• Trimming Behind the Fences

Just another reminder that AAA Landscaping is continuing to work behind the fences to clear the mandatory 5 foot fire lane behind your home. If you have branches from inside of your fence hanging over (or through) the fences, they will be trimmed back to 8-10" from your fence. Also, as a reminder, if your growth is more than 8-10" over the top of the fence, they will likely start hanging over the fence. Please have your landscapers trim appropriately as we head in to the growing season.

This is an ongoing project, if you want to do something special with your bushes, etc., please do so immediately.

Also, next year we will be once again painting fences throughout the community. You will be responsible for clearing vines on your fences. You might want to start keeping this in mind now. More information will be made available as we get closer to the start of this project.

Why You Should Vote "No" For The Addition Of A Pickle Ball Court

The homeowners that purchased property in the vicinity of the recreation area understood the possibility of noise coming from the tennis, pool and basketball court. The noise has been minimal. Pickleball creates a very high decibel of sound and that's why 26 homeowners in the vicinity petitioned the Board not to change of the use of the court. Pickleball does not benefit the Bellasera community for the following reasons:

- 1) The initial cost is projected at \$12,000. The proposed project will modify an existing Tennis Court to accommodate both Pickleball (PB) and Tennis. Only a handful of Bellasera residents are expected to utilize the PB Courts.
- 2) Current estimated cost of \$12,000 for court modification does not include maintenance, repairs, etc.
- 3) Unfortunately PB creates unusually high noise levels due to the nature of the equipment that is employed. The proposed noise reduction solutions (sound suppression matting around the court and mandatory PB composite racquets) will only at best lessen the noise to a certain degree.
- 4) Mandated PB composite racquets, hours of operation and rotation of the court between PB and Tennis is unenforceable.
- 5) Terravita, at one time accommodated PB. Due to multiple reasons mainly noise level complaints, interference with other sports activities and a proposed lawsuit. PB has been discontinued.
- 6) PB fosters league participation thus increasing the number of outsiders entering our community. It's just par for the course, that they will also be using our Clubhouse amenities. As it is in evidence by our Tennis guests.
- 7) Outside private and some public PB Courts charge a playing fee which will make our free court very attractive.
- 8) PB Courts should be located far from residential homes. Not the location that has been proposed. We would be spending at least \$12,000 for a few Bellasera residents but the vast majority of players benefiting will be outsiders. Research has indicated that the PB Courts will not increase property value. In addition, with the expected high levels of guests entering our beloved community to play free PB as guests, utilization of our clubhouse and its facilities our ceiling of liability with regard to injury will be increasing. We would appreciate you voting "No". Thank You,

Scottsdale Fire Department "Home Safe Home" program helps the elderly and frail reduce falling risks. Trained Fire Department volunteers visit seniors in their homes and point out potential tripping and falling hazards. Snake!

With temperatures consistently approaching the 80s, rattlesnakes and other reptiles are on the move.

Warm weather rouses snakes. They leave their underground lairs to look for food, water and companionship. That can lead to potentially dangerous encounters between reptiles and people.

While many types of snakes pose no threat to people, venomous species — including rattlesnakes — do. According to the Arizona Game & Fish Department there are 13 species of rattlesnakes in the state.

Communities with lots of open spaces have the most snake activity (such as Bellasera). As the weather heats up and dries out, snakes may come closer to homes in search of food and water.

Fortunately, it's not hard to avoid rattlesnakes.

Most importantly, be on the lookout. Avoid reaching under rocks or shrubs without looking first. Be sure to use a flash-light or headlamp when walking at night.

If you're hiking, stay on trails. Those cleared and compacted paths make it easier to spot snakes. Venturing off trail can lead to trouble.

If you're off the trail, you're not going to see (snakes). They are designed to blend into the environment. They do not want to be seen. That's what makes them dangerous.

If you encounter a snake, take a step (or two) back.

Snakes can only strike at a distance of one-third of their body length. A three-foot snake has an effective strike range of 12 inches. The average human stride is 36 inches, so that puts you out of harm's way.

What to do if someone is bitten

Call 911 immediately.

While waiting for help, keep the victim calm and remove jewelry and watches from the bite area.

Dr. Frank LoVecchio, medical director at the Banner Poison Drug and Information Center, recommends keeping the bite area at or above heart level because it helps reduce the pain.

Do not apply ice or a tourniquet to the bite. Do not make an incision and try to suck out the poison. Do not give drugs, alcohol or electric shock treatments.

If someone is bitten while out in a remote area, get him or her to a doctor as soon as possible.

Discourage Snakes From Your Property

The Scottsdale Fire Department's website offers tips for making your property less hospitable to snakes.

- Eliminate rodents a snake's preferred food from around your home.
- Remove wood piles and junk from your yard to eliminate potential homes for snakes and their prey.
- Walls deter snakes from entering your yard. Solid walls 4 feet high with a four-inch lip angling outward will discourage most snakes. Sink the bottom of the wall well into the ground. Fill any tunnels burrowed by rodents.
- Install gates snugly against the ground.
- Keep walkways clear of brush. Light pathways around your home.

Rattlesnakes on your property

Rattlesnake removal around your property is not a DIY activity.

If you find a snake, call the non-emergency number for your local fire department. Keep an eye on the snake so you can direct authorities to it.

Bellasera Neighborhood News, April 2008, 10 years ago

- Congratulations to Freya and Robert Weissner, lucky winners of the \$50 AJ's gift card, drawn from the over 200 Bellasera homeowners who returned the 2008 resident survey. Results of the survey were published in last month's Bellasera Neighborhood News.
- Last spring Dee and Sharon Luse celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary with "old" high school friends.
 The whole group stayed at Camelback Inn for 3 nights of festivities and came up to Bellasera to finish the celebration.
- On a recent Sunday there was a lot of activity around the clubhouse pool, with many residents and their
 guests present. During this time, solid waste was eliminated in the pool and the spa. People who were there
 were obviously dismayed, and reported no one offered to clean it up.
- Recently completed projects include receipt of our new treadmills and installation of the new windscreens at the tennis courts. Our new elliptical trainers should be coming in any day.
- The major project for next fiscal year (JUL 08-JUN 09) will be painting all the view fencing in the community. Bellasera Neighborhood News, April 2013, 5 years ago

- If you drive north on Scottsdale Road, you will notice the Summit Shopping Center, located on the east side of the road just before you reach Carefree Highway. It's a high-volume center that contains a Safeway and a Target surrounded by many other businesses, including three Starbucks. There is nothing unique about that, but the land where the center was built has a story that may not be familiar except to those who have lived in the area for the last 40 or so years.
- The Summit was built in 2000 on 47 acres that used to be part of Carefree Studios, a movie and television production company. It was originally called the Fred Graham Studios when built in 1968, as it was established by Graham, a movie stuntman and actor who appeared in almost all of John Wayne's films. By 1970, Graham had recruited Dick Van Dyke to do a new sitcom series at his property. It was a good fit as Van Dyke was living in nearby Cave Creek and didn't want to make the weekly trip to Hollywood for taping. It was around that time that the property's name was changed to Carefree Studios.
- At a community meeting on the evening of March 7, 2013, the Association's legal counsel in the easement litigation with the owners of the adjacent 12-acre parcel, Jason Smith of the law firm of Carpenter Hazelwood, gave a report regarding the current posture of the lawsuit. Jason also responded to numerous questions from the audience regarding the status of the litigation and its potential impact on Bellasera. We understand many owners were not able to attend the community meeting and members of the Board continue to receive questions on this subject from homeowners. The community meeting was recorded and a transcription of the meeting will be posted on the Bellasera website, along with all of the other easement dispute documents.

April in the Garden

Our Spring, As Beautiful As Ever!

As snowstorms were proliferating in a good portion of our country, spring in the Sonoran Desert was evolving into its usual four-month-long spectacle of life and color, a constant evolutionary beauty. I believe there is no other community that portrays those signs of spring than here, in Bellasera. We are awash in color! Look around and observe:

Shrubs, Vines and Groundcover-Blooming Now

Our **Bougainvillea** has been blooming for the most of the winter and, right on schedule, is now undergoing a growth spurt which will add to their intensity and luster. In addition **Penstemon**, **Fairy Duster**, **Senna** and **Lantana** are coming into their own, adding to the bouquet. It's the tip of the iceberg as a myriad of other "Bloomers" will quickly join the color parade. And, of course, we have our omnipresent **Desert Marigold** with its beautiful yellow flowers cropping up everywhere.

Trees - To Bloom Soon

Bellasera is widely populated with *Palo Verdes* (the desert "bean" tree) and, during the next two or three weeks, they will bloom and make the desert golden. There are four species of green-barked trees: the *Blue palo verde*, the *Foothills palo verde*, the *Mexican palo verde* and the *Palo Brea*. Once pollinated, the yellow flowers will produce edible beans and, as they begin to open, their yellow to creamy blooms will create *corridors of yellow* throughout our community. The first to bloom will be the Blue palo verdes followed by the Foothills palo verdes, about two weeks later. The Mexican palo verdes bloom as the Foothills are finishing and can bloom through August.

Cacti

The cacti will begin to bloom as well, with a few of the prickly pears, chollas, and hedgehogs starting off. By the end of the month, some saguaro cacti will open their big, white flowers.

Time To Enhance Your Garden

Although a lot of this happens naturally, we do enhance and add to the total beauty by nurturing and maintaining our part of the desert. To that point, I'd like to focus on some general maintenance topics including *planting* and *pruning*, as well as some *monthly garden tips*.

Planting

Although your summer planting should be nearly finished, you still have time to add life to your garden. Just remember to choose native plants or plants that are adapted to our high temperatures and alkaline soils. This is a good month for transplanting as you should beat the heat and have them in the ground before temperatures climb beyond 100 degrees. Some suggestions:

- Tropical plants like **Bougainvillea** and **Lantana**.
- Desert-adapted trees, shrubs, groundcovers, vines, ornamental grasses, perennials, cacti and succulents.
- Citrus Trees- Remember, dwarf only and they need to be in the rear of your property.
- Herbs- Transplant warm-season favorites, including basil, lavender, rosemary and sage.
- Warm-Season Veggies-Sow seeds for black-eyed peas, cantaloupe, cucumbers, jicama, lima beans, okra, peanuts and summer squashes, such as crookneck, pattypan and zucchini.

Warm Season Annual Flowers

Your winter-growing annuals should still be doing well and may thrive well into the month. However, as our temperatures begin to climb, they will have to be replaced with warm season annuals. So, when it is time to give up on them, nurseries should soon be providing good choices. Some suggestions are:

- Celosia - Gaillardia - Globe amaranth - Portulaca – Gazania -Zinia -Verbina - Lisianthus - Madagascar periwinkle - Marigold -Petunia

If you have doubts about what to choose, local nurseries are always glad to help.

Pruning

As emphasized last month, pruning should be done to maintain plant health (remove dead, damaged or diseased portions, cross branching, etc.), to highlight the "natural" shape of the plant, to train a young plant, and to eliminate hazards. With this in mind, April is a good month for pruning as follows:

- Continue to prune evergreen trees.
- Lightly prune your **Mesquites** and **Palo Verdes** after bud break or after flowering.
- Pruning newly planted trees and shrubs is **not recommended** and in fact can be detrimental. However, corrective pruning of broken or torn branches and/or limbs can be done at planting time. Save other pruning activities for the second or third year.
- Continue to prune summer and fall flowering shrubs by mid-month including:
 - -Texas Sages -Yellow Bells -Lantana -Turpentine Bush -Mexican-honeysuckle Sky Flower Black Dalea
- Rosemary- Spring growth should be well underway and, following the blossoming of its vivid blue-violet flowers, can be safely trimmed back.

Cactus- If *cholla* or *prickley pear* cactus become too large, they should be cut to a joint with a saw or large clippers. Remember to wear heavy gloves to protect your hands. Also, it is not necessary to treat a cut on these types of cactus if the cut is made at the joint.

Yucca should not be pruned unless it is necessary to remove dead or diseased stems. If you need to prune, cut back to either a joint or as low on the plant as possible and dust the wound generously with powdered sulphur until it completely dries out.

Do you have a shrub that needs to be rejuvenated?

Shrubs that have been repeatedly sheared into unnatural shape are in a near constant state of stress and, over time, develop a thin layer of leaves that scarcely cover an unsightly interior. Give these shrubs a new lease on life by pruning them back to stems 12 to 18 inches high. Follow up a deep watering to support new growth.

Monthly Garden Tasks

Roses- During spring's peak bloom period feed and water to promote continued flowering. Apply fertilizer every two weeks until the heat of summer begins. Water twice per week when temperatures are below 80 degrees, increasing to three times weekly when temperatures are above 80 degrees or conditions are windy, which can dry out foliage and blooms.

Drip System- As mentioned last month, you need to clean out sediment and algae as well as replace clogged emitters and also clean filters. Adjust your drip system to *water more frequently*. How much? This is always one of the hardest questions to answer. Generally, be sure to run your system long enough to wet the top two feet of soil. Deep, infrequent watering is much better than a daily sprinkle.

Feed Citrus- Fertilize trees with their second feeding of the year this month or next. Apply one-third of the tree's total annual nitrogen requirement. Water deeply after spreading the fertilizer.

Weeding- April and May are usually the worst months. However, with our dearth of winter rain, we should get a break this year.

Birds

Birds in the desert are always looking for food and a free handout. If you elect to feed them, please be aware that there are many dangers involved in feeding any of the wildlife here in the desert, the main one being the attraction of predators and other unwelcome visitors such as:

<u>Mice and Rats</u>- They love seeds <u>Snakes</u>- They love mice and rats <u>Coyotes</u>- They love Quail.

In addition, excessive bird droppings can create unsanitary conditions which can cause over sixty transmittable diseases. So, please think it through before you decide to feed the birds, especially this time of year.

Houseplants: Maintenance

As days lengthen, houseplants begin producing fresh shoots. Gradually water more frequently and apply houseplant fertilizer according to package instructions. If roots poke out the bottom of the pot, or if growth was stunted last year, repot in fresh soil. In the process, trim or spread out encircled or overgrown roots, and wait to fertilize for a month to allow roots to re-establish. Clean and disinfect pots with a 10-percent bleach solution (1-part bleach to 9-parts water) before reusing. Don't be afraid to repot a plant! The internet has numerous sites that will help you.

Observations

Shifting of the Sun- We don't change our clocks like most of the country, however, we in Bellasera, are very much aware of the shifting of the sun. First of all, we get to see a lot of the sun and a good number of our homes face north/south. Hence, the sun's shift to the back or front of your house is obvious. Our plant life is certainly aware of this also as everything on the north side of your house will finally catch up to the plantings on the south. Check it out.

Citrus- your citrus should be full of buds and soon they will give off a beautiful spring aroma.

National Arbor Day is April 29- This day is set aside to celebrate trees. Just a reminder, trees increase home values, improve air quality, provide shade, lower surrounding temperatures, attract wildlife, stymie strong winds and lower utility costs.
