

## Clubhouse Corner

Dear Residents,

I would like to give you an update on voting for the proposed CC&R amendment to establish a Capital Improvement Fee. The Capital Improvement Fee is designed to take the place of the interest that we previously had received on our Reserve funds. The Capital Improvement Fee will be collected from the BUYER of a Bellasera home at the time of closing and sent directly to the Bellasera Reserve account. The Fee will then be the current one

year of HOA dues, presently that is \$2520.

In voting thus far, the amendment has received a positive vote of 86% of the votes cast. While that is heartening, the disappointing news is that only just over a third of you have voted. The CC&R's require that a two thirds vote, 240 yes votes, must be received for the amendment to pass. If the voting ended today, the amendment would fail despite receiving overwhelming support from those who voted. An election this important to our future should not be decided by non-voters.

I want to be completely transparent with you. If the amendment does fail in the end, I will still be tasked with finding the funds that will replace the interest we previously received. There are only two viable ways to do that. One of them is to have a Special Assessment. The Board of Directors can authorize a Special Assessment without a vote of the community. We WILL NOT do that. The other way to raise the funds is to increase our HOA dues to each of you to make up for the funds the Capital Improvement Fee would have raised. That we will do.

It will take an additional \$50 per quarter or \$200 annually from each of you. That will mean that quarterly dues will be at least \$680. Taking into account the inflation I am seeing in our operating expenses, I believe HOA dues would most likely exceed \$700 per quarter. It DOESN'T have to happen. We all need EVERYONE to vote.

If you haven't voted yet, DON'T WAIT. If you need **Pamela Nunnelly** to send you the online voting instructions and your personal password, contact her at **480-488-0400**. If you would prefer to fill out a paper ballot, they are available below the bulletin board just inside the front door of the clubhouse or one can be mailed to you by contacting Pamela at 480-488-0400. Filled out paper ballots can be placed in the black suggestion box to the left of the office or mailed to the office at 7350 Ponte Bella Drive.

Greetings to Pat Gillette and a warm welcome to a former resident of Bellasera. Pat and her husband Bob lived on Visao Drive for more than 10 years before Bob passed away in 2009. At that point Pat decided to live with her daughter in Maryland for a while, but Arizona and friends drew her back.

## CITY OF SCOTTSDALE DECLARES "STAGE 1" OF ITS DROUGHT MANAGEMENT PLAN & ACTIVATES DROUGHT MANAGEMENT TEAM

The United States Bureau of Reclamation declared a Colorado River "Tier 1 shortage." In response, Scottsdale City Manager Jim Thompson is implementing "Stage 1" of Scottsdale's Drought Management Plan. This activates a team of city leaders to initiate increased water education, conservation and outreach efforts.

This first-ever declaration means a water supply shortage for most of Arizona in 2022. But not in Scottsdale. Thanks to our advanced planning and infrastructure investments, Scottsdale residents and businesses will not see a change. Scottsdale Water will continue to deliver water without interruptions because of our diverse water resources portfolio including: Salt and Verde rivers, groundwater and reclaimed water. Scottsdale's rights to the Colorado River also will be largely untouched by the Tier 1 shortage declaration with only an estimated 3 percent reduction.

Residents and businesses will not be mandated to reduce water use in Tier 1. However, we are asking everyone to voluntarily increase water conservation efforts, which will help to secure the city's future water supply.

#### FLOOD MAP CHANGES

Mortgage holders of more than 500 northwest Scottsdale properties are now able to cancel their flood insurance due to flood map changes that went into effect July 20.

The Flood Control District of Maricopa County, in partnership with the city of Scottsdale and the city of Phoenix, asked the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to update its Flood Insurance Rate Maps for a portion of northwest Scottsdale and northeast Phoenix to make them more accurate. FEMA's flood insurance rate maps identify flood hazards, assess flood risks and provide data to guide local stakeholders in taking effective actions, resulting in safer communities.

Based on these changes, the 100-year floodplain became smaller, removing the floodplain from hundreds of properties. Flood insurance is no longer mandatory for mortgage holders of buildings that are now excluded from the floodplain boundary.

50 Scottsdale buildings will remain in the revised floodplain boundary (https://www.scott-sdaleaz.gov/Assets/ScottsdaleAZ/News/News+Images/News+documents/floodplain-map. pdf) and 25 Scottsdale buildings were mapped into the new floodplain. Mortgage holders of these 25 buildings will now be required to carry flood insurance pursuant to federal law, since the more accurate floodplain boundary shows that these buildings are at risk of flooding on a 100-year storm.

Mortgage holders of buildings no longer within the floodplain can request a flood hazard determination online and provide the information to their mortgage company with their request to cancel flood insurance.

Because severe weather and flooding can be unpredictable in the desert, Scottsdale urges residents to consider carrying flood insurance, even though it will no longer be mandatory for mortgage holders of buildings now excluded from the floodplain boundary.

## September in the Garden

#### A Monsoon For The Ages

In the July issue of this column, I asked the question: **Will The Monsoon Show Up?** Well, it was emphatically answered with record rain in July and August which contributed to a somewhat enjoyable summer even though we did have our share of normal hot spells and increased humidity. However, injected into our **Sonoran Summer** was an unexpected, but welcome, record number of low temperature days. For the record, the 2021 monsoon season is seven days behind an 1896 record of 24 total days with measurable rainfall between June 15 and Sept. 30 and, we have September in front of us with a chance for more rain. Most importantly, was the major impact it had on our gardens as well as our surroundings. Just look around Bellasera!

### The Monsoon Impact on Your Garden A Quick Summer Recovery

Traditionally, September slowly ushers in fall and is an important month for your garden as the cooling nighttime temperatures help your plants on the road to recovery from the heat of the summer. However, if you take a walk around your garden, you might conclude that there is very little to recover and, in most instances, overgrown and needing attention. They have certainly been given a head start as the monsoon has not only provided cooler temperatures but much needed moisture and nutrients for your plants and trees to shake off any effects of our summer heat. And, just as important, the ground will be soft and receptive to fall planting. Thanks to the monsoon, September 2021 is truly the kickoff month for *fall planting*. So, let's think positive as I attempt to provide some suggestions and guidance for your fall garden undertakings.

#### **Planting: Guidelines, Suggestions & Timing**

**Evaluate Your Garden:** September is the ideal month to take a look at your landscape to decide **what works and what doesn't.** Most all of our landscaping in Bellasera was initially put in by landscapers almost 20 years ago and I'm sure everything was not planted in an optimal spot. So, I encourage you to take an inventory and answer these questions?

- •Do you need to move some plants that did not do well in full sun or, perhaps, needed full sun?
- •What do you need to replace? Remember, plants have a life cycle.
- •What should you add?

**Site Selection:** This is the key to growing non-native plants here in the Sonoran desert. The sun will be getting farther and farther south each day. A site on the North side of a wall with half-day light now will be in more shade later. Plants need at least six to eight hours of sun to perform properly.

**General Timing:** The traditional optimum time to start planting is September 15. However, for the past few years, due to the hot summers, I've been recommending proceeding with caution or waiting until the end of September. However, the time to start planting this year is mid-September providing the night time temperature is in the 70's.

#### What and When To Plant

Landscape Shrubs, Trees, Cacti and Succulents- As mentioned above, the optimum time to start fall planting this year is mid-September providing the night time temperature is in the 70's. The ground will be soft and receptive to the root systems and the plants shouldn't need as much water to survive. However, if you start planting in mid-September, you should still monitor plants for signs of water stress as we can certainly get some hot spells.

**Vegetables**-Yes, you can grow vegetables here in Bellasera. If you have the inclination, energy and time, try these:

#### **Pruning**

As mentioned above, the monsoon has resulted in substantial growth in your garden, especially trees and shrubs which are going to require pruning. Consider the following:

**Trees-** There are traditional schedules for pruning native trees, E.G - Summer is the best time to prune fast-growing, drought-tolerant trees, both native and imports, including **palo verde**, **mesquite**, **willow acacia**, and **palo brea**. And, the winter is an excellent time to prune deciduous trees because they lose their leaves and it is easier to see the branch structure when making the cuts. **However**, **it is safe to prune all of your trees in the fall**, so prune where necessary.

**Shrubs** – For September only, I would simply recommend that you assess all of your shrubs and prune where necessary to control plant size (they may have substantial overgrowth) and remove any dead branches or overcrowding stems.

#### **Miscellaneous Tasks**

**Prune Roses-** Around mid-month, prepare hybrid roses for their second bloom period. Remove dead or damaged canes, weak, spindly foliage and any suckers arising from below the bud union (a slight bump at the base of the stem where the variety was grafted to the root stock). Cut back no more than one-third of the plant. Apply a slow-release fertilizer and water to a depth of 2 feet.

**Weeds-** Unfortunately, a negative outcome of our monsoon will be **weeds**, and plenty of them. I've already noticed them popping up around Bellasera. Suggest that you prepare to start pulling or get your yard sprayed. Weeds compete with garden plants for moisture, nutrients and sunlight, and also harbor pests such as beet leafhoppers, which transmit curly top virus to tomatoes and other vegetables.

**Feed Citrus**- If you did not do so in August, fertilize with your third and final application of the year which helps improve fruit size.

**Watering** – Except for flowers, there has been little need to do any serious watering lately. As our monsoon tapers off and we continue to be on the warm side, consider cranking up your drip system.

**Grass**- If you are one of the few with grass and plan to overseed with ryegrass in October, stop fertilizing warm season Bermuda lawns four to six weeks prior.

**General Fertilization**- This is the month for that last application of fertilizer before cold weather arrives. Use a low nitrogen formula so as to prevent excessive new growth. Plants need a chance to harden off to prepare for the cold as new growth will likely freeze with the onset of a frost. Stop fertilizing your Christmas cactus now in order to hopefully induce blooms by the holidays.

**Warm Season Annual Flower Beds-** While you can consider replacing them with cool season annuals, I would wait until October as your summer flowers will probably last a while longer. I'll have recommendations next month.

#### Have You Noticed The Yellow Butterflies?

Yellow butterflies have taken up camp in Bellasera and are probably in your backyard. I've done a little research and the winged wonders appear to be the Southern Dogface (Colias cesonia), which is a North American butterfly in the family Pieridae, subfamily Coliadinae. Their habitats are open areas with host plants usually being herbaceous and, I suspect that



they are all over this part of the Sonoran. Butterflies are important pollinators and good indicators of the ecological quality of a habitat as well as an important component of the food chain, particularly as larvae.

#### **Pinnacle Peak Park**

If you have never been there, now is a perfect time. The recent rain and cooler temperatures have a produced a sea of green up and down the mountain. There is a well maintained trail and you don't have to hike very far to enjoy its splendor. Give it try; it's only 15 minutes from Bellasera.

#### **Labor Day**

This annual holiday is celebrated on the first Monday in September. It is actually the creation of the labor movement and is dedicated to American workers. It constitutes a yearly national tribute to the contributions workers have made to the strength, prosperity and well-being of our country.




