Bellasera in the Rear View Mirror

A look back in Bellasera history. This may bring back memories for long-time residents and be of interest to those not living in our community 5 & 10 years ago. Clips from past newsletters follow.

Bellasera Neighborhood News, February 2008, 10 years ago

- Sincere thanks to the 40 residents who responded to the Building and Grounds Committee's Gym Survey. It has provided invaluable information to assist the Board in their decision-making, regarding equipment in the gym, both in the short term and further out. The respondents were almost evenly split between male and female, and when two people filled out one form, both voices were included in the survey. On average, respondents said they work out around 4 times per week. Around 60% use the treadmills, about half use the elliptical trainers, 40% use the strength training machines, 20% use the stationary bikes and 15% use the stair climber.
- The revised CC&R/Bylaw documents recently approved by members of the Bellasera Community Association will be distributed in the next few weeks. The latest amendments to the Design Guidelines, as approved by the Modifications Committee, will also be added to the package, bringing all three documents current and up-to-date.
- One of the reasons I chose to live in our community is the manned SECURITY GATE. While I recognize it isn't a guarantee that unwanted intruders can't get into our community, I believe it provides a strong deterrent that will cause a would-be intruder to look elsewhere. Lately, we have had some problems with intruders entering through the back gate by following a resident in or going through the exit after a resident has come out. Some residents and Board members (including yours truly) have approached a few of these violators with various degrees of success. In two cases I know of, the Police were called, who responded very quickly.---Chuck Roach
- Three members of the Bellasera Board of Directors will be elected at the Association's annual meeting in April. The two year terms of Shawn Meyer, Chuck Roach and Bob Shriver will end in April. The terms of the other directors (Dennis Carson, Bruce Martin, Dennis Noone, David Redman) end in April 2009.

February in the Garden

It's Official...We Are Having a Dry, But Beautiful Winter

Unlike last year, we are not having a wet winter, not even close. It's been dry, frost free and beautiful. We've had cold spells but no frost yet. The temperature does drop precipitously when the sun goes down, sometimes accompanied by a gorgeous sunset. We all look forward to these months and get to enjoy them with our welcome winter residents. However, there is a downside to all of this, our dearth of rainfall, which I'll attempt to address below.

Transition to Spring

As January leaves us with a **Super/Blue Moon** topped off with a **Total Lunar Eclipse**, we enter February, a month when winter normally loosens its grip on the desert. A cou-

ple of nights may dip below freezing but that seems improbable as we are currently basking in the 80's and warm days are forecast to continue into February (just in time for our golf tournament). We will certainly be tempted with thoughts of spring, but cold snaps are still possible.

Planting

The growing season officially starts in mid-February for us and, since it is short, don't lose time as we need to give plants and trees a chance to grow before the punishing summer heat.

If you have the ambition and energy to grow **vegetables**, this a good month to prepare a new **vegetable garden bed** as follows:

- Prepare your vegetable bed by using a digging fork or rototilling to approximately 12-18 inches deep. Do not work soil if it is too wet as it can permanently damage the soil structure.
- Apply compost generously (several inches) and incorporate it into the loosened soil.
- If you have an existing vegetable garden this is also a good time to add compost.

Vegetable seeds to sow now include:

• beets • bok choy • carrots • collard greens • lentils • leaf lettuce • mustard greens • green onions • Irish potatoes • radishes • turnips

Vegetable seeds to sow the second part of February include:

• sweet corn • cantaloupe • cucumbers • muskmelon • summer squash • watermelon

Vegetable Transplants include:

•Artichokes (Globe & Jerusalem) • Asparagus • Chard • Kohlrabi • Lettuce, •Onion Sets • Peppers • Tomatoes*

Landscape Plants: You can continue to plant cold-hardy and fall-winter growers such as:

- Globemallow Penstemons Brittlebush Blackfoot Golden Columbine
- Goodding's Verbena Red Justicia Fragrant Evening Primrose
- Desert Milkweed Trixis Cleveland Sage White Sage Aloes

Caution: Wait until mid-March to plant frost-tender tropicals such as bougainvillea and lantana.

Want to attract butterflies? If the answer is yes, then plant now to be ready for butterfly migrations in spring and fall. Blanket flower, butterfly weed, desert milkweed, hyssop, sweet alyssum, verbena and yarrow plants are surefire butterfly magnets.

Want to attract Hummingbirds and Celebrate Valentine's Day? Consider Planting an Emu Bush. It's a fantastic shrub that blooms for Valentine's Day and grows well in our desert landscapes. The Valentine Emu Bush (Eremophila maculata 'Valentine') will give you winter color and hummingbirds love it. Our cooler January through March weather brings on the beautiful bright pink flowers. When it's not blooming, it stays green and can handle our heat. Another advantage for home landscapes and common areas is that it only gets to be four to five feet tall. So, it can fit in most landscape areas without needing constant maintenance or getting too large for its space. If you're looking for something in blue, the Emu Bush can help you with that too as there is a Blue Bells Emu Bush (Eremophila hygrophana). This is a smaller shrub only growing to two to three feet tall. It can be placed in an even smaller area than the Valentine Emu Bush. It makes a great patio shrub. The Emu bush isn't just for Valentine's Day.

Romantic Rose

Continuing with a Valentine's Day theme, I'll repeat my recommendation of the last few months to consider planting either *bare root* or *container grown* roses. There is a wide variety still available in local nurseries. Also, there is a perfect month to address maintenance of your roses (see below).

February Garden Tasks

Pruning- Finish pruning nonnative deciduous shade trees and deciduous fruit trees by mid-month. Prune frost sensitive citrus after they begin to leaf out, if needed. As a general rule, citrus needs to be pruned only if there are aberrant branches ruining the shape of the tree.

Maintain Roses- February is also a good month to pay attention to the maintenance of established roses in your garden. They can be fertilized around mid-month which is weeks before a target bloom date of April 1. Some gardeners wait until the first growth has reached 2 inches in length before applying fertilizer.

Finish pruning by mid-month. Rake up and dispose of leaf litter around shrubs, as it may harbor powdery mildew. Apply fresh mulch. Start fertilizing when new growth is about 2 inches long. Continue feeding every 6 weeks in preparation for April's major bloom fest.

Fertilize Fruit Trees- If you did not do so in January, feed citrus with one-third of the tree's annual nitrogen requirement. Fertilize deciduous fruit trees (apple, apricot, pear, plum, and pomegranate) with nitrogen as they begin to leaf out.

Continue harvesting citrus- Fruit sweetens the longer it stays on the tree, so letting it hang is the best storage method. Most citrus, including kumquats, lemons, limes, mandarins, navels, tangelos and pigmented and sweet oranges, can be harvested this month. Taste-test grapefruit and Valencia oranges for sweetness. Many can be harvested through May.

Watch for aphids—These tiny soft-bodied insects are usually grayish-black or green, although a bright yellow-orange color is commonly seen on the stems of desert milkweed. Aphids cluster on tender new plant growth sucking plant juices. Dislodge them with a blast of water from the hose as often as needed. Refrain from spraying chemical pesticides and soon such beneficial insects as lady beetles, green lacewings and parasitic wasps will arrive in your garden to control aphids for you.

Coping With Our Dry Winter

As we continue with our dry spell, you'll need to make certain adjustments to your normal winter watering schedule. Our winter rainfall usually provides more than enough moisture to sustain our landscapes eliminating the need to turn on your irrigation. Consider an overall watering of landscape plants at the end of the month if rainfall is insufficient. Remember to follow the 1, 2, 3 rule: water mature trees to a depth of 3 feet, shrubs to a depth of 2 feet, and herbaceous perennials, agaves, vines, and groundcovers to a depth of 1 foot.

Young and newly transplanted plants need to be watered more frequently than established plants. Watering deeply encourages roots to extend deeper into the soil and thus, helps the plant become established over time.

The good news? There will be far fewer weeds this spring!

Did You Know?

Friendly Pests- Ladybugs and **Green Lacewings** appear later this month and are natural predators of aphids. They have voracious appetites and help keep them under control. Everyone knows what a ladybug looks like. The green lacewing has long, delicate antennae, a slender greenish body, golden- or copper-colored eyes, and two pairs of veined wings.

Native people of the Sonoran Desert- They knew when to plant crops by observing the signs provided by nature. When Mesquite trees began to leaf out as temperatures warmed in late February and early March, the Pima and Papago people were ready to sow seeds. This transition to spring weather finds gardeners eager to begin another planting season.

Ironwood Tree- The ironwood tree is known as a "nurse plant". It provides a safe place for seed germination, and protects seedlings from extreme cold. It also protects saplings from the damaging effects of the sun. Thorny, low-hanging branches shelter young saguaro. The wood of the Ironwood is one of the hardest and heaviest woods in the world and is considered to be non-biodegradable. We have many examples of these very old trees (>150 years) throughout Bellasera, especially in our washes.
