The City of Scottsdale recently conducted an inspection of the roadways and washes in Bellasera. They brought to the attention of management that some landscaping crews are blowing cacti into the washes instead of disposing of them properly. There is a large amount of the debris and the City's concern is that the cacti will clog the drains after a rain which will cause a significant amount of problems. Bellasera management is asking for your cooperation by speaking with your landscape company to ensure that they abide by the Codes regarding the open areas and washes. The City will do a follow-up inspection in a few days to see if the debris has been cleared.

From the Board

Included below are items that were discussed and acted upon during the Board of Directors meeting held on Wednesday, September 25, 2019.

1. Paul Rippens, former Chief of Forestry of Los Angeles County Fire Department was appointed as Wildfire Safety Advisor to the Board. The Wildfire Safety Advisor will, from time to time, advise the Board with recommendations the Board should consider for

fire protection on Bellasera's common areas.

- 2. The Scottsdale Fire Marshal inspected dead trees within the NAOS near the clubhouse and approved the removal of approximately 20 dead trees. The Board anticipates the Fire Marshall will help us identify additional dead trees in our community and hopefully approve their removal.
- 3. The status of the fence painting project scheduled for next spring was discussed and it was reported a Statement of Work is being prepared in anticipation of obtaining bids.
- 4. An annual maintenance agreement for the Life Fitness exercise and cardio equipment was awarded to Gym Tech.
- 5. The next meeting of the Board of Directors of the Bellasera Community Association will be held on Wednesday, November 6, 2019 at 10:30 a.m.
- 6. At the Communications Committee meeting held on Wednesday, September 18, 2019, recommendations were made regarding the use of personal email addresses used in the newsletter and on the web site. The Board recommends the Communication Committee shall:
- a. Remove the personal email addresses of Board members and Committee Members from the Bellasera web page and the Bellasera newsletter. In lieu of individual email addresses, the Committee shall take such action as it determines to substitute a global email address for the Board and each Committee, which is then routed to each member, as the case may be.
- b. Coordinate with AAM to add a link on the Bellasera web page linking to the AAM BILL PAY that will allow a resident to view their personal account and take action to pay any outstanding amounts.
- c. Coordinate with AAM to add a link on the Bellasera web page linking to AAM to allow residents to view Bellasera financial statements.

TIME IS GROWING SHORT

Are you remembering that in a few short months contractors will begin painting all the view fences in the Bellasera Community? That's right. In the months of February and March, 2020, all the view fences will receive a fresh coat of paint and you must do your part. Here is what you have to do:

- All vines must be removed from the view fences and shrubs or trees trimmed back to allow at least two feet for workers to access the fence. Please speak to your landscaper/gardener now to make sure all the work is completed no later than the last day of January, 2020.
- You are responsible for removing rabbit fencing from your view fence. After the painting is completed, you may reinstall the rabbit fencing.
- There are no exceptions to preparing the view fencing in your yard for painting.

We realize that trimming vines, shrubs and trees along with the removal of the rabbit fencing may be an inconvinence to you but it is necessary for the Bellasera Community to maintain the view fencing. Your cooperation in this matter is very much appreciated.

October in the Garden

We Made It...Welcome To The Delightful Month Of October! The Heat Switch Was Turned Off

Last month, I bemoaned the situation we were in regarding our unfriendly, dry, monsoon. Well, most of September provided us with more of the same... hot, dry and, hostile to your garden weather. However, if you recall, I also told you not to give up hope as we had

the same situation in 2014 until September come to the rescue. Well, it took until the end of the month, but consider us rescued as we got some welcome rain and a preview of real fall weather. The rain totals might not end up being a repeat of 2014, but I'll take it!

The Month Of Change

Traditionally, October ushers in a delightful change in our weather as evidenced by our cool morning and evening temperatures. This is a reminder that we can now look forward to seven or eight months of a moderate, comfortable environment. More importantly, October provides an opportunity to give our gardens some new life as it is the prime planting month here in the low desert.

What To Plant

It is the best month to plant just about everything:

- trees · shrubs · perennials · groundcover · vines · ornamental grasses · cacti
- \cdot succulents \cdot wildflowers \cdot cool-season veggies \cdot herbs \cdot flowers

Survey your garden and identify your needs whether it is to replace something that isn't doing well or a simple addition. Temperatures have abated to a comfortable level and soil remains sufficiently warm to promote seed germination and root growth. Seven to eight months of moderate temperatures are ahead of us which will allow plants to establish before summer's heat returns.

Some suggestions:

<u>Citrus Trees</u>- Right now there is a wide selection of citrus available in our local nurseries; orange, grapefruit, tangerine, etc. Citrus are easy to plant as you simply have to remember to prepare a hole no deeper than the plant's root ball but at least twice the width of their containers. This promotes root growth out into the native soil. **Remember: Only dwarf citrus trees are allowed in Bellasera.** These will still provide you with plenty of fruit.

<u>Shrubs</u>- If you'd like to add some brilliant fall colors to your garden, consider the following: *Heavenly Bamboo* - An Asian plant which turns bright red to red- orange in the fall.

Firebush - As the weather cools, leaves begin to turn a dark coppery red. They remain this color through the winter.

Beach Vitex - Before this deciduous shrub loses its leaves they turn a dusky purple-red.

Crape Myrtle - Coloring is variable, but most plants turn a reddish hue before they lose their leaves.

Mexican Jumping Bean - This hot weather loving shrub leaves turn a fiery red in late winter.

Copper-leaved Caesalpinia - The small leaves turn from a deep burnished red to a bright golden red through the winter.

Texas Sage - In the early development of Bellasera, Texas Sage was always included in a Landscapers list which is certainly borne out in driving around the neighborhood. It is an excellent choice. It has a lot of redeeming values. They are easy to care for, compact, drought-resistant and attractive bushes, a profuse bloomer, Sage attracts hummingbirds, bees and butterflies, from late winter to early fall. Its blooms make excellent cut flowers, and its fragrant foliage has been known to repel pests. Some suggestions: Chaparral Sage • Desert Sage • Red Sage • White Sage

<u>Cool-Season Vegetables</u>- If you are into vegetables, now is the time to sow seeds directly into the soil for *peas, root crops* (beets, carrots, onions, parsnips, radishes, kohlrabi, turnips), chard and all sorts of leafy greens. Sow seeds or set out transplants in the cabbage family (bok choy, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower and kale). Why do we call them cool season veggies? They respond to short days and cool nights and they are grown from September through April. In the September column, I included a detailed list of which cool season veggies to plant and when to plant them. You can find the column archived at www.azbellasera.org.

Brighten up Your Winter Surroundings....Bring Color to Your Patio

If you planted summer annuals, now is the time to think about replacing them with winter flowers. If you didn't plant summer flowers, think about adding color to your surroundings this winter with some flower beds (preferably in pots) as the nurseries will be packed with glorious selections in every size, color, and shape. Below, is my annual list of suggestions with color info along with guidance on **where to plant them** (sun, shade, etc.), Remember, fall flowers need to establish their roots in warm soils. So, starting them now gets a healthy root system developed before the cool fall and cooler winter slows them down.

- Alyssum: A low growing border plant in white, pink or purple. Full sun to light partial shade.
- **Begonia**: Gives masses of color in *shady spots*, red, pink or white in dark leafed varieties, or a mixture of colors in green leafed types.
- *Calendula*: Yellow or orange flowers with dark centers, makes excellent cut flowers. *Needs sun*.
- *Chrysanthemum paludosum*: Miniature daisy flowers cover this low growing annual in a cloud of white. *Use for sunny borders.*
- *Dianthus*: An array of reds, pinks, violets and white adorn these specially selected Sweet Williams. *Sun or partial shade*.
- Dusty Miller: A foliage plant with silver colored leaves. Full sun to partial shade.
- *Geranium*: Available in a rainbow of colors. *Full sun to partial shade.*
- Linaria: Covered in mini snapdragon-shaped flowers of blue, yellow or red. Full sun.
- **Lobelia**: Arizona's favorite border plant for *sun or partial shade*. Deep purple, blue, rose, lilac and mixed colors.
- Ornamental Kale: Great foliage color in predominately purple or white. Full sun.
- *Pansy and Viola*: The most popular flower for fall and winter, these hardy free blooming plants are available in a wide variety of colors to suit any décor. Pick a *sunny spot* for best results. Violas will take *light shade*.

- Petunia: Reds, pinks, whites, burgundy and blues. Full sun.
- **Poppies and Primroses**: These favorites will be ready for you when the weather starts to turn cold. Iceland poppies for bright *sunny spots* and traditional primrose for *shady areas*.
- Snapdragons: Taller mid-sized varieties are great for cut flowers or colorful backgrounds.
 Dwarf types make fantastic borders. Either way, you can't go wrong with their rainbow of colors for sunny spots.
- **Stock**: Harmony and Trisomic varieties are very fragrant and make tremendous cut flowers. Midgets make excellent border plants. *Full sun*.

Revitalize Your Garden...Restore Nutrients

In addition to planting, you should spend some time *fertilizing* and *acidifying* your citrus trees and other plants. Frequent watering has been necessary to make it through a tough summer and a mediocre monsoon. However, this results in salt slowly building in the soil each time you water and depletes the available nutrients. By fertilizing this month, you will give all your plants a much-needed boost that will be rewarded with a flush of growth, green, and blooms.

Watering

Our temperatures have begun to dip below 100° which means you can gradually start cutting back water to all plants to begin hardening them off for the winter. Remember, both frequency and duration need to be adjusted gradually. Do not stop cold turkey. Change your irrigation timer to reflect the changes in temperature.

Miscellaneous Tasks

Roses- Resume full fertilizing of established roses as the weather cools.

Citrus- Late summer application of nitrogen fertilizer will help fruit sizing. This is more significant for fall ripening (navel oranges and tangerines) than spring-ripening (grapefruit and Valencia oranges).

Deciduous Fruit Trees- Prune the water sprouts.

Landscape Plants- Cut off spent blooms to stimulate rebloom.

Weed Control- Pre-emergent herbicides can be applied from October through early December for winter weed control. Follow the package directions carefully for best results. Do not use pre-emergent herbicides where you will be planting seeds this season.

Mesquite Trees- If your Mesquite trees are looking tall and scraggly, take action now to do some corrective pruning.

Observations and Musings

Snakes - Most snakes head to winter burrows this month. Although they remain fairly inactive in the colder months, keep in mind that they can emerge any time of year if enough warm days pass to sufficiently rouse them.

Think Pumpkin....As in pies, latte, soup, pudding, ice cream and cheesecake.

Don't Forget.... Oct31-Halloween, Nov3- Clocks elsewhere are turned back (not ours!)
