View Fence Painting/Side-View Fence Painting And Rabbit Fencing View Fence Painting:

The "big" project that will occur during the first quarter of 2020 is the view fence painting. The view fence is the fence between you and common area, and not any fencing between Lot owners. Our CC&Rs mandate the Association with the sole responsibili-

ty to care for and maintain the main view fence. It is something that must be done periodically to maintain the fence's useful life according to our reserve study. We recently awarded the painting contract to DR Paint (they painted the view fencing the last time). A schedule will be posted as soon as it is developed in coordination with the contractor.

All rabbit fencing, vegetation, plants, etc. must be removed from the fence between your lot and the common areas prior to painting.

The main view fence will be painted from the common area side, and we doubt the contractor will need access to anyone's yard to paint the main view fence. However, if they do need to access a yard, the owner will be noticed beforehand.

Side-View Fence Painting:

The side-view fence is the fence between lots, separating owners. You and your next door neighbor can hire DR Paint to paint the side-view fence between you and your neighbor. The side-view fence is private property, co-owned by adjoining residents and not common area, so the Association is not responsible for its maintenance, and will not be involved with painting any sideview fences. The Association will not coordinate any work with DR Paint to paint the side-view fence. If you and your neighbor agree to have the side fences painted, you and your neighbor are responsible to make arrangements directly with the contractor and coordinate to remove the vegetation from the side fences.

DR Paint quoted the cost for painting the

side-view fence painting at \$35.00. The Association will not pay DR Paint for painting any side-view fence. We ask that all residents coordinate with their neighbors to split the cost (\$17.50 each! What a deal!). If you cannot coordinate with your neighbor, but still would like to have the side-view fence painted, you will be solely responsible to pay the entire \$35.00 fee.

The resident who contacts Dave to schedule side-view fence painting will be billed for and responsible for making payment to DR Painting for the entire \$35.00.

You must contact DR PAINT directly at 480-570-5038 and schedule with Dave.

You must contact them prior to your backview fence being painted as they will not "back track" and paint the side-view fence once the main view fencing has been painted.

DR PAINT employees must have access to one of the yards in order to paint the sideview fence.

DR PAINT will provide a schedule of what and when areas will be painted. As of this date we do not yet have the schedule. We will post the schedule as soon as it is developed.

Rabbit Fencing:

All rabbit fencing must be removed before DR Paint arrives to paint the main view fence. DR Paint will not remove or replace any rabbit fencing. You must do the work or arrange to have the work performed by your landscaper or another contractor. The Association will not take part in the removal or replacement of any rabbit fencing. We hoped to provide a list of contractors' owners can contact to perform that work, but none have responded to date. We will post a list if we get fortunate enough to find contractors willing to do the work.

Food Drive Success: Thanks also to the many food contributions received for our 1000 pound 2009 Food Drive. While we exceeded last year's collection, we were shy of our goal by less than half. We collected 630 pounds of food which is an impressive amount.

Social Committee starts New Year's with a complimentary Holiday Brunch for all residents. Please join your neighbors in welcoming in the New Year and enjoy a fully catered brunch hosted by the Bellasera HOA. If you plan on attending the annual New Year's brunch, please sign the reservation sheet at the clubhouse. Brunch is January 1, from 1 - 3 p.m. We hope to see you there. As with all events, soft drinks ONLY are provided by Bellasera. Residents are welcome to bring other beverages of their choice. We hope to see you there.

Our primary mission in enforcing the Governing Documents is to gain compliance on a voluntary basis. It is not to punish our residents in a heavy-handed manner. However, when it is clear a resident is aware of the violation and still refuses to comply, it is sometimes necessary to impose fines to gain enforcement. The Association has the option of attempting to resolve the matter itself and billing the resident or filing a lawsuit. Both of these approaches are potentially costly and very contentious. So far, the Association has not had to resort to these approaches to gain compliance. I hope we never will! --Chuck Roach

January 2015: Bellasera resident Gregg Dittoe, 61, passed away Saturday, December 20 due to complications from leukemia. A memorial service was held on Saturday, December 27 at Highlands Church in Scottsdale. The large number of current and former Bellasera residents in attendance attest to residents' appreciation for his many contributions to the Bellasera community. This one man truly had a significant impact in our community.

I met with our contractor for the new hiking trail connecting to Lone Mountain on December 20. Construction of the new trail will begin the week of January 5 and should take approximately two weeks to complete. Additional maintenance and repair of some of our existing trails will be performed as well. We will make a further announcement of the official opening of the new Lone Mountain Trail sometime late in January.

Vehicle Transponders It has recently been brought to the attention of the Security Committee that some Bellasera residents may have removed the soft transponders which were affixed to the windshield of a 'registered' vehicle and transferred (re-affixed) them to a new vehicle 'unregistered' with the management office. This is a serious breach of the Vehicular Transponder Rules adopted by the Board to enhance community security. The new soft Vehicular Transponder system was adopted and implemented by the Board at significant cost to the community to enhance security and accountability over the old 'hard' portable transponders. Moving transponders between vehicles without notifying the management office defeats the purpose and design of the system.

The view-fence painting program was a resounding success. As a result of the tireless efforts of our many resident volunteers and management staff, the program was well-planned, well-publicized and professionally executed with our painting contractor. While past view-fence painting efforts experienced significant owner non participation, this year only six owners elected to 'opt-out' — assume responsibility to maintain their view fences themselves. This experience should serve as a model for similar improvement and maintenance projects in the future.

The ongoing Easement Litigation with the owner of the adjacent 12-acre parcel was settled on favorable terms and the lawsuit was dismissed. The cloud that this litigation cast over our community for the last few years has now been removed and we have some certainty and predictability regarding the future use and development of the 12-acre parcel by our 'neighbor' to the Southeast.

Burn Cleaner & Burn Better

Consider alternatives to burning wood this winter season. The harmful health effects from wood smoke are well documented by those who suffer from asthma, COPD, emphysema or other respiratory ailments. Tiny particles in wood smoke are about 30 times smaller than a human hair and can be absorbed into the blood stream where they lower lung function, exacerbate bronchitis and asthma and can even lead to heart attacks. Instead of burning wood, choose an alternative, such as electric, natural gas and fireplace retrofit devices that cause little to no emissions. Other cleaner selections include woodstoves, pellet stoves and oil furnaces.

When eating is a Problem

These recipes are from a booklet given by the Mayo Clinic with suggestions for increasing calorie and protein intake. Possibly these will help someone.

Tuna Loaf

(An alternative to meat loaf)

8 slices bread

2 cans (61/2 ounces) flaked tuna, packed in oil

1 can (10³/₄ ounces) condensed cream of mushroom soup

1 cup whole milk (or high-protein milk)

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon paprika

2 eggs

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Tear bread into small pieces and mix with tuna in a large bowl. In a separate bowl, mix together soup, milk, salt, paprika and eggs. Add to bread and tuna. Mix well. Bake in greased 5-inch by 9-inch loaf pan for 45 minutes. Slice to serve. If desired, top with white sauce or processed cheese sauce.

Yield: 6 servings

Calories per serving: 300

Protein per serving: 18 grams

Cheese Spinach Pie

1/3 cup onion, chopped (or 2 tablespoons dried onion flakes)

1 tablespoon butter or margarine

4 ounces Swiss or Muenster cheese, sliced

1 cup frozen spinach, thawed and drained

3 eggs, large

½ cup whole milk (or high-protein milk)

½ teaspoon salt

Dash of pepper

One 9-inch pie shell or thin biscuit dough to fit a 9-inch pie pan

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Cook onion in butter or margarine until tender.* Lay cheese slices over pie dough, follow with spinach. Beat together eggs, milk, onion and seasonings. Pour over ingredients in the pie shell. Bake for 35 minutes or until a knife inserted into the center of the pie comes out clean. Serve hot.

*If using dried onions, add onions and butter or margarine with milk.

Yield: 4 servings

January in the Garden by Joe McDade

Winter Has Settled In ... It's "Quiet Time" For Your Garden

We had a taste of winter in December, cold nights and mornings along with some rain. It even rained on Christmas day for the first time in a decade! Not ideal for our holiday visitors, but winter moisture is certainly needed for your garden and is a great companion to the beautiful weather we get during this time of

year. There is a view held by many that January is the only month of winter in our part of the Sonoran Desert. These wintry conditions are the norm for the low desert in January and paves the way for a **slow month of gardening**. Your primary focus should be on protecting your frost sensitive plants along with some selective pruning, and planting. Take advantage of this "quiet" time by preparing for upcoming spring projects.

I'll cover these topics below with exception of frost protection which was covered extensively in last month's column (December 2019) and can be found at www.azbellasera.org.

Pruning

Roses- A fairly severe haircut promotes April's glorious bloom period. In general, remove dead, crossed, or crowded canes and those that grow across the center of the bush, inhibiting air circulation. Specifically:

Hybrid Teas and Grandifloras- Cut back one-third to one-half of the bush, leaving four to eight of the youngest, sturdiest canes for optimal bloom. Remove all of the foliage and the small twiggy growth.

Floribundas and Miniatures- Leave 8 to 12 canes and more of the small growth.

Old Garden Roses- Wait to prune until after their spring bloom.

Succulents - As a general rule, if plants have severe cold damage, resist the urge to prune affected stems until the weather warms next month. The only exception is flowering stalks on *aloes*, which can be removed anytime. ***see more on succulents and cold weather on page 13***

Deciduous Fruit Trees - Cut out all dead, diseased, or broken wood, any crossing branches, and waterspouts.

Do not prune- Any frost sensitive evergreens or leguminous trees like mesquite, ironwood, acacias or palo verdes this month.

General Winter Guidelines- Wait to prune cold-tender plants until danger of frost is over in mid-March. Prune native plants after they bloom in late spring or early summer

Planting

Bare Root Roses- I touched on planting and purchasing in December and thought I should expand this month on selection as the local garden centers should be flush with a wide selection. First, a reminder that:

Roses are arguably the oldest garden plants in the world. Cultivated in China and parts of Europe for centuries, these extraordinary plants hold a special place in the hearts of gardeners everywhere.

For large flowers on sturdy stems, choose hybrid tea roses such as:

- Change of Heart (pink blooms with a spicy scent)
 Voluptous (deep pink with sweet scent)
- Elle (shell pink and yellow blooms with a spicy citrus scent)

For large clusters of smaller flowers, consider these new floribunda types:

• Fragrant Wave (white and spicy) • Tuscan Sun (apricot orange with light spicy scent)

Cold-Hardy and Fall-Winter Growers:

- Penstemons Salvia Brittlebush Sugar Sumac Bur-sage Red Barberry
- Cleveland Sage Mohave Sage Aloes Globemallow White Sage

Succulents - Plant winter-growing succulents in the ground or in containers. Choose a location with high, filtered shade or one that is shaded from the afternoon sun. While winter sun suits all winter-growing succulents, summer sun, especially in the afternoon, can be too much for them.

Cool-Season Herbs-Transplant borage, cilantro, dill, parsley and thyme.

Cool-season veggies-Sow seeds for peas, root crops and salad greens. Transplant broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower and Chinese cabbage.

Warm-Season Vegetable Seeds-(If you are ambitious) Sow seeds indoors for peppers and tomatoes so that seedlings are ready to transplant outdoors between mid-February and mid-March (with frost protection). Small- to medium-size fruits are more likely to produce a good crop than beefsteak varieties, which often crack before they mature.

Citrus

If you have established citrus in your garden, you are beginning to enjoy the harvest of fresh lemons, limes, grapefruit and/or oranges. To help guarantee a good crop every year, this is a reminder that your citrus should be **fertilized** in **January** or **February** with one-third of the tree's annual nitrogen requirements. Follow these guidelines:

- •Apply at the tree's drip line (edge of the canopy) and slightly beyond, which is where actively growing root tips will absorb the product. Water deeply right after applying fertilizer.
- •The amount to apply depends on the tree's size and how many years it has been in the ground.

A small two-year-old tree needs one-half pound of nitrogen per year.

•The amount increases one-quarter pound annually until the tree is six years or older. It then takes about 1.5 pounds of nitrogen annually, with the exception of mature grapefruit trees, which require half that amount.

Remember: Citrus in Bellasera needs to be "Dwarf" and in your backyard. Also, the best place to keep most citrus is on the tree as long as possible. Citrus will grow sweeter on the tree even after ripening. Tangerines will not stay on the tree as long as other citrus.

Succulents and Cold Weather

First, let's define <u>Succulent</u>: "Any fleshy plant that belongs to one of many diverse families; among them species of cactus, aloe, stonecrop, houseleek, agave, and yucca." We have a variety of indigenous succulents that have adapted to the extreme heat and dryness of our environment. During our winter months, you will need to follow some specific guidelines for their proper care which are outlined below.

Frost Protection- When freezing temperatures are predicted, protect tender succulents or those in bloom by covering them with a blanket, sheet, frost cloth (available in plant nurseries) or cardboard box overnight. Remove the covering in the morning when it warms up.

Aloes- Many aloes are hardy enough to withstand short-duration freezes, but their flowers are not. To protect flowering aloes, use a frame of pipe, wood or bamboo stakes over the plant then lay the protective covering over that.

Garden Observations for the Month

Cacti-If your saguaro or other cacti have a reddish color during the winter, it may simply be a response to the cool dry conditions of winter and nothing needs to be done.

Mesquites-They begin to lose their leaves this month as they fade to yellow or brown and begin to fall off which is normal leaf loss in these plants. While screwbean mesquite is completely deciduous each year, velvet mesquite lose their leaves gradually, often as the new leaves emerge.

Color bowl- it's never too late to create some cool-season color on your patio or in your courtyard. Transplant easy-to-grow sun lovers such as calendula, dianthus, gazania, marigold, pansy and viola.

Watering Schedule

I feel obligated to provide a monthly watering guide as it is very important to water smartly during the winter. Schedules should be adjusted to about 1/3 of the summer frequency for deciduous and dormant plants, but water deeply each time. Winter lawns and annual flowers may require once to twice per week watering depending on the weather. However:

Watering frequencies and ranges are affected by rainfall amounts. Miraculously, plants seem to know the difference between irrigation and rain. Even with steady, appropriate irrigation, fruit set and growth is always better with adequate rain. ***With the rain we've had in November and December, your drip system should have been turned off for the last two months and kept off in January as long as our current rainfall pattern continues. Of course, this would not apply to newly planted items and winter annuals which all require special attention. ***

Miscellaneous

Annuals-Yellowing seen on older leaves (at the base of the plant or stem) may indicate nitrogen deficiency in flowers and vegetables. Apply nitrogen fertilizer according to the package instructions. Continue to incorporate compost in gardens to improve soil fertility over time.

Spring Projects- Our growing season starts next month and you should start by preparing and planning for your upcoming planting projects.

Houseplants - It's time to inspect houseplants for aphids, scale insects, spider mites, and mealybugs. Rinse infected plants with commercial insecticidal soap or a solution of 1 tablespoon of dishwashing liquid mixed with one gallon of water. Blast gray aphids off plants with a strong jet of water.
