Veterans Day (originally known as Armistice Day) is a federal holiday in the United States observed annually on November 11, for honoring military veterans, that is, persons who have served in the United States Armed Forces. It coincides with other holidays including Armistice Day and Remembrance Day which were celebrated in other countries that mark the anniversary of the end of World War I. Major hostilities of World War I were formally ended at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918, when the Armistice with Germany went into effect. At the urging of major U.S. veteran organizations, Armistice Day was renamed Veterans Day in 1954.

Veterans Day is distinct from Memorial Day, a U.S. public holiday in May. Veterans Day celebrates the service of all U.S. military veterans, while Memorial Day honors those who have died while in military service. Armed Forces Day celebrated in May, honors those currently serving in the U.S. military.

Please read the names of Bellasera residents listed on page 10 who have served in the United States Armed Forces. We thank them for their service to their country.

TIME IS GROWING SHORT

Are you remembering that in a few short months contractors will begin painting all the view fences in the Bellasera Community? That's right. In the months of February and March, 2020, all view fences will receive a fresh coat of paint and you must do your part. Here is what you have to do:

- All vines must be removed from the view fences and shrubs or trees trimmed back to allow at least six inches of space for workers to access the fence. Please speak to your landscaper/gardener now to make sure all work is completed no later than the last day of January, 2020.
- You are responsible for removing rabbit fencing from your view fence. After the painting is completed, you may reinstall the rabbit fencing.
- There are no exceptions to preparing the view fencing in your yard for painting.

We realize that trimming vines, shrubs and trees along with the removal of the rabbit fencing may be an inconvience to you but it is necessary for the Bellasera Community to maintain the view fencing. Your cooperation in this matter is very much appreciated.

Hidden in the Hills to Feature Jewelry by Bellasera Artist

Arizona's largest and longest-running artist studio tour, Hidden in the Hills, takes place during the last two weekends of November, Friday through Sunday, November 22 – 24 and November 29 – December 1. A signature event of the non-profit Sonoran Arts League, this year's studio tour features 199 artists in 47 studio locations throughout the scenic Desert Foothills communities of Cave Creek, Carefree and North Scottsdale.

The free, self-guided studio tour offers seasoned collectors and art enthusiasts a rare chance to observe artists at work in their private studios, which are open to the public from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. during the six-day tour. Each studio has one or more guest artists who also display and sell their work.

One such artist is **Shelly Taylor**, who resides in our Bellasera community. This will be her third year participating in the art tour.

"I design and handcraft jewelry, specializing in contemporary beaded kumihimo, and other bead weaving techniques," **Taylor** said. "I strive for comfortably elegant pieces that can be worn effortlessly. My work often incorporates semi-precious gemstones, hand-blown glass, and metal beads. I love the tactile experience of beading, and the ever-evolving combination of techniques, colors and textures."

During Hidden in the Hills, Taylor will exhibit and sell her jewelry at Studio #29 in Scott-sdale, hosted by acclaimed abstract painter, **Bela Fidel**. The studio is now in a new location, 33401 N. 56th Street, Building #200, and conveniently located just south of Carefree Highway. Other guest artists at the studio this year include mixed media artist **Sherri Congrove**, glass artist **Brian Willis**, mixed media artist **Kristine Kollasch** and mixed media artist **Linda Peterson**.

Art enthusiasts can find details about participating artists, custom-build their own map or download a map at **www.HiddenInTheHills.org**. In addition, a new navigation app is available for free download at the iTunes App store or Google Play (search for "Sonoran Arts League mobile"). The app allows you to navigate from studio to studio while on tour.

The Sonoran Arts League's Center for the Arts will serve as the information headquarters for the popular art tour. November in the Garden by Joe Mc Dade

Cool Nights, Short Days and.... Beautiful Surroundings!

It took a while, but October finally succumbed to fall bringing us comfortable daytime temperatures along with cool nights. And, as we enter into November, expect more of the same delightful weather providing us with an opportunity to truly enjoy and appreciate our surroundings and, for our returning winter residents, a pleasant welcome mat.

It's Rest Time For Your Garden... Prepare for Winter and Show Color!

Your garden also looks forward to this month as our *cool nights, short days* and *milder temperatures* will lull your garden into a much needed rest now through January. Plants actually move sugars and other energy, which has been manufactured all season by the leaves, into storage until needed next spring. With this change in season, you will need to make adjustments in how to care for your garden in preparation for winter. Also, let me remind you that our gardens in Bellasera don't go dark in the winter as they will exude plenty of color (with your help). As you drive through our community now, you can't help but notice the Lantana and Bougainvillea which are currently in full bloom. The two major themes for the month are:

- How to prepare your garden for winter.
- Suggestions and ideas on how you can add and maintain winter color in your garden.

Winter Preparations

Water Efficiently- Plant requirements for moisture diminishes as weather cools and day length shortens. Cutting back on watering helps plants to transition into dormancy, thereby preparing them to resist freezing temperatures, and also lessens the likelihood of root rot from too wet soil. So, you'll need to adjust irrigation timers to run less frequently.

General Watering Guidelines- Apply the same amount of water to soak through the entire root zone of a plant but not as frequently. In other words, reduce watering frequency, not time of watering. Follow the 1-2-3 Rule: Water should penetrate 1 foot deep for shallow-rooted plants (annuals, perennials, cacti, succulents); 2 feet deep for shrubs, and 3 feet deep for trees. Remember, most of the Trees in Bellasera are mature and shouldn't require any watering. Some specific watering tips:

Herbs- Water established herbs once a week or less depending on the temperature.

Vegetables - Should be watered every three days.

Desert Adapted Plants (established) - Water every 14 to 30 days through December.

Fertilization- Do not fertilize roses or tropical landscape plants (i.e., bougainvillea, hibiscus), as fertilizer encourages tender new growth that is prone to frost damage.

Weed Control- Pre-emergent herbicides can be applied from October through early December for winter annual weed control. Follow the package directions carefully for best results. DO NOT use pre-emergent herbicides where you will be planting seeds this season.

Cleanup- It's time to clean up the entire garden. Pull weeds and take out spent annuals as well as

vegetables which can harbor insects and diseases during the winter season.

Avoid Frost Problems- Now is the time to begin planning for frost events. Historically, the first freeze can occur as early as November 15, although unlikely for us this year. However, you should stockpile old sheets and blankets in a handy location to cover cold-tender plants, along with flower and vegetable beds, if temperatures dip.

Pruning- Pruning is necessary for health and safety. Some guidelines:

Trees- Most trees are dormant by the end of this month. Avoid lion-tailing, which is excessive interior thinning. This forces the growth of branches outward, straining and weakening them.

<u>Deciduous trees</u> (those that lose their leaves)- Can be pruned now as it is easy to see flaws that need correcting, such as crossed branches. Palo Verde - Avoid pruning in the winter. <u>Mesquites</u> - Should receive a light pruning now.

Shrubs and Perennials - Can be pruned now including: • Texas Ranger • Globe Mallow • Brittlebush

Do not prune Yellow Bells or Lantana. Most herbs can be pruned this month.

Will Your Garden have Color This Winter?

Although winter conditions will put your gardens to rest through January, you can continue to plant frost-hardy and native woody shrubs and include items that will brighten your garden for the winter and spring. Things might not look bad yet but, once the temperatures drop, most plants will be closing down and going dormant for the winter. If you'd like to add some color that blooms in the fall and winter as well as liven up your yard for the holidays, you can do it with the right plants. **Here are some good shrub options.**

Barberry – This shrub is evergreen and has yellow flowers that bloom from late winter to spring. It makes a good informal hedge and attracts birds.

Weeping Dalea – This shrub that has a spreading shape and is evergreen. It has purple clusters of flowers that bloom from the fall to the spring.

Red Erempholia – Rounded evergreen shrub with red tubular flowers that bloom from late winter to spring. This plant attracts hummingbirds.

Chuparosa – Sprawling plant that is semi-evergreen with orange to red tubular flowers that bloom from late winter to spring. It attracts hummingbirds too.

Red Justica – Sprawling evergreen shrub. It has bright red flowers that bloom from the fall to the spring. It can be used in containers.

Green Feathery Senna – Round and airy shrub with yellow clusters of flowers that bloom from late winter to spring.

These shrubs can add winter color to your yard and make it more inviting.

Bulbine – It forms small clumps to 18 inches tall by 2 to 3 feet across with fleshy bright-green leaves that look good all year around. Its flowers are a tall spike of small yellow blossoms.

Indigo Bush- This evergreen shrub has an open, rounded growth form to 5 feet tall and wide. Its delicate silver foliage provides a striking contrast to the masses of violet flowers produced in winter and early spring. Indigo bush is quite susceptible to over watering, so plant it in well-drained soil and be careful to not kill it with kindness. The nectar-rich blossoms attract bees and butterflies.

Black Dalea - This shrub blooms in late fall with masses of bright purple flowers. It is evergreen and forms a rounded mound of gray-green foliage to 4 feet tall by 5 feet wide. As with Indigo bush, it needs full sun and is very tolerant of reflected heat. The bees cover this shrub during the bloom season.

Emu Bush - Blooming on this shrub begins in January and is in full swing by Valentine's Day. The masses of tubular red flowers are truly spectacular. For the rest of the year, this evergreen shrub provides nice deep green foliage and a dense rounded form. Plant in full sun and allow it plenty of room as it can quickly grow to 4 feet tall by 5 feet wide. It is cold hardy to the mid-20s.

Angelita Daisy - This is one of the best perennials to plant for year round color. Although blooming slows down in winter months, it can still be counted on to provide a splash of sunny yellow in the garden with its slender bright-green leaves.

Santa Rita Prickley Pear- This is the cactus with the rich purple pads the provide lots of winter color. It has a yellow bloom that appears in late spring. You should be able to find a good selection of these at our local nurseries

Did You Know?

Anna's and Costa's hummingbirds are the most common hummingbirds at feeders now; both will breed in the winter. Some Costa's hummingbirds leave southern Arizona for the winter, returning in early spring to breed before the summer drought sets in.

Small Animals- As the days shorten and temperatures become cooler, reptiles, squirrels and ground squirrels will become inactive. Cottontails will still be afoot, and pursued, as our larger desert mammals such as bobcats and coyotes remain active throughout the winter.

Vegetables for the Month

We are residents of Bellasera and have noticed an infestation of mosquitos this year.

Please be sure you are draining saucers of all flower pots or flower boxes in addition to making sure you are running your water feature and that it is chlorinated well and that it is not green water sitting stagnant where mosquitos thrive. Any buckets, wheel barrels or anything outside your home that holds water, even a small amount, is enough to breed mosquitos. Run your water feature, chlorinate it or drain it if it's not used. There has been a definite increase in mosquitos here in Bellasera this year due to neglected water features such as ponds, waterfalls, etc. Female mosquitos can lay up to 300 eggs at a time in stagnant water.--Bruno & Elaine LeDonne
