Community to Vote on Pickleball

At the Board's November meeting, it deferred taking any action on requests from many of our residents to allow pickleball to be played on one of our tennis courts. The proposal under consideration was to purchase two movable nets and to re-stripe Tennis Court # 1 (the Court nearest the Basketball Court) for dual activity use. This would allow two pickleball games to be played at any one time. Strong objections to the proposal were voiced by neighboring homeowners and others who were concerned about the offensive noise the activity would generate.

Since the November meeting, the Board has explored several options to address the concerns raised on both sides of the issue. Members of the Board have recently visited our neighboring community, Sincuidados, to observe a similar system employed on their tennis courts and speak with residents there regarding its reception in that community. We have also explored requiring the use of newly developed composite pickleball paddles. These are designed to reduce the noise to a less objectionable level, and the installation of new sound deadening acoustic panels/screens to the perimeter fences at Tennis Court #1 to block or reduce any objectionable noise from our immediate neighbors. The Board has developed a budget for the project, currently estimated not to exceed \$12,000.00.

At its February meeting, the Board decided to put the matter to a vote of the community. A proposal to allow pickleball on Tennis Court #1 will be included on the ballot at our Annual Meeting on April 29. Information will be included in the written materials mailed to homeowners at the end of this month.

Changes at the Board of Directors:

Late last year, **Guy Yates** tendered his resignation from the Bellasera Board of Directors as he intended to sell his home in Bellasera and move back to Arkansas. Guy's home has now sold and we wish to thank Guy for his service on the Board and wish him and **Pat** well in their new home.

At the February 28 meeting of the Board, the Directors appointed **Joe Carlon** to fill the remainder of Guy's' unexpired Board term which will end at the 2019 Annual Meeting of homeowners. **Joe** is a long-time Bellasera resident and has chaired our Security Advisory Committee for many years. **Joe** will be a valuable addition to our Board. Welcome aboard **Joe**!

Bellasera Neighborhood News, March 2008, 10 years ago

- My thanks to everyone who replied to last month's request for opinions on closing the back gate for improved security. The overwhelming theme of the responses was "don't do it"! So...the Board will look at other alternatives for improving the situation. I'll advise you again if we plan to make any changes.
- As we move into next year, we will need to tackle the significant project of painting the view fences throughout the community. This project will create some difficulties for residents that have "rabbit" fences and for anyone that has a considerable amount of plant growth up against their fence. We believe we've delayed this project as long as we can and it's now time to move forward. I want to ask for both your understanding and cooperation as we prepare to paint the fences.--Chuck Roach
- The revised CC&R/Bylaw documents recently approved by members of the Bellasera Community Association will be distributed early in March. The latest amendments to the Design Guidelines, as approved by the Modifications Committee, will also be added to the packet, bringing all three documents current and up-to-date.
- Three members of the Bellasera Board of Directors will be elected at the Association's annual meeting scheduled for Saturday morning, April 19, at 10 a.m. The two year terms of Shawn Meyer, Chuck Roach and Bob Shriver will end in April. The terms of the other directors (Dennis Carson, Bruce Martin, Dennis Noone, David Redman) end in April 2009.
- A majority (198 of 360) of Bellasera homeowners took the time to respond to the resident survey mailed last month. The

- Dan Bradley was a member of the ad hoc committee formed to plan the community's dog park, and he was instrumental
 in monitoring the construction phase of the project. He later coordinated an effort that collected over \$2500 in donations
 from residents that was used for furnishing benches, umbrellas, doggie waste stations, a storage bin, and convenience

March in the Garden

Winter Tightens Its Grip

As we rolled into February, we all expected the normal, smooth transition into spring. After all, since the start of winter, we had been cruising along, basking in the 80's. Admittedly, it was a little warm for some of us, but delightful just the same. Well, we have been given a dose of cold weather for the past few weeks which has not only delayed our crossover into spring, but reminded us that it is still winter, one that most of us are not used to. Unfortunately, the cold spell has not been accompanied by much rain. Our dry winter continues on!

Time to Move On and Into March!

With cold weather, we tend not to pay attention to our garden or landscape. This is understandable as no one wants to get out in the cold and there is little maintenance required this time of year. However, as we move into March, we will hopefully leave the cold behind us and start paying attention because, in spite of our lack of wet weather, the month of March is still a great month for gardening in the desert. So, let's assess where we are and lay out a potential plan of action or, better put, opportunities for your garden.

Assess Your Garden

For starters, take a walk around your property and reacquaint yourself with your surroundings. Some things to pay attention to are as follows:

Frost Damage/Winter Bloomers- We've had plenty of cold weather but avoided any measurable frost. You'll notice our frost sensitive landscape plants, such as **lantana**, are still intact and our flowering perennials such as **bougainvillea**, **penstemon** and **honeysuckle** continue to sparkle and are being joined by other early bloomers such the **senna** as its yellow flowers are beginning to appear.

New Growth- the cold weather and lack of rain has probably put us behind schedule but give it a couple of weeks. As we get rid of this cold air and warm up, your garden will really come alive.

Mesquite Trees- We have a variety of mesquite here in Bellasera and they are quickly losing their leaves at various rates depending on species and exposure. You will find new leaf growth already on some, especially velvet mesquite. **Planting Needs**- Even though most of our gardens here in Bellasera are mature, identify plants that should be replaced. This could be because they have died or are just not doing well due to wrong exposure or improper drainage. Also, there may be an area of your garden that you'd like to enhance. Give it some thought as you look around. I have some suggestions below.

Time To Plant

March is a terrific month for adding most plant types to our low-desert landscapes as warming soil temperatures will enhance seed germination and root development before the arrival of summer's intense heat. It's the ideal time to satisfy a multitude of requirements including **landscape** (Trees, shrubs, groundcovers, vines, perennials, cacti and other succulents etc.) **vegetables, herbs and flowers.**

Local nurseries should be well stocked with fresh offerings for the spring planting season to satisfy your needs. Also, the **Desert Botanical Garden in Phoenix has a Bi-Annual Plant Sale (March 16-18)** featuring the largest variety of arid-adapted plants available in one location. Give it a try. Choose plants based on their mature height and width, matching their size to the space available in your landscape. This advance planning eliminates unnecessary pruning.

Some Planting Suggestions

Warm-season shrubs:

Yellow Bells • Desert Cotton • Sennas • Velvet-pod Mimosa • Fire Bush • <u>Ruellia • Mexican Bush</u>
 Sage • Sky Flower • Bird of Paradise species

Warm-season herbaceous perennials:

• Datura • Desert Four O'Clocks • Plumbago • Wine Cups • Arizona Foldwing • Gaura • Hummingbird Trumpet

Vines:

• Queen's Wreath • Arizona Canyon Grape • Yuca • Passion Flowers • Slender Janusia

Herbs: How about an herb garden to perk up your cooking? Herbs do very well here. Transplant *basil*, *bay*, *chamomile*, *chives*, *epazote*, *feverfew*, *lavender*, *lemon balm*, *lemon grass*, *lemon verbena*, *oregano*, *rosemary*, *sage and santolina*.

Plant Selection Guidelines

Landscape Plants: While perusing nurseries, choose only healthy looking plants being careful not to judge a plant by its container size. Desert plants often appear unimpressive in nursery pots, but once transplanted into the ground,



they grow rapidly. Choose plants based upon their mature size, so that they don't overreach your landscape's available vertical and horizontal spaces.

Trees: Factor in the size of a tree's canopy and root spread. Be sure the canopy won't shade veggie beds; drape over swimming pools, spas and air-conditioning units; or trespass on your neighbor's lot. As a guideline, tree roots spread at least as wide as the canopy and up to four times beyond. In limited spaces, use small trees or large shrubs, because smaller root systems are less likely to damage the hardscape.

Pruning

While March is traditionally an excellent month for planting, consider pruning and general upkeep before planting. In general, pruning should be done to maintain plant health (remove dead, damaged or diseased portions, cross branching, etc.), to highlight the "natural" shape of the plant, to train a young plant, and to eliminate hazards. Excessive

or heavy pruning causes significant stress to trees and shrubs. The best practices are to prune the least amount necessary and prune for legitimate reasons. How much to prune depends on the size, species, age, as well as your intentions. A few good principles to remember--a tree or shrub can recover from several small pruning wounds faster than from a single large wound and never remove more than 25% of the canopy in a year. **Some specific plants that should be considered for pruning:**

Summer and fall flowering shrubs including:

- Texas Sages Yellow Bells Lantana Turpentine Bush Mexican-honeysuckle Sky Flower Black Dalea Tip: Most shrubs tolerate heavy spring pruning to reduce their size and encourage a flush of healthy, lush growth. Warm-season herbaceous perennials, groundcovers and vines including:
- Chocolate Flower Plumbago Mexican Hat Gaura Mealy-cup Sage Passion Vines Rock Verbena Trailing Lantana Dyssodia Queen's Wreath Yellow Orchid-vine

Miscellaneous Pruning Suggestions:

- Continue to deadhead annuals and herbaceous perennials to encourage continued flowering, including Desert Marigold, Red Sage, Angelita-Daisy and Gaillardia.
- •Wait to prune your prickly-pears and chollas until after flowering. Spent stalks of aloes, agaves and other succulents can be removed at this time.
- •Citrus- Do not prune citrus except to remove dead or damaged wood.

Remember: Prune by cutting back to emerging growth or to the basal rosette (group of leaves arranged from a central point).

Drip System/Watering

It's that time of year to turn on your irrigation timer, test the timer to see if it is working properly and replace back-up batteries if necessary. Check for leaks and clogged emitters and flush out the poly lines. With the small amount of rain we've had and, an assumption that temperatures will rise in March, you should plan on watering twice a month, to a depth of two feet deep.

Miscellaneous

Fertilization- Now is the time to fertilize your warm-season cacti, succulents, herbaceous and woody perennials, and annuals in containers. Periodic fertilization may be needed for plants in containers as nutrients will have diminished in the soil over time. Depending on the type of fertilizer used, follow directions on the label.

Continue to fertilize your vegetable and herb garden as needed. March is also a good time to apply a layer of composted mulch to your vegetable and herb beds.

Roses- Continue feeding roses every six weeks to prepare them for spring's peak bloom. Spread fresh mulch to maintain consistent soil moisture, making sure mulch does not touch their stems.

Rosemary- They are in a growth spurt and starting to bloom. Do not prune until they are finished blooming.
