#### Here's when and how to prune your trees in Arizona

Trees are an important part of our community. Not only do they enhance your property, they can provide a cooling relief from the hot summer sun. Taking care of your trees is very important and when you live in the desert, the pruning of the trees in your yard raises a lot of questions: What time of year should pruning occur? Should they be trimmed, crowned, rounded or what? Please remember that your gardener or landscaper may not be knowledgable in the way to properly trim trees. Rely on a Certified Arborist for the proper care of your trees.

A gardener recently trimmed some trees in Bellasera and has basically damaged these trees to a point where they cannot recover. Sucker growth will occur where the trees were topped and this growth

will be weak spots subject to breakage during windy conditions. Please do not make this mistake.

Your trees probably need to be pruned at various times of year.

December through February is the best time to prune deciduous trees.

"Lion's tailing" or "topping" should never be done to your trees. These are improper pruning operations that make trees more vulnerable to sun and wind damage.

Topping is often done when trees grow taller and branches hit the house or hang over the roof. Tree owners think the only solution is to aggressively cut large stems to reduce the height or spread of the tree, but these cuts made at predetermined heights only encourage sprouting at the ends of the branches.



These large cuts are also the entry points for decay fungi to invade the tree.

A better method is to cut branches back to side branches at least one-third the diameter of the branches being cut. This reduces sprouting and leaves trees looking more natural.

In "lion's tailing," interior branches of a tree are over-pruned, leaving behind long slender limbs with a puff of foliage at the end that looks something like the tail of a lion. This technique can lead to sprouting as well as sunburn on the trunk and lower limbs on super-hot days. The heavy branch ends also collect the force of the wind and are more prone to breakage in storms.

#### Most desert species should be pruned during the spring or fall.

Spring or early summer pruning of mesquite and other vigorous desert trees can prevent damage during the summer monsoon storms.

Palo verdes are more sun-sensitive, so avoid summer pruning and, as a rule, reduce their pruning dosage. Smaller and less vigorous desert trees that don't require preventative monsoon pruning can be pruned in the fall.

Pruning later in the year tends to hold shape longer during the fall and winter months when tree growth slows down.

## April In the Garden

#### A Special Spring, Awash In Color And

#### A Perfect Place For Social Distancing..... Your Garden!

If you are having trouble coping with the minefield of restrictions, mandates, closures and cancellations caused by the COVID-19 virus epidemic, your garden/yard is waiting for you! After all, we have plenty of time on our hands as

most of our normal social activities and entertainment have been eliminated as restaurants are shut down, events cancelled and, any form of social gatherings, strictly taboo. And, to make matters worse, there are absolutely no sports on TV unless you are into UFC? Just think, we would have been in the middle of March Madness and eagerly awaiting the start of the baseball season with the Masters right behind it.

#### A Perfect Spring Is Unfolding .... Dig In!

We've had a great March with plenty of rain resulting in ideal conditions that will enable you to enhance and add to the total beauty of our part of the desert. To that point, I'd like to focus on some general maintenance topics including *planting* and *pruning*, as well as some *monthly garden tips*.

#### **Planting**

Although your summer planting should be underway, you still have time to add some additional life to your garden. Just remember to choose native plants or plants that are adapted to our high temperatures and alkaline soils. This is a good month for transplanting as you should beat the heat and have them in the ground before temperatures climb beyond 100 degrees. Some suggestions:

- Tropical Plants like Bougainvillea and Lantana.
- **Desert-Adapted** trees, shrubs, groundcovers, vines, ornamental grasses, perennials, cacti and succulents.
- Citrus Trees- Remember, dwarf only and they need to be in the rear of your property.
- Herbs- Transplant warm-season favorites, including basil, lavender, rosemary and sage.
- Warm-Season Veggies-Sow seeds for black-eyed peas, cantaloupe, cucumbers, jicama, lima beans, okra, peanuts and summer squashes, such as crookneck, pattypan and zucchini.

#### **Warm Season Annual Flowers**

I covered this last month and, since March temperatures continued to be kind to your winter-growing annuals, you may still have them in place. However, once again, as our temperatures begin to climb, they will decline rapidly and need to be replaced with warm season annuals. Look at it as an opportunity to add some new, bright color to your surroundings. So, when it is time to give up on them, nurseries will have great varieties and they're always glad to help you with their choices. Some suggestions are:

- Celosia Gaillardia Globe amaranth Portulaca Gazania Zinia Verbina
- Lisianthus Madagascar periwinkle Marigold -Petunia

#### **Pruning**

As emphasized last month, pruning should be done to maintain plant health (remove dead, damaged or diseased portions, cross branching, etc.), to highlight the "natural" shape of the plant, to train a young plant, and to eliminate hazards. With this in mind, April is a good month for pruning as follows: **Trees** 

- See separate article on Tree Trimming on Page 7
- Pruning newly planted trees and shrubs is **not recommended** and in fact can be detrimental. However, corrective pruning of broken or torn branches and/or limbs can be done at planting time. Save other pruning activities for the second or third year.
- Continue to prune summer and fall flowering shrubs by mid-month including:
  - -Texas Sages -Yellow Bells -Lantana -Turpentine Bush
  - -Mexican-honeysuckle Sky Flower Black Dalea
- *Rosemary* Spring growth should be well underway and, following the blossoming (which should be almost over) of its vivid blue-violet flowers, can be safely trimmed back.

**Cactus**- If *cholla* or *prickley pear* cactus become too large, they should be cut to a joint with a saw or large clippers. Remember to wear heavy gloves to protect your hands. Also, it is not necessary to treat a cut on these types of cactus if the cut is made at the joint.

**Yucca** should not be pruned unless it is necessary to remove dead or diseased stems. If you need to prune, cut back to either a joint or as low on the plant as possible and dust the wound generously with powdered sulphur until it completely dries out.

#### Do you have a shrub that needs to be rejuvenated?

Shrubs that have been repeatedly sheared into unnatural shape are in a near constant state of stress and, over time, develop a thin layer of leaves that scarcely cover an unsightly interior. Give these shrubs a new lease on life by pruning them back to stems 12 to 18 inches high. Follow up a deep watering to support new growth. Don't be afraid to do this. It works.

#### **Monthly Garden Tasks**

**Roses**- During spring's peak bloom period feed and water to promote continued flowering. Apply fertilizer every two weeks until the heat of summer begins. Water twice per week when temperatures are below 80 degrees, increasing to three times weekly when temperatures are above 80 degrees or conditions are windy, which can dry out foliage and blooms.

**Drip System**- As mentioned last month, you need to clean out sediment and algae as well as replace clogged emitters and also clean filters. Adjust your drip system to *water more frequently. How much?* This is always one of the hardest questions to answer. Generally, be sure to run your system long enough to wet the top two feet of soil. Deep, infrequent watering is much better than a daily sprinkle. **Feed Citrus**- Fertilize trees with their second feeding of the year this month or next. Apply one-third of the tree's total annual nitrogen requirement. Water deeply after spreading the fertilizer.

**Weeding**- April and May are usually the worst months but they got upstaged this year by March. In driving around our community, it's obvious that we are attacking and winning the war.

### What's Blooming Now? Shrubs, Vines and Groundcover

**Bougainvillea** has been blooming for the most of the winter and, right on schedule, is now undergoing a growth spurt which will add to their intensity and luster. In addition **Penstemon, Fairy Duster, Senna** and **Lantana** are coming into their own, adding to the bouquet. It's the tip of the iceberg as a myriad of other "Bloomers" will quickly join the color parade. And, of course, we have our omnipresent Desert Marigold with its beautiful yellow flowers cropping up everywhere.

#### Citrus

If you have citrus, go outdoors at night and enjoy the unmistakable beautiful, unique fragrance of citrus in full bloom.

#### What Will Bloom Soon?

#### **Trees**

Bellasera is widely populated with *Palo Verdes* (the desert "bean" tree) and, during the next two or three weeks, they will bloom and make the desert golden. There are four species of green-barked trees: •*Blue palo verde* • *Foothills palo verde* • *Mexican palo verde* •*Palo Brea*.

Once pollinated, the yellow flowers will produce edible beans and, as they begin to open, their yellow to creamy blooms will create *corridors of yellow* throughout our community. The first to bloom will be the Blue palo verdes followed by the Foothills palo verdes, about two weeks later. The Mexican palo verdes bloom as the Foothills are finishing and can bloom through August.

#### Cacti

The cacti will begin to bloom as well, with a few of the prickly pears, chollas, and hedgehogs starting off. By the end of the month, some saguaro cacti will open their big, white flowers.

#### **Houseplants: Maintenance**

As days lengthen, houseplants begin producing fresh shoots. Gradually water more frequently and apply houseplant fertilizer according to package instructions. If roots poke out the bottom of the pot, or if growth was stunted last year, repot in fresh soil. In the process, trim or spread out encircled or overgrown roots, and wait to fertilize for a month to allow roots to re-establish. Clean and disinfect pots with a 10-percent bleach solution (1-part bleach to 9-parts water) before reusing. Don't be afraid to repot a plant! The internet has numerous sites that will help you.

#### **Desert Observations And Musings**

**Big Mosquitos?** You may have seen them around your house or in your yard. They are huge, scary and look like the world's biggest mosquito! These flying giants actually are not mosquitos but Crane Flies. They are big with a long needle nose that looks like it's perfect for sucking blood, but the Crane Fly is harmless.

**Bright Star?** That bright star in the western sky in early evening is actually **Venus**. Take a look.

**Shifting of the Sun**- We don't change our clocks like most of the country, however, we in Bellasera, are very much aware of the shifting of the sun. First of all, we get to see a lot of the sun and a good number of our homes face north/south. Hence, the sun's shift to the back or front of your house is obvious. Our plant life is certainly aware of this also as everything on the north side of your house will finally catch up to the plantings on the south. Check it out.
