

CC&R'S Refresher Course:

We have many new owners and folks leasing in our lovely community. Please ensure that you are aware of the Community Guidelines and what is and is not considered a violation of the CC&R'S.

It is your responsibility as an owner to abide by the rules and, for those owners with tenants, it is up to you to ensure that your tenants are aware of the rules as well.

We receive many calls about cars being parked on the street overnight – which is a <u>no-no</u>. Recently we've received calls about workmen taking "breaks" in our NAOS which is also a no-no.

Our CC&R'S are located on the Bellasera website, **azbellasera.org**, and I encourage all <u>new</u> owners and tenants to please review them so that you are familiar with the rules here at Bellasera.

Recycle Tips: While out conducting recycling bin inspections, I find that most of our residents are placing the correct items into their bins. Excellent job everyone! However, I do find that some of our residents continue to bag their recyclables prior to placing them into their bin. It may seem like the right thing to do, but the truth is, it's not. What happens to bagged recyclables you may ask? It gets treated like garbage, literally! Personnel that work at the sorting facility hand sort through 20+ tons of material an hour. Because of this high volume of material and the limited amount of time they have to sort through it, bagged recyclables will get tossed into the garbage chute and then landfilled. So please, give your recyclables a fighting chance, deposit them loosely into your bin!

REMINDER: The only exception to this rule would be for shredded paper. Please contain all shredded paper in a transparent plastic bag so it can be identified and removed from the sorting line during the sorting process.

Help us spread the word. If you see a neighbor who is bagging their recycling, kindly remind them of this message. --John Stumbaugh, City of Scottsdale Solid Waste Dept.

Looking forward to seeing all those interested. Please be sure to wear appropriate clothing and shoes, bring a snack, sunscreen, water and a hat. Even though it's early in the year, our AZ sun can be brutal.

Apache Wash Loop Trail, 5.6 Miles Round Trip, 640 ft gain, Loop Trail

Explore the rugged desert while exploring the Phoenix Sonoran Preserve. This hike begins at the Apache Wash Trail-head where you will find restrooms and a covered rest area. This loop is simple to follow and offers various shortcuts along with an access to an optional summit climb.

The loop begins from the northeast end of the parking lot near the restrooms. Turn left onto the Ocotillo trail, the trail's marked to allow for easy navigation. After 0.35 miles, stay left at the junction with the Apache Wash Trail. Continue for an additional 0.3 miles and then turn right onto the marked junction for the Ridgeback trail. The trail begins to gain elevation at this point where you will start to appreciate beautiful views of the northern valley. Upon reaching the top of Ridgeback overlook, turn right to take the Sidewinder trail as you head east. After another 0.7 miles, you'll reach another trail junction but continue on Sidewinder trail which will take you to the Apache Wash Junction. Backtracking to the Apache Wash Trail, turn right and hike the remaining 0.8 miles back to the trail-head. Getting there: 1600 E. Sonoran Desert Drive, Phoenix. From Loop 101 in north Phoenix,

take Cave Creek Road (Exit 28) and go 4.5 miles north to Sonoran Desert Drive. Turn left (west) and go 3.5 miles to the trail-head on the right.

March 2010: Per the Design Guidelines, this is a reminder to submit all exterior changes to the Modification Committee prior to commencing the work. The Modifications Committee has been established to monitor, review and control the development of Bellasera. The Modifications Committee has exclusive jurisdiction over original construction, initial landscape installation, modifications, additions, and alterations made to lots, to structures and landscaping on lots. After a lot and its structures and landscaping have been completed according to approved plans, the Modifications Committee must review all proposed changes to the exterior of the structure and the lot. This includes additions, removal and placement of landscape items.

The City of Scottsdale Fire Department will be conducting a training session on how to use an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) at the Bellasera clubhouse on Tuesday, March 16, at 6:00 p.m. Bellasera recently purchased the defibrillator to have available at the clubhouse in case of an emergency. CPR training will be included in the session.

There are many Bellasera residents who walk the community's streets, but probably not many with the regularity of Tom & Virginia Wheeler. You've probably all seen them, usually together, but not always, Virginia has always been walking as part of her exercise program. Tom was a runner until he injured his knee and had to stop. He focused more on his job, and as a result his weight increased significantly. After moving to Bellasera, Tom decided to lose the weight and finally get in shape. Virginia suggested walking as a way to start exercising, so Tom joined her and he continues doing so to this day. It has also been a wonderful way for the couple to meet many new neighbors and friends.

March 2015:Bellasera Board President Richard Hoffman cuts the ribbon, officially opening the community's new hiking trail on the western slopes of Lone Mountain on Saturday, February 9. Richard paid tribute to several residents who worked many hours to make this newest addition to our community's trails happen. Some useless trivia: The summit of Lone Mountain is 2,664 feet Above Sea Level (ASL). The trailhead at the north end of Balao Drive is 2,290 feet ASL. That makes the hike from the trailhead to the top= 374 feet. More useless trivia: for comparison, (all in feet ASL) Brown's Mountain summit, a couple miles east of Bellasera is 3,253 feet. Further south, in the McDowell Mountains, McDowell Peak is 3,995; Thompson Peak 3,969; Drinkwater Peak 3,910.

For the last 15+ years Keven Peterson has been a welcoming presence at Bellasera's main gate. He's well-known to all residents, visitors and vendors for a consistently upbeat & friendly personality. His last day here was February 19. Securitas, the company that provides our gate security, has recognized his excellent work habits by awarding him several performance awards over the years. Keven moves on to a new management opportunity with a local machine shop firm. We all wish him nothing but the best.

The Board has approved the replacement of all four existing treadmills with new updated treadmills from LifeFitness. It will take about four-six weeks for the new treadmills to be delivered and installed. Funds for the cost of the new treadmills were previously set aside in our replacement reserve accounts. The Board will also be looking at replacing the three existing exercise bikes in the work-out area with new updated models. We expect to make a decision and an announcement after the next regular Board meeting.

Bellasera Security

There have been concerns expressed, notably on our Facebook page, about individuals following residents through the back gate. This has been a subject of discussion for some time. After a security review which included benchmarking with surrounding communities, cameras and signage were added at the back gate. Consideration was given to adding 'barrier gates' which close rapidly and prevent tailgating. These gates are expensive to install and subject to excessive continuing maintenance as the arms are frequently broken off. They were not viewed as an effective mitigation measure.

It is certainly not desirable for unauthorized entry through a gate intended for "residents only". However the actual threat posed is judged to be minimal. Most of the "intrusions" are vendors mistakenly directed to the back gate or authorized service providers looking for easier access. As a result of community input, Google has corrected their mapping instructions. Hopefully this will help address those directed to the back gate as a result of a "google map search."

In a number of instances, residents have been observed facilitating their service providers entry through the back gate. This is an ongoing issue which is being addressed on a case by case basis.

Bellasera is a safe place to reside. The only reported residential burglary in the last two or three years was most likely perpetrated by a vendor. There have been no robberies and reported incidences of petty theft are very rare. Solicitations have been reported but those have proven to be vendors cleared to be in the community seeking additional clients. The Board security advisor reviews incident reports provided by our security providers, responds to resident concerns and monitors surrounding communities looking for threat data that might be applicable to Bellasera. The Scottsdale Police Department newsletter is reviewed for information that reflects current crime data.

The Board is not comfortable with residents confronting those individuals perceived to have violated back gate entry. Instead, it is suggested that, if you observe a violation note the date and time of entry and if possible obtain a vehicle license number. The event is captured on the back gate camera. If you are comfortable doing so, see where the vehicle goes. Report the information to the community manager and follow-up action will occur. We have dealt with vendors who don't observe our procedures. Please be reminded that residents are ultimately responsible for ensuring that their vendors comply with community policies and procedures.

March In the Garden

Get Ready For Spring!

For the previous two years, February had tightened its winter grip in dramatic fashion. Temperatures were well below average, a legitimate freeze occurred and, last year, Bellasera was covered in snow for a few days! This February was much better as we had:

- More than adequate rainfall.
- Seasonal temperatures, with some chilly days, but an overall pleasant month.
- •No damaging frost (we did experience minimal frost one night).

Your Garden Has Come Alive!

Take a look at any of your landscape plants and you'll see:

Minimal Frost Damage- Our landscape plants have experienced very little frost damage as evidenced by the flowering perennials such as bougainvillea, penstemon and honeysuckle which continue to sparkle.

New Growth- Your garden has come alive. Take a look at any of your landscape plants and you'll see plenty of new growth especially those with a southern exposure.

Mesquite Trees- We have a variety of mesquite here in Bellasera and they are quickly losing their leaves at various rates depending on species and exposure. You will find new leaf growth already on some, especially velvet mesquite.

Citrus- They will be loaded with buds and new leaf sprouts.

Plan Before Planting

March is normally a terrific month for adding most plant types to our low-desert landscapes as warming soil temperatures will enhance seed germination and root development before the arrival of summer's intense heat. Our winter rains have left our soil very moist and full of nutrients. So, whether you need to simply *add or replace a tree or shrub or renovate an area* of your landscape, it is the ideal time to tackle these projects.

Local nurseries should be well stocked with fresh offerings for the spring planting season to satisfy your needs. Also, the **Desert Botanical Garden in Phoenix has a Bi-Annual Plant Sale (March 21-22)** featuring the largest variety of arid-adapted plants available in one location with volunteers and staff available to offer advice, answer questions and assist in selections. Give it a try. Choose plants based on their mature height and width, matching their size to the space available in your landscape. This advance planning eliminates unnecessary pruning.

What To Plant.....Some Suggestions

Select plants with varied bloom seasons to provide nectar and seed sources for birds and other pollinators throughout the year. Limited space? Choose a few plants that will bloom almost year-round (if no freeze), such as: **Baja Red Fairy Duster, Mexican Honeysuckle** and **Orange Bells.**

Annual Flowers

Our weather has certainly cooperated in providing ideal conditions for our winter-growing annuals. However, by the end of the month, they will begin to decline at which time they should be removed and replaced with warm season annuals. Some suggestions:

- Celosia Gaillardia Globe Amaranth Portulaca
- Lisianthus Madagascar Periwinkle Marigold

If you want to attract butterflies, consider:

Bee Balm
 Cosmos
 Mexican Sunflower
 Sage

• Sunflower • Verbena • Yarrow • Zinnia

Fruit Trees

They grow well in the valley and our community is no exception. If you have none and want to give it a try, this an ideal time as a wide variety is available in our local nurseries. You should be able to choose from:

- Grapefruits •Lemons/Limes Sweet oranges such as Mars, Trovita or Valencia.
- Pummelo(sweet mild grapefruit) hybrids such as Melogold or Oroblanco

Dwarf varieties grow well here and take up less room in your yard while producing normal size fruit. Remember, in Bellasera, only dwarf varieties are allowed and can only be planted in your backyard. Cactus

You can plant all types of cacti and succulents this month. In addition to purchasing them from a nursery, they can be easily propagated from existing plants via cuttings or offshoots. Simply allow the cactus cuts to become dry and callous or hardened before planting. This usually takes two to three weeks. The exceptions to this are **agave**, **yucca** and **aloe** cuttings which should be planted immediately.

Herbs

How about an herb garden to perk up your cooking? Try favorites such as:

Basil
 Chives
 Marjoram
 Mint
 Oregano
 Parsley
 Sage

Most of these can purchased in the local grocery stores in small pots (for about \$6.00) and can be easily transplanted in the ground or a larger pot.

Vegetables (I covered these in detail last month)

Pruning

While March is traditionally an excellent month for planting, consider pruning and general upkeep before planting. In general, pruning should be done to maintain plant health (remove dead, damaged or diseased portions, cross branching, etc.), to highlight the "natural" shape of the plant, to train a young plant, and to eliminate hazards. Excessive or heavy pruning causes significant stress to trees and shrubs. The best practices are to prune the least amount necessary and prune for legitimate reasons. How much to prune depends on the size, species, age, as well as your intentions. A few good principles to remember--a tree or shrub can recover from several small pruning wounds faster than from a single large wound and never remove more than 25% of the canopy in a year. **Some specific plants that should be considered for pruning:**

Summer and fall flowering shrubs including:

- Texas Sages Yellow Bells Lantana Turpentine Bush
- Mexican-honeysuckle
 Sky Flower
 Black Dalea

Tip: Most shrubs tolerate heavy spring pruning to reduce their size and encourage a flush of healthy, lush growth.

Warm-season herbaceous perennials, groundcovers and vines including:

- Chocolate Flower Plumbago Mexican Hat Gaura Mealy-cup Sage Passion Vines
- Rock Verbena Trailing Lantana Dyssodia Queen's Wreath Yellow Orchid-vine Miscellaneous Pruning Suggestions:
- Continue to deadhead annuals and herbaceous perennials to encourage continued flowering including Desert Marigold, Red Sage, Angelita-Daisy and Gaillardia.
- •Wait to prune your prickly-pears and chollas until after flowering. Spent stalks of aloes, agaves and other succulents can be removed at this time.
- •Citrus- Do not prune citrus except to remove dead or damaged wood.

Remember: Prune by cutting back to emerging growth or to the basal rosette (group of leaves arranged from a central point).

Watering

Up until recently, cool temperatures and adequate rainfall have obviated the need for any watering. However, as our temperature rise and rainfall declines, it's time perform some annual maintenance on your drip system. Specifically:

- Test the timer to see if it is working properly.
- Check for leaks and clogged emitters and flush out the poly lines.
- Replace back-up batteries if necessary.

How often to water?

Background-Although desert plants have developed mechanisms for conserving and storing water, none have given up the need for water entirely. There are many variables that determine how much and how often plants need supplemental water such as:

- •Soil: Soils with high clay content hold moisture well, too well for some desert plants, and could be amended with a small amount of organic matter and coarse sand. Rocky soils hold little moisture so plants growing in them require more frequent watering.
- •Temperature: Most desert plants grow when it is warm. Active growth coupled with high evaporation rates means that more water is needed in warmer months.
- •Age and size: All plants, even desert plants, need more water when they are young and when they have been recently transplanted

General Guidelines- Assumptions are mature plants and temperatures stay below 100 degrees:

- Every 3 to 4 weeks, at least 2 hours each watering.
- •About every 5th watering, run system a few hours longer to leach out salts that have accumulated around plant.

Notes:

- •All plants, even desert plants, need more water when they are young and when they have been recently transplanted.
- Adjust schedule to rainfall received.
- Mature trees need no watering during this time of year

Miscellaneous

Fertilization- Now is the time to fertilize your warm-season cacti, succulents, herbaceous and woody perennials, and annuals in containers. Periodic fertilization may be needed for plants in containers as nutrients will have diminished in the soil over time. Depending on the type of fertilizer used, follow directions on the label.

Continue to fertilize your vegetable and herb garden as needed. March is also a good time to apply a layer of composted mulch to your vegetable and herb beds.

Roses- Continue feeding roses every six weeks to prepare them for spring's peak bloom. Spread fresh mulch to maintain consistent soil moisture, making sure mulch does not touch their stems.

Rosemary- They are in a growth spurt and starting to bloom. Do not prune until they are finished blooming.

March is Wildflower Month

I realize that, to many, March does not conjure up thoughts of wildflowers. After all, we have **March Madness** (thank God after a slow month of sports), **Spring Training** (after getting off to a rocky start with our weather on opening day) along with **St. Patrick's Day** and **The Ides of March**. And, of course, we can't forget Arbor Day!


Other March Events

Worm Moon -Any full moon is dubbed a "supermoon" when it occurs at the same time the moon is within 90 percent of its perigee, the point in its orbit at which it is closest to the Earth, making it appear up to 14% larger and 30 % brighter than usual. If you missed the one in February, you'll get another opportunity this month, March 9. Native Americans called this last full moon of winter the **"Worm Moon"** after the worm trails that would appear in the newly thawed ground.
