Lone Mountain Entrance Gate Problem:

We have a continuing problem with tailgaters entering through the Lone Mountain gate into our community. A major contributor to this problem is Google Maps that routes folks through the LM gate when addresses within Bellasera are searched. Google Maps offers a means of submitting comments and needed corrections. A few of us have done so and received a notice that our comments are under review, but Google has not taken any action so far. Perhaps Google may take action if more folks contact them. If interested, here's how to do it. Other suggestions are welcome.

- On your computer, open Google Maps and sign in.
- In the top left click: Menu
- Scroll down to: Send feedback.
- In the window that pops up, choose the feedback you would like to give. I chose **Wrong Information**
- A window will open up telling you to: Click the place or road segments you want to fix I navigated my cusor on the map over the intersection of 76th and E Lone Mountain and clicked.
- A new window opened up with three fields, one designated 76th St, one East Lone Mountain Rd, and the third was Add a missing place. I clicked on 76th Street
- Another window then opens with several options. I clicked on *Traffic direction*, and added the follow ing note (but, obviously, you can draft any comment you think may be more effective).

76th Street off E Lone Mountain Rd is one-way North for public purposes. 76th Street south of E. Lone Mountain Dr in Scottsdale AZ is a private drive into a gated community, with restricted access for residents only. Only residents of Bellasera subdivision may travel southbound on 76th. Please stop routing the public southbound off E Lone Mountain Road through the private gate. The correct entry street into the Bellasera subdivision is on E Pontebella Dr eastbound off Scottsdale Rd.

The stately saguaro that has been a fixture outside the Lone Mountain Road entry gate to Bellasera is history. No, it did not succumb to the high winds and rain of January, but had become so rotted that it was beyond salvage, and had to be removed. Farewell carnegiea gigantea!

A locking mailbox has been installed just inside the front door to the clubhouse. It's meant to collect comments, suggestions, or any papers for the Community Manager when the office is closed. Much easier than trying to slip items under the door, now that weather stripping has been installed around the office door.

February 2015

The new Bellasera trail connecting to the existing trail leading to the summit of Lone Mountain is complete. There are two trailheads within our community. One at the north end of Balao Drive (road at the base of Lone Mountain, on the east end of Bellasera property), clearly marked; the other is near the wash that is accessed just south of the mailboxes on 77th Way -- this one is not yet clearly marked.

The Bellasera trail is relatively smooth, about 3000 feet in length, at an average grade elevation of 8.5%.

Bellasera homeowners may want to consider having their clothes dryer vent cleaned. Over the years the lint really does accumulate. Removing the lint will make the dryer work more efficiently and reduce the possibility of fire. Don't forget the bathroom vents as well.

Bellasera made a contribution to the Foothills Food Bank in Cave Creek in memory and honor of Gregg Dittoe. Gregg was an active volunteer for the Food Bank.

One of the things that first attracted my wife and I to Bellasera, when we decided to permanently relocate here in late 2010, was its natural setting and the unique qualities of the Foothills area of the high Sonoran Desert where Bellasera is located. Of our more than 290 acres, more than 50 acres consists of natural undisturbed open spaces including common areas, washes and trails with native vegetation distributed throughout the Bellasera Community, all which contribute to its character and beauty. This Natural Area Open Space (NAOS) is not just an amenity, it was mandated by the City of Scottsdale when Bellasera was originally developed. It is very important to provide continuous open spaces along the washes in order to sustain both the native desert plants and animals.--Richard Hoffman



February In the Garden

Winter in The Homestretch?

As winter loosens its grip, only a couple of nights may dip near freezing (which seems improbable with our current long term forecast) and some warm days will quickly remind us that spring is not far off.

Some Rain, But No Frost!

We've had our share of rain this winter, but nothing close to the near record level we experienced last year. And, no frost yet with none in the long term forecast which means I'll skip my usual treatise on frost recovery. Of course, we've had our normal cold spells as the temperature does drop precipitously when the sun goes down, sometimes (when we're lucky) accompanied by a gorgeous sunset. We all look forward to these months and get to enjoy them with our welcome winter residents.

What's In Bloom?

Right now, **bougainvillea**, **lantana** and **honeysuckle** are thriving which is in stark contrast to last year when Jack Frost took its toll on these vulnerable plants. So, it's on to February, a month of transition, when warm days will tempt us with thoughts of spring—days in the 80s are possible—but cold snaps are still more probable.

Cleanup & Get Ready for Spring

The growing season officially starts in mid-February for us and, since it is short, don't lose time as we need to give plants and trees a chance to grow before the punishing summer heat. I suggest you take the following steps:

- Survey your garden for areas that might need to be rejuvenated or cleaned up and begin the process.
- Identify now what you might consider planting this month. I'll give you some suggestions.

Planting

If you have the ambition and energy to grow **vegetables**, this is a good month to prepare a new **vegetable garden bed** as follows:

- Prepare your vegetable bed by using a digging fork or rototilling to approximately 12-18 inches deep. Do not work soil if it is too wet as it can permanently damage the soil structure.
- Apply compost generously (several inches) and incorporate it into the loosened soil.
- If you have an existing vegetable garden this is also a good time to add compost.

Vegetable seeds to sow now include:

- beets bok choy carrots collard greens lentils leaf lettuce mustard greens
- green onions Irish potatoes radishes turnips

Vegetable seeds to sow the second part of February include:

• sweet corn • cantaloupe • cucumbers • muskmelon • summer squash • watermelon

Vegetable Transplants include:

- Artichokes (Globe & Jerusalem) Asparagus Chard Kohlrabi Lettuce,
- •Onion Sets Peppers Tomatoes

Landscape Plants: You can continue to plant cold-hardy and fall-winter growers such as:

- Globemallow Penstemons Brittlebush Blackfoot Golden Columbine
- Goodding's Verbena Red Justicia Fragrant Evening Primrose
- Desert Milkweed Trixis Cleveland Sage White Sage Aloes

Pruning

While our winter has been, at times, on the cold side, we have had no frost damage and, assuming our luck holds out, your pruning tasks will be much easier this spring. But remember, do not prune frost sensitive plants until the last chance for freezing conditions has past, which is usually around mid-February to early March. Suggested pruning guidelines are:

Deciduous trees- Finish pruning nonnative deciduous shade trees and deciduous fruit trees by mid-month. **Citrus trees**- Prune frost sensitive citrus after they begin to leaf out, if needed. As a general rule, citrus needs to

Flowering annuals and perennials -Continue to deadhead**(see below) to encourage additional blooms.

be pruned only if there are aberrant branches ruining the shape of the tree.

Remember: Have a purpose and an end result in mind before you make the first cut. Never remove more than 1/4 of the total plant. Always use sharp, sterile, quality pruning tools and disinfect them between cuts to prevent the spread of disease. Pruning is an art as well as a science. How much you cut off and where you choose to make the cuts will affect both the health and the beauty of the plant or tree.

Butterflies?

Want to attract butterflies? If the answer is yes, then plant now to be ready for butterfly migrations in spring and fall. Blanket flower, butterfly weed, desert milkweed, hyssop, sweet alyssum, verbena and yarrow plants are surefire butterfly magnets.

Want to attract Hummingbirds and Celebrate Valentine's Day? Consider Planting an Emu Bush. It's a fantastic shrub that blooms for Valentine's Day and grows well in our desert landscapes. The Valentine Emu Bush (Eremophila maculata 'Valentine') will give you winter color and hummingbirds love it. Our cooler January through March weather brings on the beautiful bright pink flowers. When it's not blooming, it stays green and can handle our heat. Another advantage for home landscapes and common areas is that it only gets to be four to five feet tall. So, it can fit in most landscape areas without needing constant maintenance or getting too large for its space. If you're looking for something in blue, the Emu Bush can help you with that too as there is a Blue Bells Emu Bush (Eremophila hygrophana). This is a smaller shrub only growing two to three feet tall. It can be placed in an even smaller area than the Valentine Emu Bush. It makes a great patio shrub. The Emu bush isn't just for Valentine's Day.

Romantic Rose

Continuing with a Valentine's Day theme, I'll repeat my recommendation of the last few months to consider planting either *bare root* or **container grown** roses. There is a wide variety still available in local nurseries. Also, there is a perfect month to address maintenance of your roses (see below).

February Garden Tasks

Maintain Roses- February is also a good month to pay attention to the maintenance of established roses in your garden. They can be fertilized around mid-month which is weeks before a target bloom date of April 1. Some gardeners wait until the first growth has reached 2 inches in length before applying fertilizer.

Fertilize Fruit Trees- If you did not do so in January, feed citrus with one-third of the tree's annual nitrogen requirement. Fertilize deciduous fruit trees (apple, apricot, pear, plum, and pomegranate) with nitrogen as they begin to leaf out.

Continue harvesting citrus- Fruit sweetens the longer it stays on the tree, so letting it hang is the best storage method. Most citrus, including kumquats, lemons, limes, mandarins, navels, tangelos and pigmented and sweet oranges, can be harvested this month. Taste-test grapefruit and Valencia oranges for sweetness. Many can be harvested through May.

Watch for aphids—These tiny soft-bodied insects are usually grayish-black or green, although a bright yellow-orange color is commonly seen on the stems of desert milkweed. Aphids cluster on tender new plant growth sucking plant juices. Dislodge them with a blast of water from the hose as often as needed. Refrain from spraying chemical pesticides and soon such beneficial insects as lady beetles, green lacewings and parasitic wasps will arrive in your garden to control aphids for you.

**What Is Deadheading?
