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
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

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Hidden in the Hills to Feature Jewelry by Bellasera Artist

Arizona's largest and longest-running artist studio tour, Hidden in the Hills, takes place during the last two weekends of November, Friday through Sunday, **November 20–22** and **November 27–29**. A signature event of the non-profit Sonoran Arts League, this year's studio tour features 140 artists in 35 studio locations throughout the communities of Cave Creek, Carefree and North Scottsdale.

The free, self-guided studio tour offers seasoned collectors and art enthusiasts a rare chance to observe artists at work in their private studios, which are open to the public from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. during the six-day tour. Each studio will be complying with CDC guidelines for social distancing. For the health and well-being of everyone, masks are required, and hand sanitizer will be available at each stop on the tour.

Shelly Taylor, a Bellasera resident, will again exhibit and sell her jewelry at Bela Fidel Fine Art Studio in Scottsdale (studio #19 on the tour). Taylor specializes in beaded kumihimo and bead-woven jewelry. Studio #19 is hosted by acclaimed abstract painter, Bela Fidel, and is located at 33401 N. 56th Street, Building #200, just south of Carefree Highway. Other guest artists at the studio this year include mixed media and acrylic artist Nancy Christy-Moore, fiber and mixed media artist Andrea Cook, and glass artist Brian Willis. In addition, a navigation app is available for free download at the iTunes App store or Google Play (search for "Sonoran Arts League mobile"). REAR VIEW - A HISTORY OF BELLASERA

NOVEMBER 2015: Bellasera held a Community Meeting on October 14 at 7:00 p.m. in the clubhouse to discuss and answer homeowners' questions and to respond to concerns regarding a new potential Verizon Cell Tower in Bellasera. Four of the five members of the Board were in attendance as well as a representative from Verizon Wireless. A drawing of the proposed location and a representative depiction of the new Cell Tower were displayed. The meeting lasted for approximately one hour. At the Board's regular monthly meeting on October 22, the Board voted unanimously to approve the new Verizon Wireless proposal.

A further explanation regarding the palm trees. There are four kinds of palms that are approved for use in Bellasera and they are considered an accent plant: Mediterranean Fan Palm, Sago Palm, Mexican Sago and the Pygmy Date Palm. We hope this gives you a better understanding of what is permissible and approved by your Design Guidelines.

This is a reminder that if you want to make any changes to the outside of your home or to your yard, a Modification Application (Architectural Application) is required for approval by the Modification Committee. The Application may be found on our Bellasera website, azbellasera.org, click or touch "Forms", or you may call the office, 480-488-0400, to obtain one.

The purpose of the meeting was to finalize details on providing extra vegetation and berming in Bellasera's NAOS (Natural Area Open Space) land.

Great Horned Owl



The great horned owl (Bubo virginianus), also known as the tiger owl or the hoot owl, is a large owl native to the Americas.

The great horned owl is generally colored for camouflage. The underparts of the species are usually light with some brown horizontal barring; the upper parts and upper wings are generally a mottled brown usually bearing heavy, complex, darker markings. All subspecies are darkly barred to some extent along the sides, as well.

All great horned owls have a facial disc. This can be reddish, brown, or gray in color (depending on geographical and racial variation) and is demarked by a dark rim culminating in bold, blackish side brackets. This species' "horns" are tufts of feathers, called plumicorns. The purpose of plumicorns is not fully understood, but the theory that they serve as a visual cue in territorial and sociosexual interactions with other owls is generally accepted.

We are fortunate to have these magnificant birds living in Bellasera. However, they are threatened by homeowners using poison to control the pack rat population. <u>Please</u>, do not use poison as that gets transfered to the owls through their food chain.

Fire Sprinkler Safety

For safety and to ensure the proper operation of the fire sprinkler system installed in all Bellasera homes, remember the following:

- -Visually check the sprinkler system monthly. This check is to make certain that nothing obstructs the sprinklers, which would interfere with their water spray pattern.
- -Do not hang anything from the sprinkler heads.
- -Do not paint the sprinkler heads. No overspray or paint splatters are acceptable.
- -Do not hit or tamper with the sprinkler heads.
- -Do not change the setting of the pressure relief valve because this has been preset at the factory.
- -Test your system or make certain your system is tested periodically to be sure it is working correctly.
- -The main drain valve usually located on an outside wall should remain in the closed position.
- -In areas with cold or freezing weather, it is recommended that insulation be provided for the sprinkler pipe.
- -Make certain that any replacement of the residential sprinklers is by a sprinkler contractor licensed or certified as competent.

Facts & Myths about Fire Sprinklers

Automatic Fire Sprinkler systems have enjoyed an enviable record of protecting life and property for more than 100 years. However, there are still common misunderstandings about the operation and effectiveness of automatic fire sprinkler systems.

"When a fire occurs, every fire sprinkler head discharges water."

Fact: Sprinkler heads are individually activated by heat.

"Residential fires are usually controlled with one sprinkler head."

Fact: A 15-year study conducted in Scottsdale found that 2 or less sprinkler heads controlled more than 92 percent of the fires that occurred in protected properties.

"Water damage from Fire Sprinklers will be more extensive than the fire damage itself."

Fact: Water damage from a home fire sprinkler system will be much less than the damage caused by water from firefighting hoses or the smoke and fire damage if the fire continues unabated.

"A smoke alarm is enough protection from fire."

Fact: Smoke alarms save lives by providing a warning system but do nothing to extin guish a growing fire or protect those physically unable to escape on their own, such as the impaired, elderly or small children. Also, battery operated smoke alarms often fail to work because the batteries are dead or have been removed.

Don't forget to regularly check smoke alarms.

"Fire sprinklers are designed to protect property but are not effective for life safety."

Fact: Fire sprinklers provide a high level of life safety. The NFPA has no record of a multiple death fire in a completely sprinklered public assembly, educational, institutional or residential building where the system was properly operating.

November in the Garden by Joe Mc Dade

The Heat Has Been Turned Off!

It's certainly has been a long six months as we have been forced to endure record breaking heat, a drought, and Covid-19. It took until the end of October, but daytime temperatures have finally dropped, albeit abruptly, bringing us comfortable daytime weather (except for a few very cold days last week) along with cool nights, signaling winter is at our doorsteps. And yes, a couple

of mornings you might have been tempted to turn on the heat. Unfortunately our rain is still MIA! However, because we are situated in the lower Sonoran Desert, there is still time to plant trees and shrubs and give them a head start for next year. While our air temperatures are now cooler, the ground is still warmer than it will be in early spring, so, if you haven't done so already, plant now! At the same time, you need to start "Thinking Winter" in caring for your garden.

November, What to Expect

November is always a delightful month here in the Bellasera and it should be especially welcomed this year after suffering through our long summer. It will give us an opportunity to truly enjoy and appreciate our surroundings. Driving or walking through our community, you can't help but notice the colors coming from our gardens, particularly, the Lantana and Bougainvillea which are currently in full bloom. This is especially true of plants with a southern exposure as our sun has now moved into its southern arc. Our gardens don't go dark in the winter as they will continue to exude plenty of color, with your help.

As the weather changes, plants will start moving sugars and other energy, which has been manufactured all season by the leaves, into storage, preparing for a much needed rest now until next spring. So, our themes for November are

- Think Winter Care
- Plant For Color

Winter Care

Water Efficiently- Plant requirements for moisture diminishes as weather cools and day length shortens. Reducing water helps plants go into dormancy, thereby preparing them to resist freezing temperatures, and also lessens the likelihood of root rot from too-wet soil. Adjust irrigation timers to run less frequently but be aware that our ground is not as moist as it normally is this time of year because of our drought. However, as the weather gets cooler, the ground will stay moist longer. Monitor moisture this month, especially if we get no rain.

- General Guideline- Apply the same amount of water to soak through the entire root zone. Some specific tips:
 - Herbs- Water established herbs once a week or less depending on the temperature.
 - Vegetables- Should be watered every three days.
 - Desert Adapted Plants (established) Water every 14 to 30 days through December.
 - Container Plants Water twice per month or even less for cacti and succulents. Succulents generally do not enjoy being cold and wet.

Cleanup- It's time to clean up the entire garden, a task made much easier this year with no rain, which means...no weeds. Take out spent annuals and vegetables which can harbor insects and diseases during the winter season.

Avoid Frost Problems- Historically, the first freeze can occur as early as the November 15 although recent past years doesn't bear that out. The following steps are suggested:

- Purchase and/or stage your frost protection so that if and when an event occurs, you are
 prepared. Use a fabric such as N-Sulate (which can be found at various garden centers), burlap
 or old sheets. Cover cold-tender plants, along with flower and vegetable beds, if
 temperatures dip.
- •Stop fertilizing cold-tender plants, such as bougainvillea, citrus, hibiscus, natal plum and roses. Feeding promotes fresh, tender growth, which is susceptible to frost damage.

Pruning- Pruning is necessary for health and safety. Some guidelines:

Trees- Most trees are dormant by the end of this month. Avoid lion-tailing, which is excessive interior thinning. This forces the growth of branches outward, straining and weakening them. *Deciduous trees* (those that lose their leaves)- Can be pruned now as it is easy to see flaws that need correcting, such as crossed branches. *Palo Verde* - Avoid pruning in the winter. *Mesquites* - Should receive a light pruning now.

Shrubs and Perennials - Can be pruned now including: •Texas Ranger • Globe Mallow •Brittlebush

Do not prune Yellow Bells or Lantana.

Most herbs can be pruned this month.

Plant for Winter Color in Your Garden

November is a good time to make preparations to brighten your garden for the winter and spring. To get a head start, you might want to pay particular attention to some plants that will provide both color and contrast. Let's start with one that is very prominent in Bellasera.

Bougainvilleas – These are nice plants but occasionally they refuse to bloom. They actually do better with little care and lots of pruning. However, pruning is best done in the early spring after all danger of frost passes. Remove dead branches and keep its height in check. It will quickly recover. Bougainvilleas like well-drained soil and full sun. They do not bloom well in partial shade. It is best to plant them in the spring. You can feed them lightly but do so in the spring and summer. If you over fertilize, the plant will bloom sparsely or not at all.

Other planting options for Winter color.

Vines-You can reduce intense reflected heat with vines as well as providing color. They can be grown easily here in Bellasera on walls with the help of a trellis. Some suggested low-water-use vines with pretty flowers include:

- •Lilac vine •Primrose Jasmine •Queen's Wreath •Yucca vine
- Potato vine- This is another consideration which blooms on and off year-round, if temperatures don't drop below freezing.

Shrubs- you can continue to plant frost-hardy and native woody shrubs and include items that will brighten your garden for the winter and spring. Some recommendations:

Barberry – This shrub is evergreen and has yellow flowers that bloom from late winter to spring. It makes a good informal hedge and attracts birds.

Weeping Dalea – This shrub that has a spreading shape and is evergreen. It has purple clusters of flowers that bloom from the fall to the spring.

Red Erempholia – Rounded evergreen shrub with red tubular flowers that bloom from late winter to spring. This plant attracts hummingbirds.

Chuparosa – Sprawling plant that is semi-evergreen with orange to red tubular flowers that bloom from late winter to spring. It attracts hummingbirds too.

Red Justica – Sprawling evergreen shrub. It has bright red flowers that bloom from the fall to the spring. It can be used in containers.

Green Feathery Senna – Round and airy shrub with yellow clusters of flowers that bloom from late winter to spring.

Vegetables for the Month

Seeds- Beets, Bok Choy, Broccoli, Cabbage, Chinese Cabbage, Carrots, Cauliflower, Chard, Collard Greens, Endive, Kale, Kohlrabi, Lettuce (Head & Leaf), Mustard, Onions (Bulb & Green), Peas, Radishes, Rutabagas, Spinach, Turnips

Transplants- Asparagus, Broccoli, Brussels Sprouts, Cabbage, Chinese Cabbage, Cauliflower, Chard, Kohlrabi, Lettuce (Head & Leaf)

Miscellaneous

Pre-emergent herbicides can be applied from October through early December for winter annual weed control. Follow the package directions carefully for best results. DO NOT use pre-emergent herbicides where you will be planting seeds this season.

Keep your garden tools clean and sharp. To avoid spreading plant diseases via your tools, follow these steps:

- Hose soil off of garden tools before moving to another area of the landscape.
- •Sterilize pruning tools after each and every cut if there is any chance the plant is infected with a disease.
- •Keep your tools sharpened. Sharp tools make for clean wounds which heal quickly. Take care of your tools, they will last longer and so will you and your plants!

Herbs- Sow seeds for cilantro, dill, parsley, oregano and thyme. Transplant anise, caraway, chamomile, fennel, marjoram, mint, rosemary, sage and salad burnet.

Spring-blooming Bulbs- Plant in well-drained soil that is rich in organic matter. Mix a phosphorus fertilizer with soil in the bottom of the planting hole. Phosphorus, which promotes bloom, does not move readily through soil, so place it where the bulb's roots will be able to absorb it.

November Happenings

November is normally an uplifting month full of positive happenings such as: Thanksgiving, Outdoor Dining, Pumpkins and, if you're into sports, College and Pro Football kicks into high gear. However, being the year of the pandemic, a lot of events and rituals that we have become accustomed to, have been taken off the calendar or modified or, in some cases, simply eliminated. Here goes!

November 1st- Clocks are turned back, except ours.

Veterans Day- Wednesday, November 11. This day is the anniversary of the signing of the armistice which ended World War I hostilities between Allied Nations and Germany in 1918. Veterans are thanked for their services on this day in the U.S.

"It is foolish and wrong to mourn the men who died.
