Bulk trash shall not be stored in the front area of any home. Bulk trash shall be placed in the trash pick-up area no earlier than three days prior to the designated beginning day of the week specified for bulk trash pick-up by the City of Scottsdale.

TALIESIN WEST

Of all the interesting places to visit in the Valley of the Sun, a favorite of many visitors and residents is Taliesin West, the winter home and school in the desert for Frank Lloyd Wright from 1937 until his death in 1959 at the age of 91. Today it is the main campus of the School of Architecture at Taliesin and houses the Frank Lloyd Wright Foundation.



Wright and his Taliesin Fellowship started their "trek" to Arizona to escape the frigid weather of Wisconsin in 1935 and Wright soon realized that Arizona is where he wanted to spend his winter months. He paid \$3.50 an acre for land on a southern slope of the McDowell Range overlooking Paradise Valley outside Scottsdale.

Wright believed this to be the perfect place for a building that would include a residence, a place of business and a place to learn. He said, "Finally I learned of a site twenty-six miles from Phoenix, across the desert of the vast Paradise Valley, up to a great mesa in the mountains. On the mesa just below McDowell Peak, we stopped, turned and looked around. The top of the world."

Wright felt very stongly about the connection to the desert. He said, "Arizona needs its own architecture...Arizona's long, low,

sweeping lines and uptilting planes. Surface patterned after such abstraction in line and color as fine 'realism' in the patterns of the rattle-snake, the Gila monster, the chameleon, and the saguaro, cholla or staghorn - or is it the other way around."

If you have not visited Taliesin West, now is the perfect time to do so. The cooler fall and winter months make a perfect time to take one or more of the tours offered. They offer an "Insights Tour" that allows you to visit Wrights' private quarters and living room, the drafting studio, the Music Pavilion, the Cabaret, and more. This tour is usually about 90 minutes.

Also offered is a "Night Lights Tour." This two hour tour allows you to enjoy Wright's desert masterpiece that "glows warmly like a jewel under Arizona's starry skies."

A "Behind the Scenes" tour allows you to enjoy tea and snacks in the colorful Taliesin West Dining Room before visiting areas not seen on the general tours.

Whatever tour you decide to take, you'll be amazed by the work done by Wright's apprentices at Taliesin West. You might even decide to become a member of the Foundation and receive a discounted price on tours and items in the excellent gift shop.

OCTOBER IN THE GARDEN

September Doldrums Are Over....Welcome To The Delightful Month Of Change!

September was certainly true to form, we hoped for cooler weather, but it never materialized.

Even though our summer monsoon provided much needed moisture and nutrients for your plants and trees, the hot September has left your garden wanting for attention. Help is on the way as our recent cool morning and evening temperatures mornings are a preview of coming attractions as we can now expect seven or eight months of moderate, comfortable weather.

This is the Month to Dig In!

In September, we touched on fall planting but emphasized that October is the low desert's (we live in the heart of it) best month to plant just about everything—trees, shrubs, perennials, groundcovers, vines, ornamental grasses, cacti, succulents, wildflowers, cool-season veggies, herbs and flowers. We are truly in our prime planting month! Temperatures will abate to a comfortable level, while our soil remains sufficiently warm to promote seed germination and root growth. Seven to eight months of moderate temperatures are ahead of us, which will allow plants to establish before summer's heat returns. So forget garden maintenance chores this month and Dig In!

What to Plant-Some Suggestions

Cool-Season Vegetables- Why do we call them cool season veggies? They respond to short days and cool nights and they are grown from September through April. So, sow seeds directly into the soil for *peas, root crops* (beets, carrots, onions, parsnips, radishes, kohlrabi, and turnips), chard and all sorts of leafy greens. Sow seeds or set out transplants in the cabbage family (bok choy, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower and kale).

In the September column, I included a detailed list of which cool season veggies to plant and when to plant them.

Herbs-Growing herbs are really very easy. If you prefer not to dig, most of them can be easily grown in pots. Also, "starter pots" are available at most grocery stores at a reasonable price.

Some suggestions:

Sow seeds for:

borage •caraway •chamomile •chervil •chives •cilantro • dill •fennel •lemon •balm •parsley •salad burnet • sorrel
 horehound

Transplant:

marjoram •mint •oregano •rosemarythyme •sage.

Spice up culinary options with:

•chocolate mint •lemongrass •pineapple sage.

Shrubs- Here in the Sonoran Desert, we do not get the brilliant fall colors like other areas. However, I would recommend that you consider several shrubs (below) that rise to the occasion. • Heavenly Bamboo • Firebush • Beach Vitex • Crape Myrtle • Copper-leaved • Caesalpinia • Mexican Jumping Bean When planting shrubs, follow these simple steps:

- Prepare a hole that is three to five times as wide as the container and just as deep.
 Most soil amendments, including mulch,
- are unnecessary. However, if you choose to use mulch or compost in the hole, scratch it in well and roughen the sides of the hole to encourage the plant to move out of the hole.

 3.Do not prune as you plant. It is tempting to prune shrubs in containers that are overgrown or unruly or have lost their form. However, pruning as you plant can severely reduce the vigor of the plant and increase the time it takes to overcome transplant shock. To start a good root system, it is best not to trim anything but dead wood from a plant as you're planting it. There should be plenty of time next year to correct any deficiencies in the form of the plant.

Overhaul & Rejuvenate Flower Beds

If you have summer annual flower beds (most likely in pots), it's time to pull them out (per-

haps compost them) and replace them with cool season annuals which are best planted in mid-to-late October. The nurseries will be packed with glorious selections in every size, color, and shape. Spend time preparing the soil which simply entails tilling the soil (invest in a hand held cultivator) and adding some amendment along with potting soil, if needed. To help you, below is an extensive list (which I like to publish every October) with color info along with guidance on where to plant them (sun, shade, etc.), Remember, fall flowers need to establish their roots in warm soils. So, starting them now gets a healthy root system developed before the cool fall and cooler winter slows them down.

- •Alyssum: A low growing border plant in white, pink or purple. Full sun to light partial shade.
- **Begonia:** Gives masses of color in shady spots, red, pink or white in dark leafed varieties, or a mixture of colors in green leafed types.
- *Calendula:* Yellow or orange flowers with dark centers make excellent cut flowers. Needs sun.
- *Chrysanthemum paludosum:* Miniature daisy flowers cover this low growing annual in a cloud of white. Use for sunny borders.
- *Dianthus:* An array of reds, pinks, violets and white adorn these specially selected Sweet Williams. Sun or partial shade.
- **Dusty Miller:** A foliage plant with silver colored leaves. Full sun to partial shade.
- *Geranium:* Available in a rainbow of colors. Full sun to partial shade.
- *Linaria:* Covered in mini snapdragon-shaped flowers of blue, yellow or red. Full sun.
- **Lobelia:** Arizona's favorite border plant for sun or partial shade. Deep purple, blue, rose, lilac and mixed colors.
- *Ornamental Kale:* Great foliage color in predominately purple or white. Full sun.
- **Pansy and Viola:** The most popular flower for fall and winter, these hardy free blooming plants are available in a wide variety of colors to suit any décor. Pick a sunny spot for best results. Violas will take light shade.
- **Petunia:** Reds, pinks, whites, burgundy and blues. Full sun.

- **Poppies and Primroses:** These favorites will be ready for you when the weather starts to turn cold. Iceland poppies for bright sunny spots and traditional primrose for shady areas.
- **Snapdragons:** Taller mid-sized varieties are great for cut flowers or colorful backgrounds. Dwarf types make fantastic borders. Either way, you can't go wrong with their rainbow of colors for sunny spots.
- **Stock:** Harmony and Trisomic varieties are very fragrant and make tremendous cut flowers. Midgets make excellent border plants. *Full sun.*

Note: It might be helpful to distinguish an annual vs. perennial. Simply put:

If a flower is an annual it means that the plant will only grow one season. If a flower is called a perennial then it means it will come up year after year, continuing to bring you beautiful flowers. Feel free to plant a perennial as long as it blooms in the fall through winter.

Miscellaneous Tasks

Citrus- Late summer application of nitrogen fertilizer will help fruit sizing. This is more significant for fall ripening (navel oranges and tangerines) than spring-ripening (grapefruit and Valencia oranges).

Prune Perennials- Cut back spring-flowering perennials like brittlebush, globe mallow, ruellia, and groundcovers like sundrops, and trailing bush hard this month. If the plant is especially leggy or unruly, prune to remove at least 1/3 of the plant or more. After pruning, water well.

Deciduous Fruit Trees- Prune the water sprouts.

Landscape Plants- Cut off spent blooms to stimulate rebloom.

Weed Control- Pre-emergent herbicides can be applied from October through early December for winter weed control. Follow the package directions carefully for best results. Do not use pre-emergent herbicides where you will be planting seeds this season.

Mesquite Trees- If your Mesquite trees are looking tall and scraggly, take action now to do some corrective pruning.

Roses- Resume full fertilizing of established roses as the weather cools.

Fertilize- If you did not fertilize established cold-hardy shrubs last month, do so early this month. This is the final fertilization of the year.

Watering

Yes, it is finally time to cut back on your watering. Reduce watering frequencies as plant needs decrease with shortening, cooling days. Once the temperatures begin dipping below 100° gradually start cutting back water to all plants to begin hardening them off for the winter. Remember, both frequency and duration need to be adjusted gradually. Do not stop cold turkey. Change your irrigation timer to reflect the changes in temperature.

October Musings & Observations
