse-like appearance, they are not closely related to any other species of North American rodent. Kangaroo rats and pocket mice are all nocturnal, burrowing animals with external fur-lined cheek pouches for storing and transporting the seeds that are their primary food. They are all well adapted to living in arid environments since most of them never need to drink water. They also have efficient kidneys that can conserve precious fluids by concentrating the urine. They are a favorite meal of **snakes** and **owls**.

<u>Snakes</u> Most snakes head to winter burrows this month. Although they remain fairly inactive in the colder months, keep in mind that they can emerge any time of year if enough warm days pass to sufficiently rouse them. **Personal Observation:** I think our snake population has decreased over the years which has, unfortunately, led to an increase in our kangaroo rats and mice.
