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
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

Update Regarding Annual Meeting

The 2021 Annual Meeting of Bellasera homeowners will be held on a June Sunday afternoon at **2:00 p.m** The exact date will be announced following our next Board meeting in early May. This will be a *hybrid* Annual Meeting. Those able to attend in person are welcome on the clubhouse patio. The meeting will also be broadcast online via a Zoom webinar for those homeowners unable to attend in person.

All homeowners will be provided an 'invitation' and specific log-in instructions via an e-blast in the week prior to meeting date, if they choose to view the Annual Meeting via the Zoom platform. Online homeowner participants will be able to view and hear the Board members and homeowners attending in person. Homeowners attending via Zoom will not be able to speak but are instead asked to use the Question and Chat features of the Zoom platform to address questions to the Board. The Board will also attempt to answer questions previously submitted in writing.

The Annual Meeting presents an opportunity for homeowners to have their questions and concerns regarding the Bellasera Community, its maintenance, activities, and finances answered and addressed in an open forum.

Survey Results for Proposed Capital Contribution Fee

The results of the survey of Bellasera homeowners regarding a proposed Capital Contribution Fee on home sales in Bellasera have now been tallied. We received more than 210 responses, with more than 80% in favor. Many respondents raised legitimate questions and concerns which will need to be addressed before the Board considers officially moving forward with any such proposal.

There will be a brief presentation on this topic at the upcoming Annual Meeting. We will also be scheduling several community-wide meetings to specifically discuss this issue prior to making any decision to move forward.

WHEN A SNAKE IS IN A RESIDENTIAL AREA

If you or someone else is bitten by a poisonous snake, call 911 immediately. Observe the reptile at a distance (at least 6 feet) and try to identify what type of snake it is. Do not try to kill or capture the snake yourself.

If you or your pet is not in danger, leave the snake alone and allow it to make its way back into the desert.

If the snake is in your yard, and you are not comfortable waiting for it to return to its normal habitat, the Phoenix (602-550-1090) and Arizona (480-894-1625) Herpetological Associations are volunteer organizations that can relocate the snake.

If you are in an undeveloped area, such as the desert or a park, leave the animal alone. Restrain your pet until the snake moves on. Warn others in the area.

If the snake is determined to be poisonous and it is located inside your home or garage, or at the entrance to your home, call the fire department's non-emergency number at **480-312-8911**. Be sure to watch the snake's movement, as it cannot be relocated if it cannot be found.

CONSTRUCTION BEGINS



Construction has commenced on a new residence located adjacent to the Bellasera community. May In the Garden

Right On Schedule... Our Community And Gardens Transition To Summer!

With the exception of some spikes in the temperature, April provided us with some beautiful weather, especially the latter half of the month. And, to top things off, we got a taste of rain near the end.

The beautiful weather we experienced belies the fact that May transitions, albeit gradually (hopefully), into summer. During April, we didn't see any days over 100°F in Bellasera but will most assuredly experience them during May which can usually be guaranteed to be clear, dry and hot. Our community will also transition to its "summer size" as our winter residents return to their summer haunts.

This is an important month for your garden as the spring blooming season will come to an end and temperatures begin to increase mandating that you pay attention to some *care, maintenance, and upkeep tasks,* which I've listed below, paying special attention to *trees* and *succulents*. There is still an open window for some selective planting which I'll also cover.

Trees

During May, we will experience an explosion of yellow blooms creating a *Corridor of Yellow* along our streets which, as I've pointed out in previous columns, is not by accident, but by design. When Bellasera was developed, all of the native trees were saved and redistributed to each home lot, primarily palo verdes along with some mesquite and ironwood. For your healthy trees, consider the following:

- **Pruning** Lightly prune desert legumes (like palo verde or mesquite) removing dead limbs and small crossing branches. Delay hard-pruning until later in the summer as it will encourage a heavy regrowth which will make them unstable and prone to toppling over during monsoon season.
- Stakes If you added stakes to trees that you planted in the fall; it is time to take them away. Expect the tree to lean at first, especially if it is small, but, as it gains strength, it will correct itself quickly
- Watering- Increase the watering of newly planted or young trees to maintain a watering depth of 3 feet. This may mean watering once a week if the temperatures are already hot or if the soil drains quickly. For mature trees, watering should not be necessary as we have had ample winter rain to sustain them. If we have an exceptionally dry summer, then watering mature trees should be reconsidered.

Note***If you have lost a tree or have one that's dying, May is an excellent month to replace it.

Succulents - Care and Planting

Many plant families make up the succulent species, the best known being cactus. Virtually all cacti (or cactuses) are succulents, but many succulents are not cactus. Since May through the summer is the perfect time to plant warm season succulents, I'll give you some general planting and maintenance guidelines.

<u>Planting</u> - Newly planted succulents, regardless of size or type, may need to be shaded during the first summer to prevent sunburn. This can be accomplished by:

- 1. Planting near a tree, shrub, or building does not prevent enough shade to provide the necessary shade or,
- 2. Drape shade cloth with at least 30% coverage on a frame over the plant.

There is always room for a few more cacti in your landscape. Cactus breeders have hybridized varieties of *hedgehog* cacti to bloom in just about every color of the rainbow. When you buy **cactus**, notice which side of the pot is facing south

in the nursery. Mark that side and, when you replant the cactus

in your garden, be sure it is oriented to the sun the same way.

<u>Water Stress</u> -Cactus have large reservoirs of moisture in the stems but can still become water stressed and display the following symptoms:

- Skin that is soft to the touch and offers resistance to gentle pressure.
- Shrinking distance between the ribs of columnar cactus (if you can't put your finger between the ribs, the plant is desperate for water).
- •Yellowing or paleness of the skin, especially on the south or western side.
- •Wilting, drooping, or falling pads on prickly pear.
- Shriveling or shrinking of the skin.

These symptoms show up only when the plant is deeply stressed. Water frequently enough to avoid these symptoms. If they do appear, water immediately and adjust the watering schedule. *Aloes*, especially those that form extensive colonies, can be overgrown if not kept divided regularly. To properly divide them, cut out the plants along the edge until you have reduced the size of the colony by at least half or even more which is fine.

Watering

May is the traditional month to raise your awareness to watering and let's start with a few basic reminders. Be sure that your drip system is activated and in good working condition. It's important to adjust your watering habits now that the heat has arrived and continue to adjust as we warm up. It is recommended that you:

- Water in the mornings, not during the heat of the day or evenings.
- Water slowly and deeply to get to the thirsty roots.

Your soil should be moist several inches below the surface. Remember that plants in pots need more water than those in the ground as soil dries out faster in containers. Observe plants regularly for signs of water stress. Some signs to look for include: wilting, curling leaves, yellowing or falling of older leaves, and dead stems or branches.

Watering amount and frequency depends on many factors notably: soil type, weather (temperature, humidity, rainfall, etc.), microclimates, plant size and species, and whether newly planted or established in the landscape (two years or more). I'll cover this topic every month until cool weather returns.

Summer Annuals

If you haven't already replaced your winter flowers, I'm sure our recent temperatures have put a halt to the blooms and, whatever was left in your pots, may be starting to wilt. All of our local nurseries still have an excellent selection of "summer replacements" such as Vinca or Zinnia which will go a long way in brightening up your patio or courtyard. Remember to choose something that can be easily maintained and keep in mind that watering demands for





flowers are different than your drought tolerant plants.

Miscellaneous/Maintenance/Planting

Citrus- May is the month for the second application of citrus fertilizer. Fertilize with one-third of the tree's total annual nitrogen requirement. Water to a depth of 3 feet immediately after application. Don't worry about fruit drop. Citrus trees set more fruit than they can bear to maturity and shed the excess.

Prune Winter Blooming Shrubs- Emu bush, cassia, salvia and natal plum should be pruned early in the month to keep from getting leggy. Cut back brittle bush to 6 inch stems. Remove spent flower stalks from hesperaloes and penstemons.

Spread Mulch -Layer 3 to 4 inches of organic mulch (any combination of chipped matter, compost, leaves or well-aged manure) on top of garden beds or around the bases of landscape plants. Mulch maintains soil moisture, inhibits weeds and adds nutrients as it decomposes. Mulch also reduces soil temperatures, helping roots stay cool and less stressed during summer.

Vegetables-Sow warm-season Armenian cucumbers, black-eyed peas, cantaloupe, okra and yard long beans. Transplant sweet potatoes.

Roses- Continue fertilizing established roses, liquid fertilizers can be added at 2 week intervals, follow the directions on the container.

Herbs- Maximize the flavors and aromas of herbs by harvesting them in the early-morning hours after dew has evaporated but before the sun heats up.

Spring-Blooming Perennials- Penstemons, Brittlebush, Globemallow, Fleabane, and Golden Columbine will be producing seed. Allow them to produce seed before pruning spent flowering stems. The seed is a valuable food source for many animals.

Citrus Tree –Consider planting a *miniature* lemon or lime tree (in your backyard of course). May is an excellent month to add any desert adapted or native tree.

Ocotillo -Plant your Ocotillo from March through May as these are the ideal months to achieve greater transplanting success. This is a woody shrub and should not be treated as a succulent. Nurseries will have mature ones salvaged from the desert.

Fertilization- Most native and desert-adapted plants in the landscape do not generally require fertilizer as they are adapted to our soil conditions. In most cases, fertilizers are generally applied to prevent deficiencies. If fertilizers are needed, one application for the year is usually sufficient. If you did not fertilize in March or in April, go ahead and fertilize your landscape plants if necessary as May is an ideal month for this task.

May Bloomers

In addition to our Palo Verde trees, there are a multitude of May bloomers to look forward including:

Saguaro- The iconic Saguaro will soon sprout their flowers, opening up in the evening and remaining open throughout the following day. Many animals and insects are attracted to the white, fruit-scented flowers

Ironwood Trees- The Ironwood will produce blush pink to white, pea-like flowers that are also sweetly scented and attractive to many animals and insects.

Ocotillo- This native, deciduous shrub is putting on quite a show right now with its spectacular fiery red flower clusters throughout our community and surrounding areas. They can be especially lavish during this first bloom cycle of spring.

Have You Ever?

Saved seeds- If you haven't, here's how:

- Allow flowers of cool-season annuals to dry and go to seed.
- •As seeds begin to drop naturally, hold a paper bag or container beneath the dry seeds and tap them into it. Or, tie a paper bag over flower heads to catch falling seeds.
- Punch a few holes in the bag to allow air circulation. Collect seeds on dry, sunny days.
- If seeds are exposed to moisture, spread them on newspaper to dry for a week.
- Remove any stems or leaves before storing in an airtight container in a cool, dry place.
